RANDALL COUNTY ELECTION QUIET

VERY SMALL VOTE IS CAST TUESDAY AT POLLS.

For Governor Democrats Poll 191
Republicans 11 and Prohibitionists 12.

Election day Tuesday was a very quiet day in Randall county. In fact about half of the voters forgot to go to the polls, or stayed away intentionally. In precinct 1, in which Canyon is located, only 151 votes, out of 300 were cast. In the other precincts the same conditions existed. In the whole county only 215 voters went to the polls. Eleven straight republican votes were cast in the whole county, 11 prohibitionists, where they had a candidate, and the rest were democratic. The following is the result of the county vote:

DEMOCRATS CONTROL NEXT HOUSE BY 25

GREATEST DEMOCRATIC LANDSLIDE IN TWENTY YEARS.

Teddy Baeten in New York, Wilson is Elected, Harmon Still There, The House Democratic.

Tuesday witnessed the greatest democratic landslide since the election of 1892. The notable features were the election of a democratic house of representatives, the defeat of Roosevelt's man in New York, the election of Woodrow Wilson in New Jersey, the re-election of Harmon in Ohio and the great democratic gain in every state in the union. Several seats will be gained in the senate by the democrats, by not a majority.

DISTRICT COURT NOW IN SESSION

LARGE NUMBER OF CASES CONTINUED TO NEXT TERM.

Jury Cases Set for Later in the Term. A Number of Judgments Were Rendered This Week.

The District court met Monday morning and the following business transacted this week:

J. A. Osborne was fined \$25. for not appearing as a petit juror.

A large number of cases were called and the date of trial set for a time during the next three weeks.

J. M. Burkhalter vs. F. S. Berry et al was tried Wednesday and the plaintiff recovered against all of the defendants the land sued for in his petition; all the west half of Section 102, Block M9.

J. J. Lavery vs. Gus Gearing was dismissed on motion of the plaintiff.

First National Bank of Canyon vs. A. W. Wood was dismissed on motion of plaintiff.

A large number of cases were continued until the next term of court.

In the case, H. M. Eicker vs. V. D. Scott, judgment was given the plaintiff for \$2,265.92 with interest.

In case of T. Bowman et al vs. G. M. Brock, judgment was rendered for the plaintiffs.

E. M. Peeler vs. Robt. H. Young et al was tried Wednesday and judgment for \$722 with interest was given to plaintiff.

In the case, L. L. Monroe vs. Thornton Jones, judgment was given the plaintiff to the sum of \$6,249.65.

In the case, First National Bank of Canyon vs. James D. Hamlin, judgment of \$1,282. was given the plaintiff.

NORMAL 6. TOWN TEAM 0.

Local Eleven Meet on Normal Campus Monday in Interesting Game. Many Fumbles Made.

In a very hotly contested game of foot ball last Monday afternoon on the Normal gridiron, the Normal team beat the local scrub team 6 to 0. Not very many people were out to see this exhibition of this popular college sport, but these report that the game was very well played and the town eleven showed up in remarkable form, fighting their opponents for every inch of ground from the time the ball was kicked off to the second that time was called. The only touchdown was made in the second quarter after a long punt by the College, a fumble and quick recovery Cousins who planted the ball behind the coveted posts. He also kicked a beautiful goal, putting the ball squarely between the uprights.

The College boys tried the forward pass several times, but were unable to complete any of them, the telling gains being made by long end runs and line bucks. Harder played a hard, clean game, carrying the pigskin around the ends for long gains and making the most sensational advance of the game by his swiftness and ability to dodge tacklers. Rowan and Capt. Stal-nacker did effective work in line bucking, while the two Cousins boys, Cook and Harder were the leading ones to nail the town backs to the ground on clean tackles. Time after time the ball was advanced within striking distance of the town goal, only to be lost and sent back by a long punt by Connally.

The town team featured in fumbling but were lucky enough to recover the ball and only twice did they come near scoring. Connally, Terrill and Winder did good defensive work. The town boys hardly ever made the required ten yards and were compelled to kick.

On the whole the game was very exciting and hardly any squabbling done, and with a few minor bruises and losses of skin no one was hurt.

The basket ball goods of the Normal team has arrived and the boys expect to begin work soon. Joe Black, of this city, has been elected manager of the basket ball team.

NEWSPAPERS IN TROUBLE.

