

## SEVEN BISHOPS ARE SELECTED.

Mouzen is One of Them.—Long Time a Minister of the Gospel and Has Been the Pastor of Prominent Churches.

Quadrennial conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has elected seven additional bishops, as follows:

Rev. Drs. Collins Denny, John C. Kilgo, W. B. Murrah, McCoy (of Birmingham, Ala.), W. R. Lambuth, E. D. Mouzen and R. G. Waterhouse.

Rev. Edwin D. Mouzen, D. D., was born in Spartanburg, S. C., May 19, 1869. He entered the ministry in 1889. Graduating the same year from Wofford college with high honors he received the B. A. degree and went to Texas. His first pastoral charge was Bryan. Since then he has served successfully and successively the Twenty-fourth Street church; Austin; First church, Galveston; First church, Abilene; First church, Fort Worth; Central church, Kansas City, Missouri; and Travis Park church, San Antonio.

In 1905 he received degree of doctor of divinity at Southwestern university and in 1907 he was elected dean of the theological department of the same, which position he has since held. Dr. Mouzen is regarded as one of the greatest platform and pulpit orators of the South.

## WEST TEXAS STATE NORMAL COLLEGE CORNERSTONE LAID WITH MASONIC CEREMONY

### Hon. W. H. Fuqua of Amarillo Pays Fitting Compliment to Our City in Principal Address of Day

In the course of human events and what in the future will be considered as the most important occurrence in the history of the Panhandle educational matters took place on Tuesday of last week in this city with the laying of the corner stone of the West Texas State Normal College, which occurred at 11:15 a. m., and under the auspices of the local Masonic Lodge and assisted by some fifteen or more lodges from the Panhandle country, of which the largest delegation of the Masonic fraternity came from Amarillo. The impressive ceremonies will be long remembered by all present, besides being witnessed by one of the largest gatherings that was ever assembled in this city. The local Masonic lodge may justly feel proud of this great and magnanimous occasion.

It not only marks a new era for the Panhandle country, from the passing of the Plains country to, like Athens, a seat of learning. Headed by a brass band and some five hundred Masons in line, joined in a parade leading from their Castle hall, northeast corner of the court house square, to the site of the West Texas State Normal College campus, every phrase of the exercise moved with exact precision.

Following the ceremony of the cornerstone setting, there was a masterly address delivered by Hon. W. H. Fuqua of Amarillo and was concurred by all present to be important, very impressive and appropriate and was as follows:

#### MY FRIENDS:

It is a great pleasure to be with you here on this memorable occasion. We commence a new book from this particular hour for this portion of the State. Laying the foundation of this institution marks an epoch in the history and life of this section.

It marks the first recognition this Plains country has ever received at the hands of the State.

Heretofore, the State has only taken notice of us for the purpose of exacting tribute or collecting taxes. But the building of this institution is notice to all the world that we are henceforth to be a part of the life and thought, as well as part of the domain of imperial Texas.

#### BEGINNING OF NEW AND LARGER INTELLECTUAL AND SPIRITUAL LIFE.

It works the beginning of a new and larger intellectual and spiritual life for this great Panhandle country. This institution will make known as no other means would make known, the superiority of this great western plateau for intellectual activities.

Our physical elevation produces an intellectual and spiritual elevation and exhilaration that no low country can know—a circumstance that has caused both secular and sacred history in every age to point to the mountain districts, the high altitudes, as the birth place and native home of genius and great talents.

#### PUBLIC SCHOOLS, COLLEGES; CLIMATIC CONDITION.

While our people have not been unmindful of the benefits of education, as is evident by the public schools that characterize all our towns, and the thriving Denominational Institutions that flourish at Canadiana, Goodnight, Plainview, Tulia, Clarendon, Hereford and elsewhere, our intellectual and social life has been greatly hampered and suffered much by our isolation from other portions of the state. The founding of this institution marks the beginning of the end of this condition. We cannot send our youth down into the lower southern climates to educate them. We cannot even successfully ship our horses and cattle to those climates, much less our boys and girls. But this institution will teach our fellow men in southern and eastern portions of the state that this is the section of the

state which God has created and nature has marked for the home of the School; that here the school can run for ten months in the year without bringing one pupil to that state of lassitude and weariness which destroys ambition, dissipates inspiration, and annihilates intellectual ardor.

