#### Snaps for Young Men.

There are young men, middleaged men, and old men, all looking for snaps, but there are more young men looking for the soft places than there are men of any other age. We know of several young men, whose parents are farmers, who are looking for snaps. They are drifting to the cities to find them. But will they?

Within the past two years the writer of this has had a chance to gain a slight insight into the duties of the city worker, and all his life has been spent on the farm, so this article will deal with both the duties of the city worker and those of the country worker.

There are no snaps. A person has to "tote" wherever he is and whatever he does. The farm boy may think that work in a city office is a snap, but it is not. The most miserable failure we know of is work in search of a snap, and travels the country over trying to find it. The habit of roam ing is established in this way, and the snap is always just a little further on. In reality, the snap is no more of a fact than the bag of gold at the end of a rainbow, and who ever succeed: ed in securing that? But the man who is willing to bring in his share, will take more away in profits than he ever could before, and in no place will the profits be larger in proportion to what you bring than on a Western farm.-Mail and Breeze.



Section 111 of the Terrell election law says:

"Any person desiring his name to appear on the official ballot for the general primary as a candidate for the nomination for any office to be filled by the qualified voters of a county or a portion thereof, or for county chairman, shall file with the county chairman of the county of his residence, not later than Saturday before the third Monday in June preceding such primary, a written request for his name to be printed on such official ballot as a candidate for the nomination or -position named therein, giving his occupation and postoffice address, giving the street and number of his residence if within a city or town, such request to be signed and acknowledged by him before some officer authorized to take acknowledgment to deeds.


