

Farmers Must Sign Up to **Divert Wheat**

from production of the 1962-crop wheat are not automatic, Charley draw. Hill, secretary of the County Agricultural Stabilization and conservation Committee said this week.

The farm operator must sign up prior to the closing date for the well as for the additional voluntary diversion of wheat acreage and devote such acreage to approved conservation practices.

Such farmers may have thought that when Congress made the mandatory 10 percent reduction in the national wheat marketing quotas, they automatically became eligible for payments. However, each farmer growing wheat must sign up for conservation practices on the mandatory diverted acres if he wishes to comply with the law regarding the wheat stabilization program for the 1962 crop and receive payment. So for his best interests the secretary declared, a farmer tion signup.

Farmers who normally grov more than 15 acres of wheat and who hold allotments for more than 15 acres normally will be able to sign up for program participation, ments computed, and receive an advance payment of up to one half of the value of their total participation figured at the minimum rate. The advance payment will be by sight draft. This draft may also be used to purchase wheat at the market price as determined by the Commodity Credit Corporation. Wheat purchased in this manner can be marketed without penalty but is not eligible for price support.

Farmers who grew 15 acres of less of wheat for harvest in any one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961 can sign up for divers on payments, but because the ire is a variety of computations involved. The local ASC Committee will make the calso each farmer will receive the kind of payment requested and it will be mailed. The operator, in signing this statement of intention to participate in the program can select different courses of action to guide the ASC committeemen in culation as soon as possible figureing the payments:

1. To earn the highest total payment; or 2. To retain the highest permitted wheat acres.







uces corn or grain sorghum the same farm, he must make sur that the farm does not produ more acres of barley, or of con and grain sorghums, than the ave rage acreage of such crops pr duced in 1959 and 1960.

If the producer fails to me these cross compliance features, he is not eligible to earn payments for diversion of barley acreage to conserving uses. And participation in the special agricultural conservation program is necessary in oron the 1962 barley crop.
