### Wheat a Sure Crop.

That the Panhandle is a good wheat country the most skeptical no longer doubt. Yields from 15 to 40 bushels per acre can be relied on. An annual average of 25 bushels per acre is as sure as a dime is for a ginger cake. When the Missourian comes along and demands that he be shown we are in a position to accommodate him. He can be shown that under most favorable conditions the yield runs to the enormous amount of 50 bushels per acre. There are hundreds of eye witnesses to the measure and amount of the wheat and the land upon which it was grown.

In addition we invite the prospector to an inspection of the weather bureau reports issued at Amarillo for the last fifteen years.

In studying the monthly rainfall for each year it will be found that the Panhandle is as safe for 25 bushels of wheat as Illinois is for 50 bushels of corn. That this soil and climate is adapted to wheat no one doubts and the only question that arises is, the sufficient rainfall at the proper time of year? Wheat raising experts are able to furnish figures for the necessary moisture to insure a profitable wheat yield. The weather bureau station at Amarillo answers the question as to how near these moisture requirements have been met for the last fifteen years. A study of these figures will repay any one who is interested in the agricultural possibilities of the Panhandle.—Amarillo Herald.

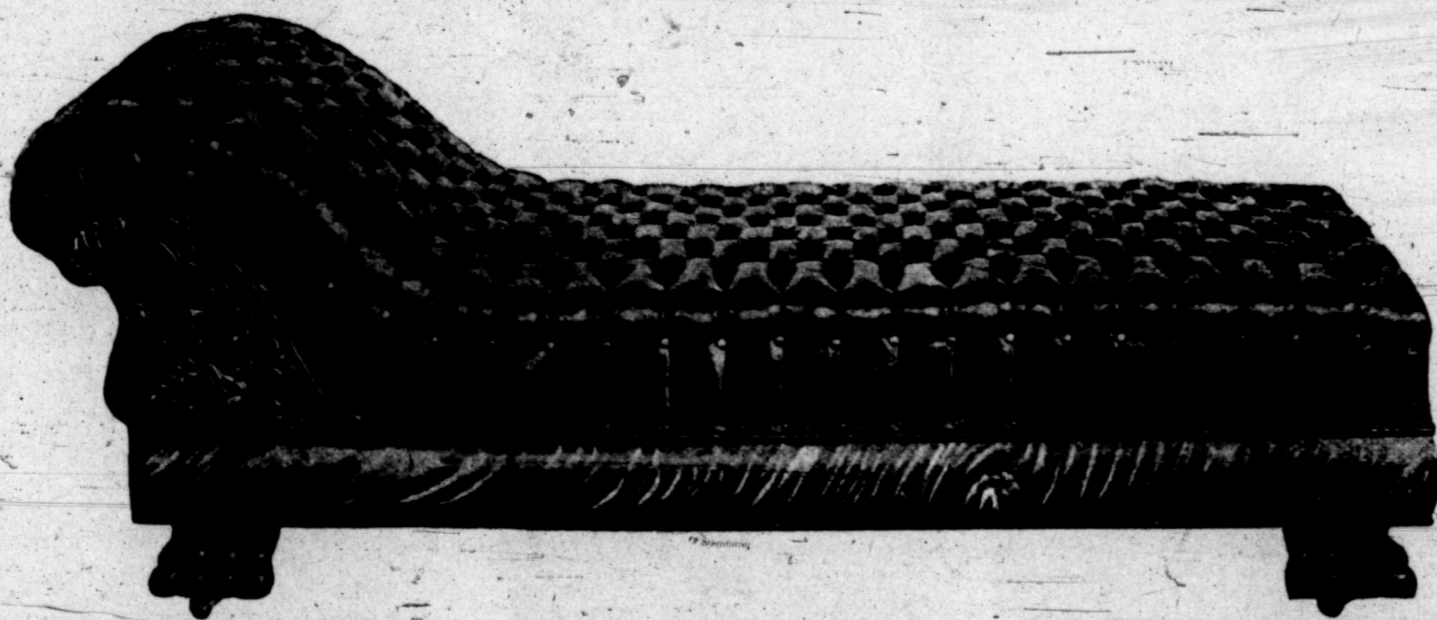

**TIME TO GET BUSY.**

Only ten days now until the seventh annual reunion of the U. C. V. Camp Stonewall Jackson is upon us and as we have already been a little late this year in commencing the advertising part of the program, it will be well for all the committees to get busy now and see that every preparation is made not only for getting the people here but also to entertain them after they come. Of course most of the people who come here from a distance do not do so that they may find amusement but merely come to see the Plains country and enjoy its cool breezes for a week or ten days. To this class of visitors, The News can say that their "bill of fare" is already an assured success; the cool breezes are in evidence, grass and crops are fresh and green, the "watermill" is a-splish on the vine, the tick and redbug have long since contented themselves with making their home south of the quarantine line, and there is absolutely no reason why you cannot pitch your tent here and spend one of the pleasantest weeks of your life. An occasional trip to the fishing grounds, or a jaunt to the picturesque Palo Duro Canyon would help to make the stay pleasant all the while and after all has been seen and you are ready to leave for home, you could not but heave a sigh that the thing could not be done over again. As a matter of course, the local attendance will be interested in the games of baseball which are promised for the occasion, the balloon ascensions, cowboy sports and other western modes of amusement too numerous to catalogue.

The Santa Fe railroad is having a hard time getting laborers at Amarillo. They tried to work about seventy-five negroes on the new shops they are building there, but a body of masked white men invited the negroes to leave and the invitation was accepted with alacrity.—Stratford Star.