A special agent of the postoffice department is traveling around over the country dropping into newspaper offices when least expected to examine the subscription lists, to ascertain if the regulation requiring payment of subscriptions is being observed. Several newspapers have been in trouble and here is a case told by the Des Moines Capital. "Editor Fay of Lyons, Iowa, has been called to Washington City because his subscription list is not as well paid up as the law requires. He will have to explain to the government officials why he has not compelled his subscribers to pay up according to the postal rules. An inspector had visited him two months previously and his list was said to be pretty thor-

oughly paid up, but evidently it was not sufficiently so. It seems a little tough that country editors have to be hauled before the government under the charge of violating federal laws just because they do not keep eternally dunning their subscribers for the small sum they owe them on subscription but it is like the end of the world, no one knoweth when it cometh and no editor knows what day an inspector may drop in and ask to see his list. And if too many subscribers are behind on their papers it means trouble with the government. It puts an editor in such shape that he is compelled to force his collections unless he has an unusually prompt paying list of subscribers."

"The postal law is that no subscriber shall receive a weekly paper longer than one year on credit.

The News does not intend to be one of those who will be caught. Some of our subscribers are getting into a place, however, where they can have the paper no more, unless payment is made at once. No paper can afford to run the risk of having delinquents on its list. Uncle Sam is not a very easy fellow to have trouble with.

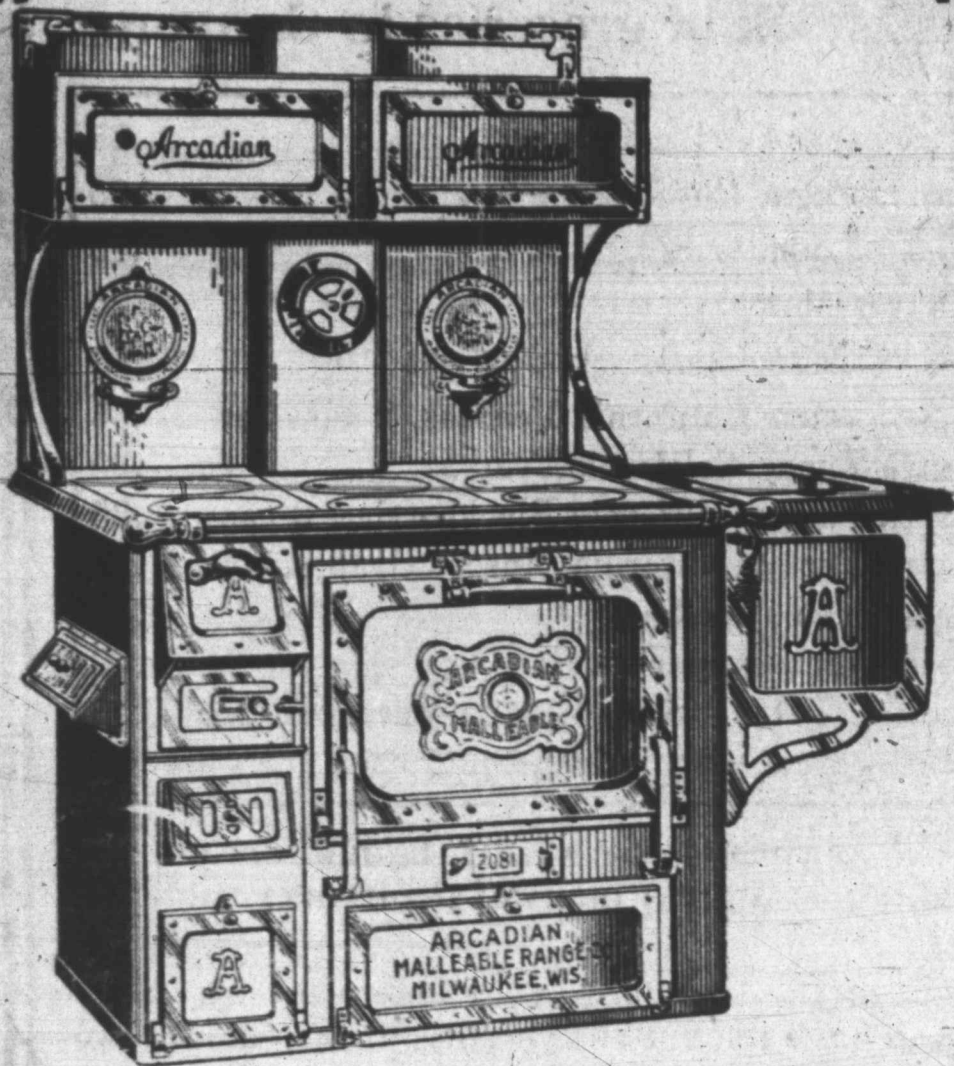

John Rusk.

