SAVING SEED FOR NEXT YEAR. In order to raise a good crop it is absolutely essential that the farmer should have good seed to plant. Many farmers make the mistake of waiting until the moment they need sead and then plant the first thing they can fold us not experienced farmer poor crops in this section of the poor crops in this section of the oor could be ascribed on the
"Lilce begets like"-as
seed so will be the crop. It would be well for every Randall county farmer to follow the instruction of Mr. Neill, who spoke here last week, and to gather his seed from the field. Seed from a poor stalk will be poor every time. Seed from a stalk which has grown beside a
poor stalk will be poor. How are you to tell the nature and surroundings of the stalk on which your seed has grown un less you gather the seed in the field? Gathering seed in this manner allows the farmer to se lect heads from stalks which have suitable surroundings: it gives him a chance to get the head which has grown highest up on the stalk; he can see to it that the stalk has not grown by poor stalk and received soed every time.
The farmer owes it to himsel o take the time to look out after eed now. It will mean much me in tis felds spend a the rood stalks and retting the strong seed.
