

ENSILAGE CATTLE BRING BIG PRICE

SOLD AT \$9.00 and \$8.85 0 KANSAS CITY MARKET.

C. O. Keiser Shipped Last Spring Calves Which Have Been Fed On Panhandle Grains.

C. O. Keiser shipped the last spring calves which he has been feeding on his ranch northwest of the city and on the Kansas City market Wednesday the best of the bunch sold for \$9.00 per hundred and the remainder sold at \$8.85. The extreme top price paid this year in Kansas City is reported to have been \$8.85 until this shipment was placed on the market.

Mr. Keiser shipped 131 calves 93 of which have been in the feed lot since last November when they were weaned. They have been fed on kaffir corn ensilage, maize chops, millet, sorghum and cotton seed cake, all of which with the exception of the cotton was raised in Randall county. Thirty-eight of the calves have been put in the feeding pens since January and one calf in the shipment had received no feed and was not weaned. When the cattle were sold, 21 of these late steers and 9 heifers were cut out and sold by themselves, but 8 were left with the bunch that sold for the high price.

The bunch bringing the high price paid on the Kansas City market up until yesterday were 26 steers which weighed 965 and sold at 9 cents, or \$86.85 each. There were 41 steers which weighed 877 and brought \$8.85, or \$77.61 each. There were 34 heifers which weighed 689 and brought \$8.85, or \$60.97 each. Of the 30 which had been fed only a short time and which were shipped only to fill out, 21 steers weighed 795 and brought \$8.25 and nine heifers weighed 660 and brought \$8.00. The shipment amounted to \$9,226.59.

Last fall Mr. Keiser had 148 calves, of which he shipped 55 of the best heifers to the Kansas City market before he decided to feed. These heifers broke the world's record for range calves at Kansas City. Had theseheifers been fed and shipped with the best steers the average weight of the heifers would have steers.





Convinced that means could be found to overcome the loss of several million dollars a year in the egg industry, the Depart- Austin. ment of Agriculture at Washington D. C. has just completed an inquiry into the causes of bad and addled eggs. In a statement issued Friday, the investigators fix the blame on the farmers and poultry raisers.

"The greatest part of the loss is due mainly to ignorance or difference on the part of the farmer and producer," says the report, "and only a small part is caused by carelessness on the part of the buyer and shiper."

The department urges the observance of five simple rules in the conduct of the egg industry and sets them forth as follows:

Give the hen clean nests. Gather eggs at least once dai-


Keep eggs in a cool dry place.

Market eggs at least twice

Kill or sell all mature birds as soon as the hatching season

More Silos Needed.

The Farmer's Union has been conducting an exhaustive investigation into agricultural conditions with reference to the cost of producing and value received for farm crops with a view of recommending a substitute for cotton as that industry is already suffering from over-production. In discussing the subject, President Radford of the Farmer's Union said: "The Lord made the greater part of Texas a cotton country and it will always remain the money crop of Texas so long as the farmers market this crop direct from the harvest field, but I believe with plenty of good livestock and a silo a farmer can successfully raise feed stuff and he will be justified in planting less cotton and raising more livestock."

The Federal Census reports show that we have 14,080,936 head of livestock in Texas and 96 per cent of our farms reported demestic animals.

There were 360 farms in Randall county that reported livestock when the Thirteenth Census was taken according to a report just issued by the Federal Department of Commerce and Labor and the total number of domestic animals on these farms numbered 18,452, which has a combined value of \$77,617. 




