#### GRAPE AS A MEDICINE.

In Switzerland grape leaves are much used as a remedy for cuts and fresh wounds. Decoctions of the juice of grape leaves are used in poultices. An agreeable tea is also made from the leaves, which is said to greatly strengthen the nerves. The leaves are also excellent food for cows, hogs and sheep. The "ears" of the vine (used medicinally) are a transparent sap discharged from the pores of the vine at the time the plant begin budding, and are found where the slightest wound occurs to the plant. The liquid is collected by cutting off the ends of the canes, bending them down, and sticking the ends into the neck of a bottle, which will be filled in a few days.

#### New Courthouse Election Ordered.

On petition of two hundred and seventeen citizens of Randall county, the Commissioners' court, in regular session this week, ordered an election for Saturday, December 14th, to determine whether or no Randall county should be bonded for the purpose of building a new court house. The proposition to be voted on provides for the issuance of not exceeding fifty-three thousand dollars in 4 per cent county bonds of \$1,000 each and to run for forty years, option reserved by the county to redeem them in ten years.
