Even Ministers and Teachers Subject to Indictment.
It seems not to be. generally known that a law came intoeffect Sept. 1, 1907, requiring "Church es, schools, opera houses moving
picture shows, hospitals, hotels picture shows, hospitals, hotels, boarding houses, restaurants, meat markets bakeries, confec
tioneries," and all public build tioneries, and all public build-
ings of every kind to be swept daily as used. And to kill disease germs, and keep down dust sease germs, and keep down dust
floors must be sprinkled before sweeping with a disinfectant solution approved by the State makesall "teachers,"" ministers" "stewards," "trustees,"officers", agents, managers" owners"
et al., "severally and jointly responsible," "guilty of a misde meanor," and subject to a pen alty of $\$ 50$ to $\$ 200$ for noncompliance. Ask your county attor ney or health ofticer.
N. B. Don't misunderstand us. We are not going about filing complaints against those who violate the law. Our business is the drug business, but the de
