Establishment of a State print shop. Here again The News enters an emphatic No. The News takes this position because the experience of the past has proven that it requires, as a rule, about twice as much money for the government to do its own printing as to let it out by contracts The statistics of our National government show this beyond a doubt as well as the records of the states trying the experiment. It wont do.

Salary of members of the Legislature. Unless The News is badly mistaken about such a request as this one was refused by the people less than a year ago and the present one richly deserves the same fate. If coupled with the assurance of reducing the membership of the House to one; half of its present number it might do, but under present conditions it should be so treated as to bury it for good.

Creating improvement districts in certain cities. As this, like the proposition to levy a special road tax, must before being operative be adopted by the people affected by the levy, The News, as with the other, sees no reasonable objection to this. Home rule has ever been a hobby with The News editor and so he will vote for this amendment.

Such are the sentiments of The News after a careful consideration of all the questions at issue in the six proposed amendments to our State Constitution.






