Cross-compliance in Barley Plan a Must

There is cross compliance between the 1962 barley feed grain program and the 1962 feed grain program for corn and grain sorghums, Charley Hill, ASC secretary, said this week.

Under the barley feed grain program the barley producer earns a special diversion payment by reducing his acreage of barley and diverting the acreage to a conservation use. The diverted acres must represent an additional amount over the farm's average acreage devoted to a conservation use in 1959 and 1960.

If a barley producer also produces corn or grain sorghum on the same farm, he must make sure that the farm does not produce more acres of barley, or of corn and grain sorghums, than the average acreage of such crops produced in 1959 and 1960.

If the producer fails to meet these cross compliance features, he is not eligible to earn payments for diversion of barley acreage to conserving uses. And participation in the special agricultural conservation program is necessary in order to be eligible for price support on the 1962 barley crop.

(Continued From Page 1) to dry out and open before carrying them to the gin. Too many green bolls indicate that you are attempting to strip too soon after frost or desiccation. Use wood slatted or wire sided trailers. This will allow leaf and other trash to blow out of the trailer.

5. Keep strippers and trailers clean. Do not over lubricate. Wipe off excess grease and keep the grailer beds free of dirt.

6. Keeping the strippers centered on the row and operating at the proper speed will help eliminate barmy cotton.

7. Keep a few tarpaulins on hand in case of rain or dust storms.