#### TEACHERS AND STUDENTS GATHER FOR SUMMER NORMAL.

We expect before many years have passed to see gathered within the walls of this institution every summer, hundreds of teachers and students from less favored portions of Texas, seeking at the same time recuperation for tired nerves and exhausted bodies, an inspiration for listless and wearied minds. We expect that the fame of this institution will spread itself abroad throughout the length and breadth of the land, till its summer sessions, like the summer school at Knoxville in the Tennessee mountains, will have an attendance of more than two thousand people, gathered from the West and this entire land of ours; returning to their homes as the autumnal equinox comes on, full of enthusiasm and praise for this matchless climate and cloudless skies, and the irresistible buoyancy and health and life and vigor that sweep around in the pure life-giving ozone of our limitless plains.

#### GREAT DAY FOR PANHANDLE; THIS INSTITUTION WILL BRING OTHERS.

This is a great day for the Panhandle of Texas, and here and now let us all acknowledge we owe a debt of gratitude to the pluck and enterprise of this little city in bringing this institution to our doors. It is bound to be the forerunner of many such institutions. It is the promise of a larger and better life for our own people, and of a closer touch and relation with the older and wealthier communities of this great Commonwealth of ours.

#### LOCATING NORMAL FOR PANHANDLE.

There is no "pent up Utica" about the Plainsman, while I worked for the location of this institution in my home city, yet I would not play the "dog in the

manger"; I never was one of those who would drive the institution away from this section unless my own town could have it. My platform during the contest was,—the Normal for the Panhandle—for Amarillo, if possible but if not then for some other eligible Panhandle town. Now, that you have won the great prize, I congratulate the citizenship of Canyon City and Randall county upon their notable success, and do so with all my heart. You made a clean fight, you deserved to win, and you won. That is the whole story, and you have my congratulations and good wishes; nay, more, you have my earnest solicitude for the realization of your best hopes in the largest possible success of this great institution.

#### PRESIDENT OF THE NORMAL.

You have every reason to expect success. The gentleman who takes place at the head of the institution is a man of notable achievements in the educational world. He resigned the position that made him the official head of the educational system of the state of Texas, to take the leadership of this enterprise. We heartily welcome him to our section, and we should ever extend our appreciative welcome to men of high character and worthy deeds.

We hope for him the highest measure of success which his talents and his efforts may deserve. In so saying, I but reflect the sentiment and speak the wishes of all the great Panhandle country.

#### FREE MASONRY.

May I say in conclusion that it is entirely fitting and eminently proper that the ancient and honorable order of Free Masonry, more ancient than the Golden Fleece or Roman Eagle; more honorable than the Star and Garter, or any other order instituted by king or prince or potentate, or any other person except he be a Mason, should be represented in the ceremonies we are assembled to witness here today.

Now this Grand Order which sprang from the Divinely given wisdom of King Solomon and descended to us unstained through all the vicissitudes of the centuries, out living King Solomon and his Temple itself, and all the works of his contemporaries, has laid many a corner stone—in edifices now grown old and covered with moss and ivy, and honor and renown,—but never one erected for nobler purposes or in whose fate was involved more solemn or far reaching responsibilities.

#### CONCLUSION.

Let us take courage from this hour. Some have worked long and hard, and grown old in the face of many depressing and discouraging adversities for the development and upbuilding of this splendid country; but the day is breaking and the hour of a universally recognized success is not far ahead.

Let us here and now renew our courage, strengthen our faith, and pledge again not only our lives and fortunes, but also our Sacred honor to the welfare and glory of the matchless Panhandle Country, and grand old Lone Star State.

