

Fall work of not know any better method than to list deep in the fall. We find extra good results come from running a sub-soiler several inches deep in the bottom of these furrows immediately following the lister. This provides a good safe place for quick storage of moisture which may fall at any time before planting. As soon as any moisture has fallen and the ridges become dry enough to work, they should be harrowed, this is especially advisable for tight lands. On sandy lauds, it is often best to cultivate the ridges rather than harrow them, especially if there is danger of blowing. All crusts should be kept broken and all weeds should be destroyed until planting time. When deep plow ing cannot be done at the proper tims (early), we prefer listing rather than shallow plowing. Where possible, always double list-list early and work ridges until planting time, then re-list and plant immediately.

Contouring and Terracing.-All listing furrows, especially planting furrows, should be run on the contour, which means that they should be run directly across the slope and not up and down it. This plan prevents water from running off a field even during a heavy rain, but it may call for very winding rows in some fields. However, the question of looks is of minor importance.

Cultivation.—It often happens that a dashing rainfall occurs after planting and before the seed comes up, and crust forms at the bottom of the furrow which interfers with the plant coming through. This can usually be overcome by dragging the furrow or row, with a trough which has large spikes driven through from the inside. An arrangement of this kind can be made to cover 3 or 4 rows at once. In fact, it is a good plan to use the above in connection with the harrow for the first two or three cultivations. If the crop was planted with the lister, the lister cultivator or "Go Devil," will do excellent work once or twice after the harrow. Later cultivations should be done with sweeps or small shovels. In cultivating these crops do not throw too much dirt to the row, but rather keep the row lowest all the time, if possible. conformation of its mouth the housefly cannot bite. In the minds of most persons, however, no impression is stronger than that the housefly does occasionally bite. This impression is due to the rather frequent presence in houses of another fly. This, the so called "stable fly," closely resembles the house. Its mouth parts are formed for piercing skin. Virtually all flies breed in horse manure, cow manure and warm, decaying vegetable matter, including old straw and grass.

The fly begins life as an egg. It passes through the larval stage, where it is known as a maggot. It passes then through the pupal stage, emerging as the winged pest we all know. The periods of development are about as follows: Eggs from deposition to hatching, onethird of a day; hatching of larvae to first molt, one day; first to second molt, one day; second molt to pupation, three days; pupation to issuing of adult, five days; total life round, ap-

proximately ten days. The eggs are always laid or some organic matter, on which the larvae or maggots may feed after hatching. Horse manure is the favorite breeding place for the fly.

Typhoid fever, diarrheal diseases, diphtheria, scarlet fever and any communicable disease. How can the fly be prevented? By destroying all the filth about your premises. Screen the privy vault, cover the manure bin, burn all waste matter, destroy

your garbage, screen your house. Either man must kill the fly or the fly will kill man.

How to Prevent Breeding.

If you have a stable do not allow manure to accumulate. The manure should be removed twice a day to a closed pit and should be removed from this twice a week. Do not tolerate manure piles.

Green vitriol, one pound in a gallon of water, applied once a day will kill the maggots in the manure from a one horse stable.

If the old fashioned dug outhouse is used it should be thoroughly treated at frequent intervals with chloride of

Garbage cans should be closely covered, or, better, should have a fly trap attached to the cover in such a way that all dies flying upward from the garbage will be sure to enter the trap.
