Cesspools and Other Nuisances.

Several of our nabor towns re port numerous fever cases, mostly typhoid. The chief cause for this dangerous disease is impure water, cesspool, pit or other foul places in which breed the typhoid germ and out of which come sickness or death.

Up to the present Canyon City has been remarkably fortunate with reference to typhoid and other slow fevers for this year, Only two cases, one that of I. L. Hunt now nearly well, and the other that of Harry Upfold still down with it, has so far come to the knowledge of The News. This is an excellent showing for a town of 1500 population, no other town on the Plains can do sowell, but with our natural advantages we ought to, and can do even better, if we will. Abate the cesspool and other like nui sances and the thing is done; continue them and an epidemic is almost a sure thing.






More of the Ships Ordered to the Pacific Ocean Under Admirai Evans.