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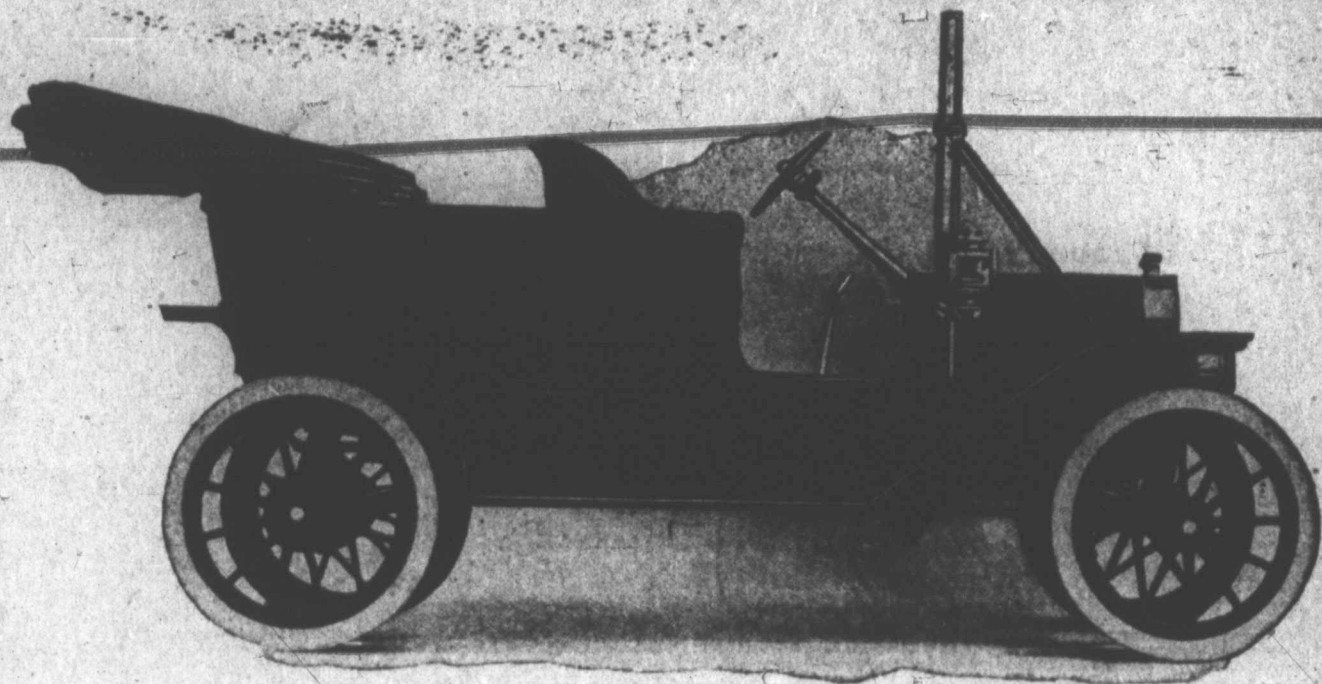

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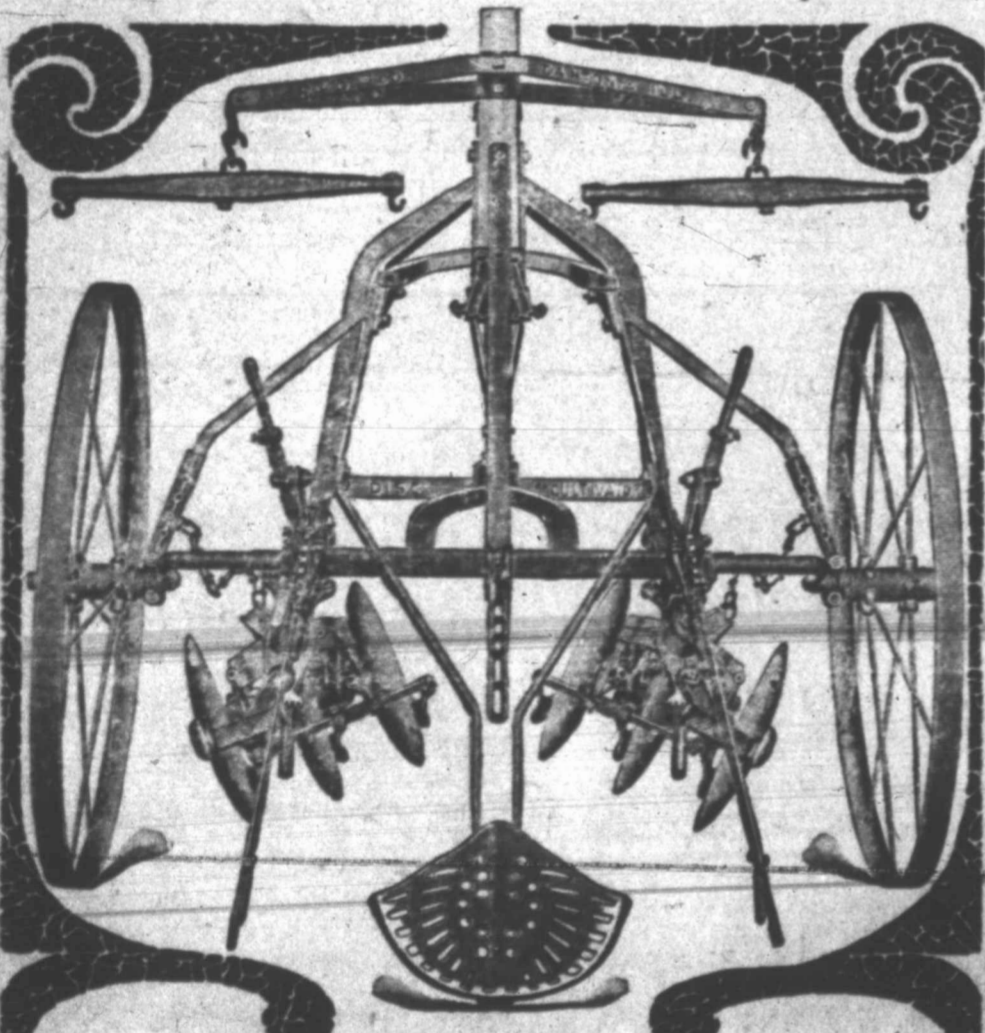

