Only twenty two years old, full of life and activity, bne of the best business men in Canyon, and a friend of everybody, Canyon mourns the loss of this

his departure a vacancy occurred in the Hereford yard, owned by the Rockwell Co. and C. R. Burrow wired his brother if he would accept the management of the Hereford yard. He left Temple and started for Here

The engine must have been going very fast as the hat of the young man was found on the rear of the tender, and this could only have been thrown there by a very hard blow in the beory that he slipped and was fun over.
