CODLING MOTH

LIFE HISTORY

The codling moths first appear in spring soon after the apple trees begin to bloom and sometimes on the young fruit itself. These hatch in about a week into larvae. The larvae feed for a short time on the leaves, but soon locate the young apples, and here they usually feed the calyx or blossom end for awhile before

Many of the wormy apples drop before attaining full size, but the larvae within them continue to feed until grown, which requires from two to three weeks. 



When diseases are present it is best to apply the arsenate of lead with Bordeaux Mixture or commercial lime sulphur, the latter diluted one part to 40. 


