The principal theme of each one of the toasts was, unity. The Executive Committee will be called to meet at an early date and we will try to formulate some plan of work which will be submitted to the people through the columns of the News and we hope to receive the help and encouragement of all our people. We also expect all the people to give us the advantage of any suggestion with reference to the work that can be used for the advancement of the interest of Canyon.

In conclusion I wish to say that no member of the Committee or myself have sought any preferment of this kind and, as I was not asked if I would accept the position with which you have honored me, I have not asked any of the gentlemen above named if they would serve as committeemen. I would also like to be permitted to suggest that we cannot accomplish anything without funds and that we will appreciate some thought along that line and in formulating our plans we expect to also submit to the people a plan for raising the necessary funds without same being an undue burden on anyone.

INSTRUCTORS ARE ELECTED.

Domestic Science and Manual Training Instructors for Normal Report March 1.

The state board of education has elected Miss Jessie Rambo of East Las Vegas, N. M., to be teacher of domestic science in the West Texas State Normal college at Canyon. Miss Rambo is a B. A. graduate of the University of Illinois and specialized in the domestic science in that institution. Since her graduation she has taught several years in country, graded and high schools. For two years she was principal of a high school and during the scholastic year 1908-09 she taught domestic science in the Girls Industrial Home at Delaware, Ohio. During the past year she has taught domestic science in the New Mexico Normal university at Las Vegas. Miss Rambo comes with excellent recommendations and it is confidently expected that she will make a very valuable addition to the faculty of the normal school. Miss Rambo was elected to begin teaching in the normal March 4, at which time the domestic science department will begin its work.

The board also elected John George Miller of the Agricultural and Mechanical college, New Mexico, to be teacher in manual training in the West Texas State Normal college. After graduating with M. S. degree from the College of Manual Arts of New Mexico, Mr. Miller spent three years in the Philippine islands in the employment of the United States government as mechanical construction engineer, and for some time was in charge of the Philippine School of Arts and Trades at Manila. Since returning to the United States Mr. Miller has been employed as superintendent of the concrete work on the Santa Fe river retaining wall. Mr. Miller's services will begin March 4, at which time the manual training department of the college will begin its work. Mr. Miller comes highly recommended and will doubtless be a valuable man to the college.

Both of these elections were made by the state board following recommendations of Pres. Cousins. Both instructors will report for duty on March 1st.

DAIRY, POULTRY AND LIVE STOCK

SANTA FE DEMONSTRATION TRAIN IN CANYON TUESDAY.

Very Large Attendance—Helpful Suggestions Made by Experts on Farming.

"Diversified Farming" was the subject for discussion Tuesday afternoon at the depot where the Santa Fe had a special train to demonstrate to the citizens of Canyon the best way of farming. The train was under the supervision of H. M. Bainer, and carried Prof. J. L. Thomas, a dairy expert and L. L. Johnson, a practical poultry. Mr. Bainer spoke on hog raising.

The Santa Fe are planning to establish all along its lines small demonstration farms of not less than ten acres. They will work with the farmer to secure the best results and will oversee the cultivation of these pieces of ground. A number at Canyon are interested in the project and will work ground under Mr. Bainer's supervision.

The talks made by all the gentlemen were very helpful and received the closest attention by the large numbers present.

No More Games.

The basket ball trip which had been planned for this month has been called off on account of the team not being able to get a sufficient number of games. Work on the trip was started so late in the season that most of the team had full schedules. It was hoped that other Panhandle teams could be met, but after the record our boys made against Hereford and Amarillo all the teams seemed to prefer not playing the local bunch. The team has quit practicing for this season.

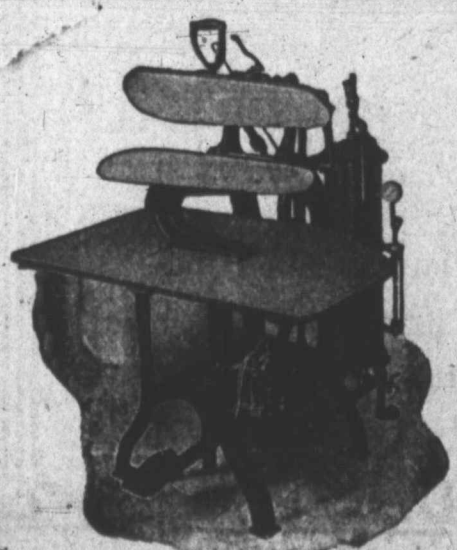

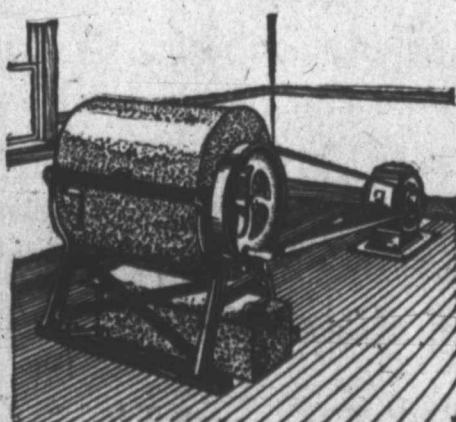

Commissioners' Court.

The Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday morning, Judge W. D. Scott, presiding, with the following commissioners present: T. F. Reid, E. W. Neece, W. S. Cook and M. S. Park.

Bids for a depository, for the county funds were opened and the award was made to the First National bank, of Canyon, the bond being set at \$60,000.

The court considered the reduction of the number of sessions of the county court from six to four sessions in a year. After due consideration, it was decided to hold only four sessions, the terms being held on the second Mondays in January, April, July and October, and may continue three weeks.

In the matter of running a road from Canyon by the R. E. Pickens place, the surveyor was ordered to run a line for two miles from the southwest corner of the Wansley section running east, and make his report to the court.

Will Have Deep Wells.

Two citizens of Canyon are quietly working on projects of putting down large wells which will have the capacity of 1,200 to 1,400 gallons per minute. Work on one of the wells will commence this week, and the other will be started soon. There is also talk among some of the citizens of going down until an artesian well is struck.


Call For Mass Meeting.

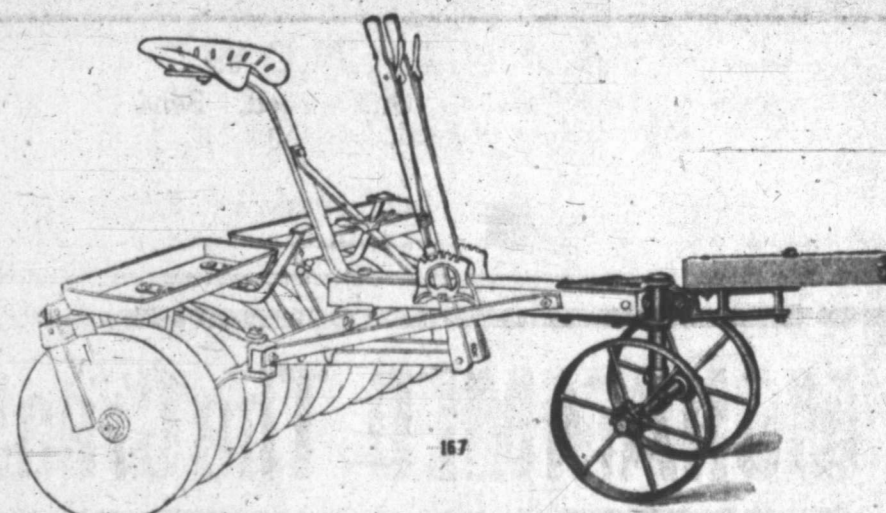
