GOVERNOR APPOINTS BOARD OF REGENTS

W. H. FUQUA, OF AMARILLO, ONE

Peter Radford, A. C. Goeth, W. J. Crawford and Superintendent Bralley Others.

AUSTIN, Nov. 28. - Governor Colquitt today announced the appointment of W, H. Fuqua, of Amarillo, Potter county, Peter Radford, of Parker county, A.C. Goeth, of Austin, Pravis county, and Walter J. Crawford of Beaumont, Jefferson county, as members of the state normal board created by the Thirty-second legislature in special session to supervise the four normal schools of the state. With F. M. Bralley, state superintendent of education, as ex-officio chairman of the board, this new board of regents for the control of these state institutions will tomorrow assume their duties, the law under which they are appointed going into effect tonight at midnight.

The law providing for a board of regents for the state normal has one conflict. In one place it speaks of the appointment of five members of the board. In another it says that the governor shall appoint four. Likewise the state superintendent shall be the fifth.

The responsibility for the control of the state normal schools is now removed from the state board of education and the four local boards. GETS ANOTHER ON CRIMINAL

M. Bertillon Studies Human Hair to Further Perfect His System of Identification.

Human hair is now the study of that untiring criminal statistician, M. Bertillon, who invented the science of finger prints. He is engaged in drawing up a complete classified and graduated table of all the colors of the human hair. He has already received specimens from many parts of the world, but asks for more and as many as people like to send him.

A complete paletto, so to speak, of the colors of the human hair is, in his opinion, a long-felt want. When a man is wanted by the police in any country the hue of his hair is only vaguely described, and the terms used have no standard meaning. What is called fair in Sicily is considered as dark in Scandinavia, and

When he has gathered together a complete collection of hair from every part of the world M. Bertillon will classify them carefully, according to a graduated scale of shades, and then number each. Thus if he begins at one with the darkest raven black, the highest figure will be that of the lightest flaxen known. When the scale is ready and has been communicated to the police all over the world the description of a man who is wanted will mention, for instance, "hair Nos 17 to 32," and the Scandinavian will know as well as the Sicilian police what color is meant within a fairly close approximation. Henceforth burglars who already wear gloves when on the job for fear of leaving finger prints, will have to keep their heads shaved.

ABDUL HAMID'S JEWELS.

One of the most remarkable auctions ever held in Paris is to take place toward the end of November, namely, the sale of the jewels formerly belonging to the former sultan, Abdul Hamid.

It will be remembered that when Abdul was deposed the Ottoman government seized this property as belonging to the nation. Since then they have been stored with the Imperial Ottoman bank, but now the government intends to apply the proceeds of its sale to the purpose of increasing the Turkish fleet.
