The contest was held in the ballroom of the Hotel Adolphus. It was a state-wide contest and Peggy entered against the strongest competition in the state of Texas.
Each contestant played three numbers. The total number of contestants playing in the contest was reduced to 13, who played in the finals. It took four hours to hear the play-off in the finals.
