The state law requires all phy sicians to report births and deaths to the county clerk. There is a penalty for failure to do so. Physicians so far have been slow to comply in this particular and now State Health Officer, Brumby, is out with a letter saying that this law must be complied with. Addressing the physicians of Texas, under date of February 8, he says;
