Students Plan for Science Fair

Science minded students in the Dimmitt schools are finding new incentive to delve deeper into their science courses through annual "science fairs."

The school's Science Department is sponsoring the Third Annual Science Fair where talented science students may display and receive recognition for their work. It will be held February 29 through March 4 in the Dimmitt Junior High School Building.

Students may choose projects from the biological, the physical, the physiological, or the mathematical field. They are classified according to age and grade into four divisions: the primary division for children from the first through the fourth grades, the intermediate for those in grades four through six, the Junior division for grades seven through nine, and the Senior division for the tenth through the twelfth grades.

Students must have their exhibits, which display and explain their projects ready and set up by Monday, February 29. The judging takes place that afternoon and evening. Judges consider these points in making their selections:

1. Scientific thought — 30 points
2. Creative ability — 30 points
3. Thoroughness — 10 points
4. Clarity and dramatic value — 20 points
5. Technical skill — 10 points

Each exhibitor and room participating is given an entry ribbon. The judges award ribbons for first, second, third places and honorable mention in each division in each level. Special awards, called Star Awards, are given to the best exhibits in each division, allowing them to compete in the Panhandle Science Fair in Amarillo.

Bids Awarded For City Water And Sewer Work

In a recent meeting of the Dimmitt City Commission, bids were accepted for city work to be done under provisions of a bond election held last year.

To Gobett Brothers Steel Co. of Fort Worth was awarded a \$19,250.00 contract for a 1/2-million gallon steel water ground storage unit. This bid was well below all other bids. Concrete type ground storage unit bids ran well above those of the steel companies.

The M. B. McGee Company of Lubbock was awarded a \$12,003.44 contract for tying in wells and booster pumps and other miscellaneous water equipment work. The same company was also low bidder for improvements and expansions of the local sewage disposal plant. This contract amounts to \$50,943.04.

Cast iron pipe for sewer line improvements was also arranged for through bidding. Lone Star Steel of Davenport won the bid with \$8,138 for 1,800 feet of 8-inch cast iron pipe and 900 feet of 6-inch pipe.

Dimmitt Ready Mix bid low for the concrete work involved in building the ground storage unit. They bid \$1,952.

Work begins on all phases of the sewer and water improvements as soon as weather permits. However there will be a delay to June on sewer construction since the city must wait on a \$15,000 federal grant to help pay for this work. This is a grant under Public Law 660.

The Nippers will take over the cafe operation on February 1.

For the past eight years the victim had been a welder for a steel company in Plainview and commuted from Dimmitt to Plainview.

Services were conducted Monday in the Groves Community. Hobratschck is survived by his wife; a daughter, Betty Gayle, student at the Methodist Hospital Nursing School in Lubbock and Martin Gler and Larry Don, both of the home.

He was a member of the Lutheran Church in Hereford. The family has lived in Dimmitt for the last 12 years.

R. Paul Smith, a minister of the Fourth and Bedford Street Church of Christ, has been named to the Advisory and Development Board of Lubbock Christian College. A graduate of Abilene Christian College, Smith worked for S. H. Kress and Company before entering the ministry. His work now is concerned primarily with the Bible School and personal work of the church.

Gilbreath Says Wichita Feedgrain Conference Pessimistic Of New Law

Thirty-five directors and leaders of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, from ten counties of the High Plains, met in Tulsa, Thursday, January 14th. The group reviewed the Association's past year's activities and mapped plans for the 1960 program of research, market development and service to be conducted in interest of area grain sorghum.

The directors authorized R. G. Peeler of Hereford and their executive officer, Bill Nelson of Amarillo to attend meetings of the National Conference of Commodity Organizations which are being held in Washington later this month. Since the 1959 price supports have not been announced for feedgrains, it is expected that the pair will confer with United States Department of Agriculture and legislative officials urging an early announcement of the support prices and that they will plead for a more equitable relationship between the price of grain sorghum and other feedgrains in 1960.

Davenport In Precinct 1 Race For Commissioner

I will also do my best to be a capable, efficient Commissioner, placing major importance on the needs and desires of the residents of Precinct 1."

Each of these large jars containing the plantlife that a particular animal is adapted to will eventually be sealed off and the oxygen the plants give off will keep the animals alive and the carbon dioxide the animals give off will keep the plants alive.

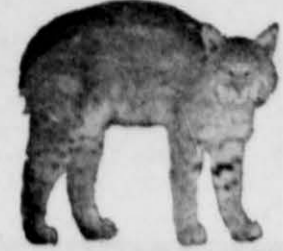

"That they also may be one in God, that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." (John 17:21)

