Making Cement Walks.
A good walk may be built by making an excavation six to eight inches deep and three the width of the walk. Where the width of the walk. Where necessary, drain. First put in the foundation, built up of coarse cobble stones on the bottom, then coarse gravel, sand or cinders. Level these and pack firmly. Make the foundation so that one inch of cement will be required to finish on top. To lay cement make a form of frame of $2 \times \beta$ inch stuff the exact height and width of walk, tirmly staked to prevent spreading. First put a layer of concrete made of one part cement, three parts sharp sand, and three to four parts coarse stone, cinders, gravel, etc. Make.this three to four inches thick and cover with one-inch layer of one part cement and one to two and a half parts sand. Lap off in blocks and smooth surface with wood en or cork float, giving the sur face a little roughness to avoid a glossy or slick finish. After laying the foundation the concrete and surface should be laid in blocks four to eight feet long to prevent cracking. A strip of tin or sheet iron should be slipped in at the division line where blocks join. Remove before cement bardens and you will have a walk laid in blocks so that if cracks occur but one block is affected at a time.

PETITION TO INCORPORTTE.

The following petition was pre sented to the county -Judge Satur day and on Monday he entered an order calling for an election tor Saturday, Sept 29. The petition with its signers is as follows: To the Honorable J. M. Vansant, County Judge of Randall County Texas:

## The Solar System.

In all the hepavens, with the exceptions of passing meteors or meteorities, not one body occupies position closer to the earth than the moon, which is some 340,000 miles away-very far, of course ances, but a mere fraction side by side with other astronomical disances. Next to the moon our ances. Next to the moon ou nearest occassional neighbor is
Venus and then Mars. Both Venus Venus and then Mars. Both Venus and Mars, however, are often far ther away from us than the sun which remains always at some where about the same distance, roughly at from $90,000,000$ to $93,000,000$ miles.
This dividing space between sun and earth is of great importance in thinking abouf the stars, and should be clearly impressed upo shoul bind Next to the sun in point of nearness come the more distant planets-Jupiter, which is aboutfive times as far from the "sun as our earth is; Saturn nearly twice as far as Jupiter; Uranus, nearly twiee as far as Saturn, and Nep tune nearly three times as far as Saturn. All these planets belong to our sunt, all are members of - his family, all are part of the solar system. The size of the solar system as a whole, consisting thus of the sun and his planets, including our earth, may be fairly well grasped by any one taking the trouble to master two simple facts. They are these, that our earth is roughly about $92,000,000$ miles away from the sun and that. Neptune, the outermost planet of the as far distant from the sun as our earth is.-Chambers Journal.
