Keiser where the baby beef were being fed which brought the highest price of any Texas cattle ever sold on the Kansas City market. <br> It was at Canyon City that I met the three-silo man who was topping markets with his baby beef - white-faced infants that suggested all tenderloin and tip ped the scale for me between ped the scale for me between eight hundred and nine hundred pounds. Mr. K., who is some thing in the way of a land baron and a cattle king, has set the fashion and his enthusiasm over the prospect seemed as genuine the old lady of the town of py who had killed a mortgage with a flock of turkeys. <br> Mr. K.'s baby beeves were the white-faced calves I had ever looked at in or out of photographs from their owner tha hear ment was to prove something in the way of a beacon light for the Southwest. No more vast herds that devastated the ranges they fed on, but small bunches of beef cattle to be handled by the small farmer as a mighty important incident to his business. <br> I had seen Mr. K.'s three silos from the railroad line, but I reached this one of nine ranches cross country from Hereford, the town of four hindred wind mills and the habitat of Big Pump Mack. He had fed heifers there in that | same draw, shipped them as weanlings to Kansas City and they had broken the worid s rec ord up to November 18, 1912, for range calves of their class. <br> Casting a fatherly eye over his picture herd of half-ton juvenile bulls, Mr. K. said feelingly that baby beef was bound to be the salvation of the Panhandle, and would make an appreciable dent in higb cost of living. While a hysterical young blond the baby beef and being stampeded in turn, fall- ing over his tripod and turning double somersaults in the draw, to the consternation of pigs and piglets, Mr. K. delivered a littleseration that should be of interest to both beef eaters and beef raisers. <br> Since the beginnings of the cattle industry in this state, it had been the custom to ship the majority of calves to market at weaning time. They were rais ed at very light expense and remorey invested in cows. With them went also the dry cows and stockers, to be sold at the feeder markets, to finishers from the Northern and Eastern . states. No thought was given to finish- ing them for beef. With the introduction of the silo, and practical demonstrations that kaffir and milo are virtually the equal of Indian corn as ensilage, it bethe feed lot at weaning time and send them out the following spring weighing from eight hundred pounds and upward - as fine a quality of beef as can be produced anywhere in the Unit ed States. <br> "In the East," continued Mr. K.. who was firmly astride his ba by beef hobby, "calves are usual ly taught to eat grain and silage before being weaned. A great many people use creeps or low | fences, under which the calves can met into another lot where they have all the grain they will eat. In this way they are praceat. In this way they are prac tically on full feed before they are weaned. Now in this range country we have not as yet arrived at that stage and our cal- ves are still weaned in the oldfashioned way-taken from the cows when they are from six to eight months old and shut up in have forgotten about their mothers. <br> "The calves to be fed for baby beef are put on a ration of ground maize or kaffir, silage and other roughage, usuallymillet hay, alfalfa or kaffir or corn fodder. They prefer the kaffir fodder to almost anything,with the possible exception of <br> alfalfa. Only a few pounds of grain are fed daily at tirst; then this ration is gradually increased until they are eating from tento twelve pounds. They are also given cottonseed cake or meal, beginning with a pound or a little less. Before they are turnto two and a half pounds a day. <br> 'The amount of silage they eat ranges from seven to eight pounds to the calf, at the time they are first put on it, to sixteen or seventeen pounds daily, which is as much as we have had our calves eat here. We give them all they will eat (lucky calves!). We can take a calf at weaning time and put on four or five hundred pounds, making him weigh eight or nine hundred, with a little more than half the feed necessary to put an equal number of pounds on an eleven hundred-pound steer.