**Had a "Pipe-Dream."**

Some Panhandle newspaper correspondent possesses a wealth of imagination that is not doing his country any good. Yesterday's Denver Post brings us the news in the shape of a Fort Worth telegram that five people were killed by lightning near Amarillo, and that Canyon City was wiped out by a cyclone. The Panhandle is not immune against lightning. In a country where it rains as much as it does here, we have to take our share of electrical shocks, which are no more common than in Missouri or Illinois, and other sections where there is considerable rain. As to cyclones, we hold the minimum record. No twister was ever known to visit the plains. The black towering clouds that drive the people to cyclone cellars in Oklahoma and Kansas inspire no fear in these parts, and pass away in soaking showers that bless the farmer.

The newspaper that contains this dispatch either got it from its monumental falsifier that it falls back on in a dearth of news, or some bad whiskey got in its work on the Panhandle informant.—Amarillo Bulletin.

The Bulletin deserves credit for thus condemning the action of the Amarillo news correspondent who circulated the above report. This report, whether maliciously fabricated or not, has already been the means of doing this section considerable damage and has been no little annoyance to the people of Canyon City, besides some loss sustained in consignments of goods from abroad being held up on account of this report falling into the hands of people who were having commercial dealings with our town. For an example of this, a cement factory in the north had a consignment of cement billed for this point and upon seeing this false report, held the order until the statement in the papers could be verified. As a consequence, several contractors and a large force of men were compelled to wait several days at a heavy expense, for the delayed material, all on account of this blockhead who evidently had a "pipe-dream" and imagined that because he had gone wrong the whole world was upside down.

All kinds of phenomenas are being brought to light now that people on the Plains are taking an interest in what this soil can produce, the latest case being that of a specimen of Indian corn grown by B. T. Johnson on his place west of town. The sample in question was three medium height stalks of corn, with four well-formed ears of grain on them, all the product of one grain of corn. Mr. Johnson informs The News that this is not by any means the first growth of this character that has come under his own observation since his farming experience on the Plains, as he has repeatedly observed the phenomena. It is a very rare occurrence that corn suckers ever produce well formed ears, as in most cases the growth thus produced forms a "blister" in the tassel and then "smut." However, none of us are ready to say that this is a growth entirely peculiar to the Plains country.

Last week's homeseekers' excursions were no doubt the largest that has yet come into this part of the southwest. One of our local real estate men informs The News that 56 solid cars of emigrants were billed out of Kansas City last week for different points in this territory. Wednesday the Santa Fe ran their train in three crowded sections. Thursday they were obliged to use five sections, all crowded. Friday, to carry the overflow, the regular train went out with all the extra coaches the engine could pull. Many of these homeseekers go on down to the Pecos Valley, but the majority of them stop in the Panhandle. The next excursion will be on the 23rd inst. and it will probably be the largest thing ever attempted in the way of a homeseekers excursion. Canyon City real estate firms expect to get one train load of emigrants on this date.
