Blind Bpot in the Ey
It is remarkable that although the optic nerve is of all parts of the eye the most sensitive to light, yet hook anound us-and some object must always be thrown on it-it is nvisible to us, and in our field of vision there is in reality a gap, though in ordinary sight the-surrounding edges of this gap draw up
together and so fill it. But by closing one eye by practice one may actually force the object which is reflected on to the optic nerve to
disappear completely from the field of vision. Bernstein tells us that even the sun itself can be made to disappear if it falls exactly on the blind spot where the optic nerve enters the eye. This may account for the fact that some people can close
one eye and stare the summer sun ithout wincing.
