

## MASS MEETING SELECT TICKET

CITY OFFICIALS ARE ENDORSED  
BY MEETING ON MONDAY.

Judge Henson will Head Citizen's  
Ticket at the City Election in April.—Aldermen Chosen.

Responding to a petition circulated by B. Frank Buie, a mass meeting of the city was held Monday afternoon for the purpose of selecting a citizen's ticket to be presented to the voters at the April election. Mr. Buie was elected chairman of the meeting and Judge Henson secretary.

On motion the chair appointed a committee composed of J. M. Black, T. F. Reid, L. C. Lair, L. T. Lester, W. W. Allison, Dr. D. M. Stewart and C. P. Hutchings to report to the meeting two names for each office to be filled. The following was the report of the committee:

For mayor: Dr. Wilson and A. S. Rollins. Both these gentlemen declined the nomination, and on motion of Geo. A. Brandon, Judge A. N. Henson was unanimously endorsed by the meeting for the office of mayor.

For alderman in the first ward the names of David Thomas and Chas. Dison were reported. David Thomas was chosen by a large majority.

In the second ward, J. M. Black and John Guthrie were reported by the committee. Mr. Guthrie declined the nomination and the meeting endorsed Mr. Black unanimously.

In the third ward two men are to be elected, one for the regular term and one to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Ingham, who has moved outside of the city limits. The names of Sam Lofton, D. A. Park, J. D. Gamle and W. T. Moreland were reported. Mr. Lofton declined the nomination and C. R. Burrow was nominated to take his place in the voting contest. A vote was taken resulting in the selection of C. R. Burrow and W. T. Moreland.

The large number of citizens who were present at the meeting are well pleased with the selection of officers and it is probable that no other ticket will be placed in the field for the election next month.

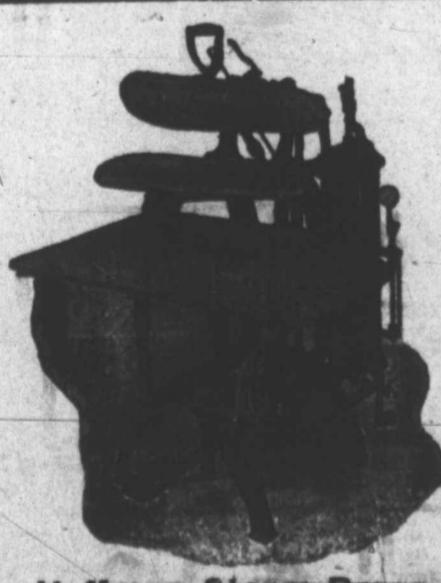
### Missionary Meeting.

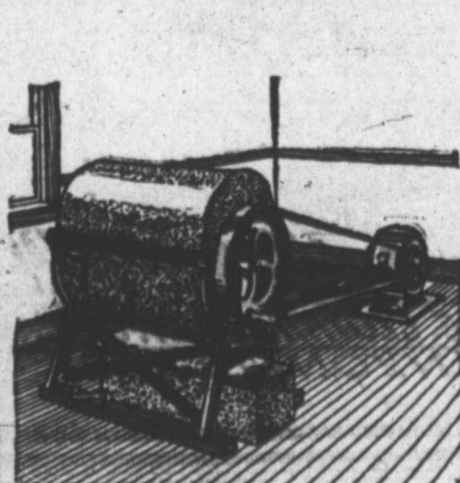

**PLEA OF WEST TEXAS.**

The plea of West Texas legis-  
 latures for the redistricting of  
 the state puts the case in a new  
 light. We had inclined to the  
 view that while the state should  
 be redistricted to conform to the  
 new census, no material interest  
 would suffer if the districts  
 should remain the same for an-  
 other two years. Indeed, with  
 prohibition and anti-prohibition  
 prejudices so strong it might  
 turn out that this concern would  
 overshadow other considera-  
 tions as to really endanger if not  
 render impossible that calm de-  
 liberation and just distribution  
 of legislative power which are to  
 be fixed for another decade. The  
 fierce rivalry between prohibi-  
 tionists and anti-prohibitionists  
 to obtain control of the redis-  
 tricting committees fore-shadowed  
 a gerrymander that under  
 other circumstances would not  
 be tolerated.

But the West Texas legisla-  
 tors remind us that their sec-  
 tion will suffer a grave injustice  
 if they are denied the represen-  
 tation to which their population  
 entitles them. They declare the  
 truth that "some West Texas  
 legislative districts today have  
 double, triple and quadruple the  
 number of inhabitants of the  
 average North, Central and East  
 Texas districts," and they invoke  
 the principle that taxation with-  
 out representation is fundamen-  
 tally and historically a political  
 crime. "For the larger portion  
 of the past ten years," they say,  
 "the west has borne uncomplainingly  
 taxation without represen-

tation, the inadequacy of repre-  
 sentation and growth of this tax-  
 ation becoming yearly greater."

It is a matter of common  
 knowledge that many state poli-  
 cies, pursued and sustained by  
 reason of the greater legislative  
 strength of North, Central and  
 East Texas, are objectionable to  
 West Texas. If legislative rep-  
 resentation were justly apportioned  
 that would be only the  
 misfortune of the minority. But  
 the census demonstrated that  
 West Texas is much stronger in  
 population than it was ten years  
 ago, and is getting relatively  
 stronger in population than it  
 was ten years ago, and is getting  
 relatively stronger every year.  
 Whether it is quite strong  
 enough with a fair representa-  
 tion to reverse or modify these  
 policies we do not know until the  
 divisor of apportionment is actu-  
 ally applied, but it is entitled  
 immediately to every unit of leg-  
 islative strength which its popu-  
 lation warrants.

This is a matter entirely aside  
 from prohibition or anti-prohi-  
 bition. The safe guess is that  
 the increase of West Texas rep-  
 resentation will increase prohi-  
 bition strength in the legislature.  
 But no single question should  
 be permitted to stand between  
 the people of any section and  
 their equitable strength of rep-  
 resentation in the legislature.  
 To deny them this right is to  
 repudiate the very first principle  
 of the American republic; to de-  
 lay it is to commit political rob-  
 bery for the time being.

We are confident that this  
 view will appeal to the legislative  
 and executive sense of fairness,  
 and we indulge the firm hope  
 that the plea of West Texas will  
 not be made in vain.—Ft. Worth  
 Record.

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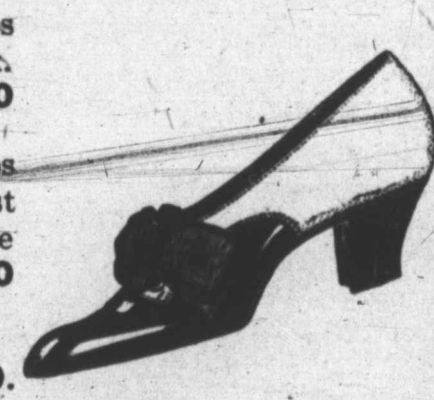

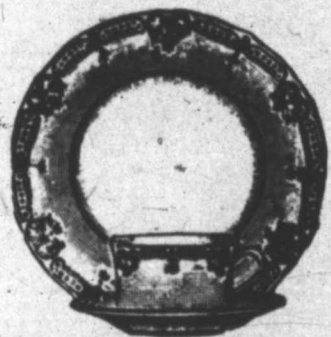
## Won First Prize.
