NAME OF SLOGAN CONTEST

\$25.00 cash reward for best slogan for Dimmitt and Castro County to be given by Dimmitt Lions Club.

Purpose of Contest: To give the merchants and people of Castro County a slogan to be used in advertising and building the future of Castro County.

Eligibility for contestants: Everyone is eligible except members of the Lions Club and their families.

Length of time for contest: The contest will begin Nov. 8, and close Dec. 8, 1945.

Rules of contest:

- The slogan shall consist of ten words or less.
- The slogan should suggest the value of the resources of the county including irrigation, livestock, etc.
- The slogan may include an illustration as well as words.

The slogan, with name, should be enclosed in a sealed envelope, and left with E.L. Ivey or at the News Office. These will not be opened until the day of judging.

The contest will be judged by members of the Lions Club. A \$25 cash prize will be awarded to the winner; in case of a tie, both contestants will receive a \$25.00 war bond. Winner will be announced as soon as possible after the closing date.

SGT. JAMES CURTIS GRANTED UNIT BADGE

HQ. 23RD FIGHTER GROUP, LIUCHOW, CHINA—Sgt. James J. Curtis, of Dimmitt, is now entitled to wear the coveted Distinguished Unit badge as a member of the Fourteenth Air Force's veteran 23rd Fighter Group in China.

Sgt. Curtis' outfit, nicknamed the "Flying Tigers", was activated in Kunming, China, on July 4, 1942 as the official successor to the famous American Volunteer Group. Participating actively in more than 3 years of the bitter war in China, Flying Tiger fighter pilots have destroyed or damaged more than 20,000 enemy troops in strafing and bombing operations. The Distinguished Unit Citation was granted recently in recognition of the Flying Tigers' blows against the Japs in the June 1944 battle of Hengyang.

JOE HASTINGS GETS COMMISSION

FORT KNOX, KY., Oct. 27—Joe R. Hastings, son of Joe Hastings Dimmitt, Texas was commissioned a second Lieutenant in ceremonies here today. He was a member of the 85th graduating class of the Armored Officer Candidate School.

Sixty-five new officers received their gold bars upon completion of a 17-week course. As their first assignment, a majority of them will receive practical training in Command duties at the Armored Replacement Center at Fort Knox. Others will go to the Tank Destroyer Center at Camp Hood, Texas. Following advanced training, the new officers will be assigned to armored or tank destroyer units as platoon leaders.

H. D. ACHIEVEMENT EVENT HELD

The first of a series of Achievement Events in home demonstration clubs over the county was held Tuesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. S. W. Lilley in the Sunnyside community. Mrs. Lilley is Clothing demonstrator and Home Food Supply demonstrator for her club.

Mrs. Lilley has made an amazing number of improvements in her storage since she volunteered to be demonstrator for her club. A summary of her work includes remodeling her clothes closet by making it 3 feet longer and 11 inches wider. This closet had 6 shelves to begin with and she added 9 more. She also added a chest of drawers, a shoe pocket on the door, boxes to keep her sewing equipment in order, new paper and paint added to the locks of this closet. She also remodeled her husband's clothes closet by adding 6 shelves and added a low rod in this for her niece's clothes. Another niece has the chiffon for her own clothes closet and each has her own drawer space. The linen closet also had two extra shelves added.

Besides an enormous amount of sewing and remodeling Mrs. Lilley has done for herself and two nieces, she has knitted and crocheted sweaters and bags which she sold for \$416.50 and has given away gifts amounting to \$110.00.

Mrs. Lilley is physically unable to make many trips to her cellar for supplies so she remodeled her pantry to take care of some of her canned foods. She rearranged the shelves and added 11 extra shelves. She also left space for her cleaning and canning equipment. She has 27 varieties of canned food in her cellar and pantry amounting to 750 containers. In addition she has dried beans, Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes, turnips, pecans, popcorn, apples and lard in storage. She has pork and beef in the locker, and wheat for flour at the elevator.

PRISONER OF WAR LABOR

Prisoner of War labor is available to Castro County farmers by filling out a contract at the County Agent's office. A letter from the Commanding Officer Major Matrice in charge of prison labor at Hereford to County Agent, stated that contracts must be sent to College Station for approval before a contract can be made. It takes 5 or 6 days for the contract to become effective after it has been filled out at the County Agent's office and sent to College station.

Any Castro County farmer planning to use prisoner of War labor during Nov. should make application at the County Agent's office as soon as possible so the contract may be in effect when the labor is needed.