**PANHANDLE.**

**A Day of Blood.**

In his trail skinboat it is a difficult and dangerous task for the Eskimo to go out to sea forty to sixty miles and intercept the walrus, as he passes on his migration into the Arctic.

One carcass will fill his boat, for it weighs from 1,000 to 3,000 pounds. He hunts the walrus when they are lying asleep on the ice-floes, in herds from ten to several hundred. Death must be instantaneous, else with a few rolls or the peculiar lumbering, humping movement (seen of the seal when ashore), he makes the few feet to the water and then is lost, for he has not sufficient blubber and air to float. He has much natural curiosity, and if not scared by shots will come up close to your boat or ice-floe on which you are sitting, spurling, snorting, and rolling his eyes; with his gleaming tusks and bristled snout he has an uncanny, goblin-monster-like appearance. A herd of fifty or sixty of them will come up en masse, raise high out of the water to stare at you, then snort, spurt, and disappear again, only to come up on the same spot and repeat the manoeuvre indefinitely. Taking advantage of this the Eskimos hide behind ice hammocks and throw a harpoon into one, then snub the tough rawhide line around an ice cake. He must perforce come up to blow and he is then killed with the rifle. The thick skin and the mass of blubber and meat beneath renders him almost invulnerable.—Captain F. E. Kleinschmidt, in the June Pacific Monthly.

With a new fire pump of greater capacity, the pressure can be increased to any degree. The plant was turned over to the city on Wednesday afternoon so nothing remains to be done but deal with the city if you wish to be a water consumer.

Sewer Ordinance

An ordinance regulating the tapping of the sewer system and cess pools of the city of Canyon City, Texas, regulating house draining and plumbing, providing for the protection of public sewers, providing for the collection of fees for using the public sewer, prescribing penalties for the violation of this ordinance, creating the office of Sewer and Plumbing Inspector and fixing his fee and prescribing his duties, term of office, and other matters connected with plumbing and sanitary sewers.

**ARTICLE SECTION 1.** Be it ordained by the City Council of Canyon City, Texas, in Council assembled: That the sanitary sewers and water works of the city of Canyon City, Texas, shall be under the supervision of the Sewer and Plumbing Inspector and it shall be his duty to see that the provisions of this ordinance relative to sewer tapping, plumbing and drainage are strictly carried out, and he shall receive such fees or compensation as shall hereinafter be prescribed. The office of Sewer and Plumbing Inspector is hereby created, and when such inspector is appointed to said office, and executes a bond as herein below, he shall hold his office for a term of two years, unless sooner removed therefrom as may be done as herein after provided.

