H. J. R. No. 10 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensaion Fund for the appointive ofcers and employees of the State; fimiting the amount contributed by the State to such fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting re-cipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to pro-vide and administer such a Fund for ntive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; imiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas e amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as fol-

Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the mount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the ensation paid to each person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) HOSPITAL NEWS for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such ment, Disability and Death ed by the Treasurer of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the prin-cipal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States 28,. of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due due each year out of said Fund, en hand to be determined by the kept on hand to be determined by agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of ben-efits from said Fund shall not be of benefits from said Fund shall tirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

One county office was contested, that of Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector, with the incumbent, Garland Brown, amassing 802 vot s, while the other two candidates for the office received a total of 444 votes, with John Broadstreet get- Olton ting 246 votes and Claude Duran 198. 
