year, this is 100 above last year's figures and about 25 more than the total enrollment of the entire quarter. Secretary R. A. Ter rill says that he knows of about 25 students who have arrived in the city during the past two days and who have not registered. The summer session will continue until August 24. During the summer there will be given two series of examinations for 8 state certificates, the first July 8 to 11 and the second July 29 to August 1. "Now the Panhandle is about twice as large as Georgia. We can raise four times the apples that are grown in Georgia and have room for vast fields of wheat and cotton, because they grow best in Georgia on the mountain sides. In the Panhandle the whole of it is a leve mountain, with twice the eleva-