**SECTION 2.** Every owner of a building or portion of a building used for any purpose during any part of the day or night, where a toilet or closet is, or should be placed, and situated in any block in the city of Canyon City, to, or into which, or within 80 feet of which block a public sewer may extend, and having no water closet or privy connection with said sewer, shall, within not to exceed 30 days after notice shall have been given him or his agent by the Mayor, either in person or through the City Marshal, put up within said building used as aforesaid, or upon the premises where the same is situated; a water closet or privy, and connect the same with the sewer. The closet or privy and all work done in connection therewith, and all material used, shall comply strictly with the requirements of this ordinance. In all cases where a privy or water closet is now or may hereafter be connected with the public sewer or cess pool, the owner controlling the same, or his agent shall cause such privy or water closet to be supplied with water for flushing which shall be delivered from a tank, the bottom of which must be not less than 18 inches above the floor line, and the tank shall hold not less than four gallons of water, and shall be arranged to deliver not less than four gallons of water at each flushing of the closet, and to refill with water at a pressure of not less than fifteen pounds to the square inch; provided that frost-proof closets with automatic cut-off will be allowed in closets outside of buildings. The water shall be conducted from the tank to the bowl of the privy or closet through a circular metallic pipe not less than one and one-fourth inches in diameter, and when delivered at such bowl, the water shall have a pressure of not less than three pounds to the square inch. Provided however, that lowdown tanks may be used with 2 inch connections between tank and bowl. Every person being the owner or part owner, or the agent thereof, a building or a part of building having no water closet or privy connected with the public sewer, which building or a part of a building is used for any purpose during any part of a day or night, and which is situated in any block in Canyon City, to or into which, or within 80 feet of which a public sewer extends, who shall fail after thirty days notice being given by the Mayor, either in person or through the City Marshal, to put up within such building or part of building or upon the premises used in con-

nection therewith, a water closet or privy, and connect the same with the public sewer, and every owner or part owner, or the agent thereof, of the building or part of building having a water closet or privy connected with the public sewer, who shall fail to supply such water closet or privy with water for flushing at a pressure of not less than three pounds to the square inch, flowing through a metallic pipe not less than one and one-fourth inches in diameter, except as herein before provided, shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than five or more than ten dollars for each and every offence, and every separate day during which the provisions hereof are violated shall be a separate offence.

**SECTION 3.** It shall be unlawful for the owner or occupants of any building or premises within this city to use or permit anyone else to use any privy or water closet on such premises that is connected with the sewer system of the city unless the same shall be used in connection with sufficient water flowing into the sewer to keep the pipes connecting such privy or water closet with the sewers free from obstruction; and any one violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars, and each day that the provision of this section is violated shall be construed a separate offence.

**SECTION 4.** No person shall uncover the public sewer for any purpose or make any connection therewith, or uncover or make any connections with the public connection branches thereof, without a permit from the Sewer and Plumbing Inspector. Applications for permits shall be made in writing to the Sewer and Plumbing Inspector by the proper owner or his authorized agent, upon blanks furnished by the city of Canyon City. Such application shall give the name of the owner, and the name of the plumber employed to do the work, and shall be accompanied by a drawing showing the proposed work in detail, satisfactory to the city inspector of plumbing, said drawing to be filed in with ink, and giving block number and lot number and the location of the connection with the public sewer. Said application and drawing shall be made in four copies and filed with the City Inspector of Plumbing one day previous to the commencement of the work. One copy of said application shall, if approved by the Inspector, be delivered back to the owner or his agent. One copy shall be delivered to the plumber doing the work. One copy shall be delivered to the city secretary, and one copy retained by the city inspector of sewer and plumbing. Any person commencing or doing any work specified in this section without first having filed the application and drawing and secured the permit as required herein, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

**SECTION 5.** House drains within and to a distance of five feet outside the exterior wall of a building shall be standard cast iron soil pipe, said pipe caulked with oakum and molten lead, and to have a uniform fall, and not less than four inches in diameter, laid in trenches of uniform grade, and when above ground shall be suspended to joists by strong iron pipe hooks. All drain pipes that are not at least six inches under the grade shall be standard cast iron soil pipe. All changes in direction of pipe line shall be made with Y and one-eighth bend.

**SECTION 6.** All soil pipes in buildings must be standard soil pipes and shall extend two feet above highest opening in building and be caulked with oakum and molten lead. Provided however that in all buildings three or more

stories high extra heavy soil pipe and fittings shall be used to the highest fixture.

**SECTION 7.** All vent pipes must extend at least two feet above the highest opening in building, or in case of no independent pipe, connect into soil pipe at not less than 1 ft. above highest fixture, and in no case shall any vent pipe terminate in or be lead through a chimney or flue, but wherever practical must be carried up inside the house. They shall be run as direct as possible and forty-five degree L's used at all times when practicable.

**SECTION 8.** Connection of lead to iron pipes shall be made of brass ferrules wiped to the lead pipe, caulked or screwed to the iron pipes, and wiped to lead pipes.