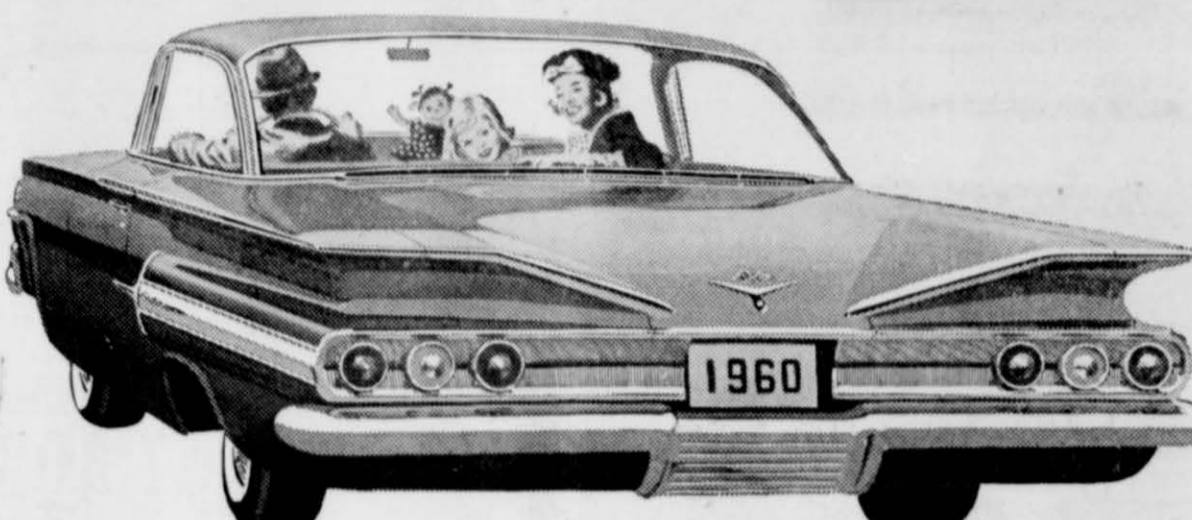

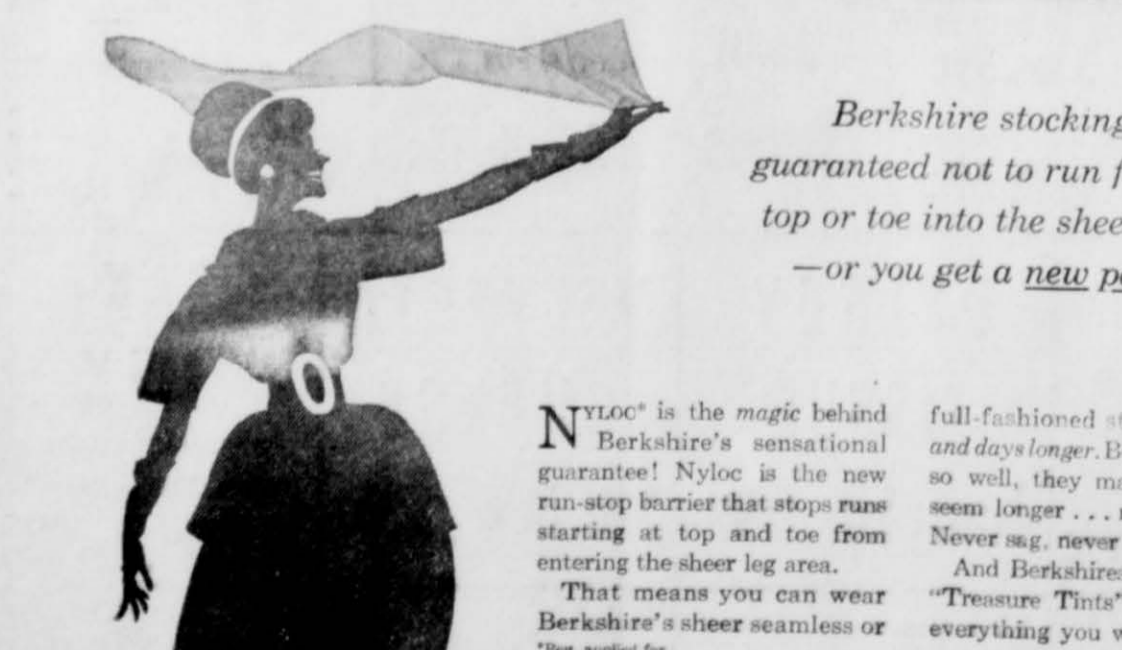

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

People seem interested in the way writers work.

Jack London used to write 1,000 words a day. I have never been able to give myself a regular assignment like that. I once wrote 6,000 words of a book in one day. Another time, I wrote 50,000 words of a book in four weeks.

The actual time consumed in writing one of these "columns" is about 10 minutes—as you probably guessed, for no doubt, they read like that. But there is first the jotting down of notes as they happen to come to mind. These notes are accumulated and then, in the course of a day, eight or ten "columns" may be written—and then no more for several weeks.

One Saturday Evening Post article was written on a single Sunday afternoon; and another was written some months later, also on a Sunday afternoon. "Tall Talk from Texas," which was fortunate enough to sell 90,000 copies, was written in the space of nine days but actually about a week of working time. These nine days, however, were preceded by 24 years of listening to Texans tell stories about Texas.

The writing is done on a pad of "news print," usually with a twice folded newspaper and a knee serving as a desk, in long-hand, with a throw-away ball-point pen (I most always have three of these), sometimes on a train, in a hotel lobby, in a bus waiting-room, on a park bench, even in a cafe while waiting for dinner.

When Tom Campbell was governor, he displeased many East Texas property owners with his "full rendition" law, so some of them encouraged the "Cumbly blacksmith," Bob Williams to announce against Campbell when he asked a second term.

Williams did not make an active campaign and made only one speech. In fact, if he had not made the speech, he might have been elected, tradition says. However, that is probably exaggerated as Campbell's margin was rather wide.

Someone once introduced Pat Neff as "ex-Governor Neff," to which he quickly rejoined, "No—an 'ex' is one who was defeated; a 'former' is one who retired—former Governor," please.