The subject of this sketch was born near the town of LaFayette, Indiana, the 12th day of May, 1838. At the age of fifteen he moved with his parents to Illinois and settled close to Galesburg, where he lived for more than a quarter of a century. At the age of twenty he married Miss Meadow. Three children blessed this union: Gaylon, John Riley and Della Rusk, two of whom are still living. His wife died at the close of the civil war, in 1864.

In 1865 he married Mrs. Betty Smith. Seven children were born to this union, all of whom are still living.

At the outbreak of the civil war he enlisted in the Illinois Regiment, and served faithfully being promoted to the rank of colonel.

Colonel Rusk, at the close of the war, continued to live on his farm near Galesburg for a number of years, but in 1881 took Greeley's advice and came west, locating in Texas near Hico, Erath county where he farmed successfully for nine years, after which he saw the glories of the expanding Plains of Texas, and burning all bridges behind him, moved upon the Cap Rock near Ceta where he resided till 1896. His second wife died at his home near Ceta in 1892. In 1901 he moved on another farm south of Canyon six miles, where he lived till 1901, moving to Canyon where he lived till the last great debt was paid.

Colonel Rusk was married the third time. His last wife was Miss Cornelia Witescorvea who still survives him.

As soldier, citizen, husband, father, Col. Rusk typified the ideal—un-estentatious, plain, faithful. A warm spot in his heart for everybody, and a sunny, cheerful temperament.

I knew him not when childhood's fragrant flowers

Like day-stars bright with dew bedecked his way;

I saw him not in manhood's budding powers,

Nor yet when age his temples touched with gray,—

Nor till the play of the evening ray

Had mellowed each sweet virtue in his breast;—

Not until the Sun-set crowned his honored day,

And Nature spread for him her couch of Rest.

'Twas then I first (a pilgrim worn with care)

Imbibed some comfort from his sunny face,

Some courage still to battle with Despair,

Some hope to stem the billows of Disgrace,

Some honest pride, forsooth to win a place

Among my fellows where some kindred beam

AN ADAMLESS EDEN.

Girls Camp at Moodna Creek.



AMATEUR DAIRYMAIDS.

There are a score or so of ethical culture clubs in New York city whose members are all girls. During the summer and early fall these girls spend their holidays at Moodna creek, in Orange county, New York state, using long neglected street cars for camp dwellings. In this simple fashion these vacationists enjoy a healthy holiday amid beautiful scenery for a few dollars a week.

A Novelist's Romance.

There died in Paris recently at the age of eighty-nine years a woman who will be remembered in the annals both of literature and of music. Her name was Pauline Viardot-Garcia. She was great in her own right and great by reason of her associations, says Current Literature. Her brother, Manuel Garcia, who died in 1906, was a singing teacher of worldwide reputation. In her prime she sang in all the leading opera houses of Europe. She knew intimately some of the most famous men and women of her time. Wagner, Schumann, Chopin, Gounod and Liszt were her friends. George Sand made her the heroine of a novel. Ary Scheffer painted her portrait. Heine, Renan, Delacroix, Adelaide Ristori and others as famous flocked to her salons. "She comes to us," says an enthusiastic admirer in Musical America, "from the golden age, carrying the sacred fire. During eighty-nine years her hand never wearied, her flame never flickered." But her strongest claim on immortality lies not so much in what has been mentioned as in one other fact. She was the friend and inspirer of the man whom many regard as the greatest novelist that ever lived—Ivan Turgeneff.

The love story of Mme. Viardot-Garcia and Turgeneff has never been told in its entirety. Turgeneff had all the secretiveness of the Slav, and Mme. Viardot-Garcia when she gave her consent in 1907 to the publication of some of the letters that passed between them excised the most vital passages. There are indications, however, that the full facts will soon be brought to light. It is said that among the papers of Mme. Viardot-Garcia has been found a manuscript novel of Turgeneff's entrusted to her half a century ago on the understanding that it was not to be published until ten years after her death. "If the statement is true," Jacob Topson remarks in the London New Age, "something approaching a first class sensation is in store for the literary world." There is another report that Mme. Viardot-Garcia and Turgeneff were secretly married and that the child of their union, a daughter, is living in America.

Queen's Views on Marriage.

The queen of Roumania, who recently was extremely ill, says that woman's true happiness lies in regarding marriage as a holy sacrifice and seeking to understand man rather than to look for man to understand her. "If women from the beginning," says she, "regarded marriage as a holy sacrifice, as a perfect oblivion, they perhaps would get on better. I do not say they would be happier. That is another question. In every nation marriage bears the character, which that nation needs. For this reason no laws and regulations can be made. It is for the single individuals to ennoble and perfect themselves in this as in all things. There would be no woman's question if married life had been differently handled.