**SECTION 9.** All traps or bends, used shall be of manufacturer's list known as "light." All traps of water closets shall be back vented with not less than one and one-half inch pipe for pipe twenty feet, not less than two inches beyond twenty feet, provided the last fixture on the line need not be back vented if not more than five feet from the stack. A group of three to five water closets must have not less than three inches vent, and above five, must be not less than four inch soil pipe.

**SECTION 10.** Vent pipes from all fixtures except water closets shall not be less size than one and one-fourth inches; and when more than one fixture connects into the same vent, it shall be not less than two inches, and connections must be made at least one foot above highest fixture.

**SECTION 11.** All connections to vent pipe must be made with lead or brass pipes, joined as specified in section seven, and there shall be a trap screw of suitable size in all S or P traps wiped into it not more than six inches above.

**SECTION 12.** Vent pipes must, in all cases, be of cast iron or lead or galvanized wrought iron pipe of standard weight with galvanized or cast iron fittings.

**SECTION 13.** Wrought iron pipe shall not be used as a waist pipe for any fixture.

**SECTION 14.** No soil, drain, or vent pipe shall be covered or concealed from view until after the work has been tested, examined and approved by the city sewer and plumbing inspector, the plumber shall notify the city sewer and plumbing inspector in writing when the work is ready for said sewer and plumbing inspector to make proper and thorough test of same, by the plumber filling said pipe with water to highest point or with air pressure of not less than five pounds to the square inch.

**SECTION 15.** Every water closet shall be supplied with water from a separate siphon flushing tank or cistern, and no flush pipe for same shall be less than one and one-fourth inches.

**SECTION 16.** Water closets must be glazed earthenware or iron enameled all exposed, the wood work to consist of seat and back only. In no instance shall any wood casing be allowed.

**SECTION 17.** No pan closet, long hopper, plunger or front wash out closets with direct supply of any kind, no closet not having the walls flushed at each discharge, shall be used. Long hoppers will not be allowed except in outhouses. No closets without ventilating space will be allowed inside of building.

**SECTION 18.** Waste pipes from all fixtures shall be lead or cast iron and not less than the following sizes, to-wit: For bath tubs, one and one-fourth inches; laundry tubs, sinks and urinals, one and one-half inches; wash basin, one and one-fourth inches; slop hoppers and water closets, four inches; provided that in resident slop hoppers 2 inch pipe may be used.

**SECTION 19.** Drip or overflow pipes from safes under water closets or other fixtures or from tanks or cisterns, shall in no case be connected directly with the

drainage system, but shall be run to some open place in plain sight. If run to outside of building, they must have safe waste valves.

**SECTION 20.** No steam exhausts blow off or drip pipes shall be connected with house drains, soil, waste or vent pipes within any buildings but shall discharge into an open tank or condenser from which a safe connection to the sewer outside building may be made.

**SECTION 21.** Each and every fixture having a waste pipe shall be separately and independently trapped with a waste water ceiling trap, as near the fixture as practicable, and each trap shall be protected from siphonage and air pressure by a special vent pipe. Provided, however, that a drum trap of size 4x8 inches or more connecting with the waste pipe with a vertical drop of not less than 12 feet, and provided further that said drum trap has a water seal of 2-1-2 inches, need not be vented. Waste from bath tubs, wash trays and kitchen sinks shall be connected to a drum trap acceptable to the sewer and plumbing inspector. Every where practicable the waste pipes from fixtures shall enter the soil pipes at a point beyond the lead bend. Waste pipes from kitchen sinks in any hotel, restaurant, boarding house or other public cooking establishment, shall run separate to a grease trap in yard when practicable, and when the same is not practicable, to put in yard, a grease trap must be placed below each sink, with water jacket to keep the water in grease trap chilled. In no case shall waste from such kitchen sinks connect the house drains or soil pipes, except the same be protected by grease trap below sink or in yard as above described. Grease traps in yard shall be no less than 36 inches deep and 24 inches in diameter for hotels and restaurants, and shall be made of vitrified clay, salt glazed brick or concrete with concrete bottom not less than three inches thick. Grease traps under sinks shall be not less than twelve inches deep and eighteen inches in diameter, and shall be made of cast iron or brass.

**SECTION 22.** Waste pipes for refrigerators or other receptacles shall not be connected directly with the drainage system, but can be run into some open sink or basement, in which case drainage pipes must be trapped.

**SECTION 23.** No sediments from boilers or stops and stop and waste, or any drained tubes shall be connected directly with any waste water or sewer unless connected above the trap or fixture and no rain water pipe shall be connected with the sewer or house drainage system.

