tion growing out of the decay of animal matter and- the unbearabl stench arising thereform. This, it is stated, makes living in the north east part of the town not only unhealthy, but decidedly uncomforta

The News does not hesitate to say that the objections are well taken and the situation should be relieved. It is the plain duty of the court to do this and without delay. Steps should be taken to secure the necessary ground furthe beyond the limits of towrt and unti this other ground is secured meas-
