over the chilly winter of the great open plains. There is sufficient sweet clover now growing luxuriantly on the plains to con vince any one of its adaptability to this soil and climate, so the

Little has been known of this valuable plant in this country
until recent years when it was discovered to be equal to or bet ter than the other clovers, beans and peas as a fertilizer and was tucky for this purpose only, pro ducing very satisfactors result to the raisers of corn, wheat an tobacco. Most commercial ferti lizers are now being discarde for this plant which gathers an stores large quantities of nitro gen and adds humus and bac teria to the soil, which element swe so necessary to plant life years when it produces a prolific crop of seed and dies. The suc ceeding crops, which never fail to come from lie sleted with the soil has been initial crop, grow wore abun than the ground very porous, thus per milig low to a goor rot supplies a lot of vege posie mitter So sweet clove tabe fertilizer is very valuable sapplying nitrogen, humus and decomposed vegetable matter which produces life and plant wactivity in the soil like yeast pro duces life and substances bread.
A good stand of sweet clover will produce from two to four tons of hay per acre and can be cut the second time for seed. This hay is equal to alfalfa in every particuiar except that, some tests, it has a little mo fatand proteids. All stock on the farm relish it.
Sweet clover has no equal as a torage plant. It produces the largest amount of grazing of any of the clovers or grasses and will