**SECTION 24.** Soil water pipes placed in any building for future use shall be ventilated and subjected to same rules in every respect as if intended for immediate use, and all openings closed by screw plug or caulked in or soldered.

**SECTION 25.** Each sewer connection with lateral must have one cast iron pipe for ventilation, not less than four inches in diameter for closets, and two inches for all other sewer work, carried not less than two feet above highest opening of building, except outdoor closets which vent may be two inches.

**SECTION 26.** All drain pipes from house to sewer must be vitrified clay or cast iron pipe, laid to a uniform grade to the satisfaction of the sewer and plumbing inspector, with joints of clay pipe cemented with the best Portland cement, and cast iron pipe caulked with oakum and molten lead.

**SECTION 28.** Every fixture must have separate traps or prescribed size placed as near fixture as possible.

**SECTION 29.** All joints on lead or between lead and brass must be wiped with solder joints.

**SECTION 30.** After all the plumbing in any building, out-

houses, or plumbing whatsoever is completed according to the rules, regulations and ordinance of the city of Canyon City, and to the satisfaction of the sewer and plumbing inspector, a certificate to this effect shall be issued to the plumber doing the work, a copy of which shall be kept in the office of the sewer and plumbing inspector.

**SECTION 31.** These rules for plumbing shall not apply to extensions of other work to be done in connection with plumbing or house drains in old buildings where the present plumbing is in a sanitary condition, except in cases where an entire remodeling of the plumbing work is done or the entire new fixture is placed such as bath tub, urinal, water closet, sink, wash basin, etc., and then the owner or person having such work done shall be allowed to use so much of the old material as is already attached to the building and in good condition, and the extensions or alterations shall not be proceeded with until approved by the sewer and plumbing inspector and a permit issued for the same.

**SECTION 32.** There shall be three tests make by the sewer and plumbing inspector as soon as practicable after notification by the plumber, in writing, when work is ready for inspection, as follows: First, the sewer, after it is laid and joined and before it is covered; second, the soil and vent pipes as per rules governing the same; third, on completion of the entire work. Above applies on new work in buildings. One inspection will cover out house closets, and two inspections will cover house plumbing where there is not a water closet connected.

**SECTION 33.** All sewer plumbing and connections must be done and made by a competent plumber; and any person or persons, other than competent plumbers, who shall make any extensions or alterations to the sewer plumbing work, in or about any premises, or who shall put in any fixture which is connected with the public sewer, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars for each offence.

**SECTION 34.** Any plumber failing to perform his work in conformity with the above and foregoing rules adopted by the City Council of Canyon City, shall be reported to the Mayor's or Corporation Court of the city of Canyon City, by the sewer and plumbing inspector and upon conviction thereof such plumber shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars, and shall forfeit his permit.

**SECTION 35.** Any person intending to follow the business or occupation of plumber in relation to or in any way connected with the sewer system, its mains, laterals, pipes, fixtures, cess pools, etc., shall, before undertaking any work in connection therewith, first apply to the sewer and plumbing inspector, in writing, for a permit; which permit shall not be granted by the sewer and plumbing inspector unless said applicant submits to said sewer and plumbing inspector satisfactory evidence of his qualification to properly do such work. The fee for such examination shall be three dollars, and shall be paid to the sewer and plumbing inspector at the time application is made. If the said sewer and plumbing inspector elects to grant said license, the said sewer and plumbing inspector may first require said applicant to enter into a bond in the sum of \$100.00 with two or more good and sufficient sureties to be approved by him, and conditioned that such plumber shall hold the sewer and plumbing inspector harmless from any and all damages of whatsoever kind, resulting from negligence or unskillful work on the part of such plumber or his employees, and that he will abide

by the rules and regulations made by the city in regard to plumber's work. The above bond shall be made payable to the said inspector and his successors in office and shall be renewed every year, and failure to renew the said bond, as above required or demanded, shall of itself act as a revocation of any permit granted to him.

**SECTION 36.** Every pipe connected with the sewer, whether of cast iron or earthen ware, must be sound and impervious in all its parts. No trap or any manner of obstruction to the free flow of air through the whole course of the soil and drain pipe, except as otherwise provided herein, will be allowed, and any plumber who shall directly or indirectly, place, make or cause, or allow to be placed or made, any trap or other obstacle anywhere in such pipe, except as provided herein, in addition to the penalty hereinafter prescribed, shall pay the cost of rectifying the wrong.

