**PRECINCT CONVENTIONS.**

CANYON CITY.

Mass meeting Democratic pre-  
cinct convention was called to  
order by Chairman L. C. Lair in  
the Court House at 3 P. M. last  
Saturday. After a statement by  
the precinct chairman as to its  
purposes and the election of  
Geo. A. Brandon as secretary,  
the following business was done,  
to-wit:

delegation to represent this pre-  
cinct in the county convention  
of Saturday (tomorrow) Aug. 4.  
And upon further motion L. C.  
Lair was added to this delega-  
tion.

The representatives of this  
precinct were instructed to cast  
their vote in said county con-  
vention for L. C. Lair to suc-  
ceed himself as member of the  
Democratic Executive Commit-  
tee from this precinct.

No further business appearing  
the convention adjourned.

**Primary Results—County.**

A fine vote was polled in the  
Saturday primaries and the very  
best of order was maintained  
throughout the county. Not a  
wrangle or disturbance of any kind  
was visible here or even a heated  
controversy of any sort, good hu-  
mored or otherwise.

The results, as detailed else-  
where, are disappointing to some,  
the results of elections always are,  
but the defeated are taking it like  
men; they are game to the finish  
and without exception are making  
friends by it. Nerve is a great  
thing to possess and it is especially  
admired by Western people and  
the man who dies game, even in  
political battles, oftentimes gains in  
the long run more than he loses.  
The Randall county “line-up” of  
candidates was an unusually good  
one and while some of the best  
men in the county failed at the  
primaries to reach the goal of their  
then present ambitions, they can  
have the consolation of knowing  
that those who defeated them in  
this respect are not only good citi-  
zens but perfectly competent to fill  
the places for which they were  
chosen.

The results, then, while in several  
instances disastrous to individual  
ambition, have in them nothing  
bad for the county—we have a  
good ticket from top to bottom.

**WHO CAN BLAME HIM?**

Whatever may be said to the  
contrary the Czar of “all the  
Russias” was forced to dissolve  
the Douma. This body of men,  
a Parliament so-called, was  
rapidly going from bad to worse;  
it had almost reached the point  
where the head of the House of  
of Romanoff could truthfully  
say, it is their heads or mine  
and so barely in the nick of  
time he took theirs and saved  
his own. It was in fact clearly  
a case of self preservation and  
from a human standpoint no  
one, be he sovereign or peasant,  
can be blamed for making the  
cast as did Nicholas of Russia.  
Russia has been in darkness  
so long that the great mass of  
her people are totally unprepared  
for constitutional govern-  
ment; with them freedom and  
the right of suffrage means,  
judging from their recent ac-  
tions, license to commit all man-  
ner of crimes against both life  
and property. The Czar made  
liberal concessions; the Douma,  
claiming to represent all the  
people asked more; Nicholas in  
his natural kindness of heart  
and much against the counsel of  
the conservatives granted still  
more; and then this body, call-  
ing itself the Russian Govern-  
ment, asked for the whole thing  
and the Czar unlike the ill-fated  
Louis of Bourbon, whose road  
many students of history have  
predicted he would follow, called  
their hands and as already  
said, who can blame him?