**SECTION 37.** It shall be unlawful for any person to use or cause to be used any house drain for any purpose or purposes other than those specified in this ordinance relating thereto, and any person so doing shall be subject to the penalty hereinafter specified.

**SECTION 38.** It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or deposit in any vessel or receptacle connected with the public sewer any garbage, hair, ashes, fruit or vegetables, pealings or refuse, rags, cotton, cinders, or any other matter or thing whatever except faeces, urine, liquid, house slop and water, and only the necessary closet paper which shall be tissue paper, may be used.

**SECTION 39.** It shall be unlawful for any person to allow any slop, wash or waste water of any kind to flow over or under the pavement or sidewalk of any street, or into any alley or under any house or any vacant lot.

**SECTION 40.** It shall be unlawful for any person to encumber, fill up or injure in any way any drain or sewer or any fixture or appurtenance thereof in or upon any street, alley or other public grounds in the city of Canyon City, or any such drains, sewer, or any fixture or appurtenance thereof belonging to the said city, with any substance or material whatever, except as herein provided.

**SECTION 41.** All grease traps provided for in Section 21 of this ordinance, shall be thoroughly cleaned at least twice each week or oftener, if needed, by the city scavenger or property owner.

**SECTION 42.** Any person violating any of the provisions of the foregoing six sections of this ordinance, to-wit: Sections 36, 37, 38, 39, 40 and 41, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed one hundred dollars.

**SECTION 43.** It shall be the duty of every owner of any building or portion of a building situated on any block to or into which, or within 80 feet of which the public sewer may extend, to connect all wash or slop stands or sinks in the house or yard with the public sewer and to put in sinks or wash, or slop stands, within thirty days after having been given notice to do so by the Mayor, either in person or through the City Marshal, and such notice may be given to the owner or his agent. A failure to comply with the provision of this section by the owner or his agent shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, such owner or agent having control of such premises, shall be fined not less than five, nor more than ten dollars for each offense, and every separate day that such failure so occurs after expiration of the notice as provided herein, shall constitute a separate offense.

**SECTION 44.** It shall be the duty of the sewer and plumbing

### Sewer Ordinance.

Continued from page 6.

inspector to inspect each and every job of sewer plumbing as called for in Section 22 hereof. Said inspector shall be entitled to a fee of 75 cents for each inspection made by him as called for in said Section 32, and said fee shall be paid in advance by the plumber. The sewer and plumbing inspector shall not be allowed to recommend any one plumber or show any preference.

SECTION 45. Every person having a connection with the public sewer shall pay to the city of Canyon City a fee of 25 cents per month for each closet while the premises are occupied. Provided any person paying six months in advance may get 10 per cent discount. Said fee shall be payable in advance on the first day of each month, and shall be collected by the city collector, who shall pay the same over to the treasurer to be credited to the sewer fund. The said fee shall be paid in all cases, by either the occupant, tenant, lessee or owner of the premises, each and all of whom shall be liable for such fee, and any person who is liable for such fee and who shall fail, refuse or neglect to pay the same within ten days after the same is due, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed fifty dollars for each offense, and in addition to the penalty herein prescribed, the city of Canyon City shall have lien upon the premises for said fees upon compliance with Article 542, Sayles' Texas Civil Statutes, which is hereby adopted as a part of this ordinance.

SECTION 46. The city of Canyon City may have any of the improvements made, where required to be made by the provisions of this ordinance, and the

cost of making such improvements shall constitute a lien upon the premises in favor of said city upon the city's compliance with Article 542, Sayles' Texas Civil Statutes, which is hereby referred to and made a part hereof.

SECTION 47. The provisions of this ordinance apply to the plumbing done where cess pools are used, the same as where connections are made with the sewer.

SECTION 48. The sewer and plumbing inspector, when appointed, before he enters upon his duties as such, shall execute a bond with at least two sufficient sureties, payable to Canyon City, in the sum of one thousand dollars, conditioned that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his office, and hold said city harmless from any and all damage that may occur on account of his negligence, want of skill or incompetency to discharge such duties. And he may be removed from office for any breach of such bond. Said sewer and plumbing inspector shall have the power of a policeman to arrest violators of the sewer and plumbing ordinance with or without warrant and carry them before the Mayor's court for trial, and for such services, shall have the same fees as are allowed the marshal or police.

SECTION 49. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

SECTION 50. All ordinances or part of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.
