



OVERCOMING FEAR OF DEATH

Uselessness of Feeling Apparent to All, But Few Ever Succeed in Mastering It.

The spirit will still be in a measure the slave of the body while we are capable of fear. The dream in our hearts is somehow to break through the last barrier of fear-to come out, as someone has said, on the other side of fear. The uselessness of the fear of death is as apparent to us as the sun in the sky. Its ignobleness is a thing that haunts all who are subject

Whether the love of death as the ieliverer in the spirit of Walt Whitman is a passion to be cultivated may be doubted. Those who have scorned death most, as the great gentlemen of the renaissance did, saw it none the less the destroyer of the beauty of men's bodies and of the light of the world as the common man knows it. To the religious mind, which accepts the vision of a real and populated world happier than this beyond the grave, death is no doubt the deliverer. But even to most religious men this world has gathered about it all the dearness of home; death, at its best, is an exile, a desertion. They have the bravery to die; but their bravery has the sadness of Hector's. And yet, as with Hector, some instinct drives them to despise this death of the body, to accept this exile as more to be desired than safety and a man's own hearth and children.

Christian, pagan, and atheist are at one in this. They feel that the life of the body itself can be fully enjoyed only when the fear of those that kill the body has been utterly overcome.-The Statesman, London.

FISH ALMOST A CLEAR WHITE

Remarkable Specimens of Albine Trout That Are on Exhibition in New York Aquarium.

Among the interesting exhibits at the New York aquarium is a collection of albino trout. These creatures, which are all of a clear cream white, including their fins, with no color about them except that of their characteristic bright ruby-red eyes, are most striking and curious in appearance, an exchange says,

In its natural coloring the lake trout shows on its upper body white or grayish spots on a brown background. On the large albino lake trout the spots can be discerned, appearing as very faint spots of the same color, but of a different weave in a woven fabric. These spots show so faintly that they would never be noticed by one unfamiliar with this species and its mark-

The lake trout is a handsome fish and these albino trout are perfect specimens without a blemish. They appear not as freaks, but simply as graceful and beautiful white fishes. To display them to greater advantage by contrast the larger albino trout are shown in a tank of brook trout.

Democratic Swiss Army.

It is a democratic army, that of the Swiss. The whole manhood of the nation is liable to service, and there are no officers but those who have served as privates. There are no such col leges as at West Point or Woolwich or Sandhurst, but the man who is to become an officer must get his instruction in a few weeks' training in the schools at Thun or Basel. The confederation has the control of the skilled mechanics, such as engineers, the sanitary corps, the commissariat. So much the democratic country has left to the central government. But the cantons have to look after and supply the infantry, and their duty is to see that no man able in body and mind evades his military service; but no canton may keep more than 300 men as a permanent force, which is a curious illustration of the double sovereignty in that crinkle of Europe.

"Classical" Music.

Many people have an'idea that only he compositions of the old masters are classical and frequently imagine that these are classical because they belong to the past. It is not antiquity or the name of the composer that determines whether a piece of music is classical or otherwise. The true meaning of classical music is: Compositions which maintain a certain standard; music of the first rank. Compositions can be classical and romantic at the same time. The word romantic, as applied to music, means imaginative, fairylike. Music which is classical and at the same time romantic, more emotional, more fanciful, more poetic and less rigid and formal than strictly classical compositions. For example, Bach's works are, more frequently, strictly classical, whereas Mendelssohn's and Schumann's are both classical and romantic.





EMPIRE Jr. GRAIN



One of the most important mechanical features in the construction of grain drill is the feed. Empire Jr. Internal or Double Run Feed Cup is what the name implies—two feeds in one. The smaller side for wheat, rye and other small grains. The larger for peas, beans and all kinds of large seed which may be shown in a large range of quanties per acre without cracking or injuring the seed.

This positively assures sliding pinion on upright shaft always engaging alike in each of the ten rows of cogs on multiple gear as the face of same is always parallel to upright shaft. Cannot wabble or get out of alignment to wear or cut out cogs.

The bevel pinion on upper end of upright shaft drives countershaft, for which two sprocket wheels- 6 and 12 tooth- are supplied. Malleable chain from this sprocket to sprocket on grain feed shaft drives the feed. Heavy teeth on all of the pinions, made to give wear, practically eliminates pinions wearing and cutting out common to other types of change speed gears and insures the most efficient, positive and durable transmission.

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

OUR PUBLIC FORUM

F. A. Vanderlip On The Business of Banking



The farmers of this nation to some into their own must study business. We must, as a class, understand the fundamental principles that underlie every industry, its functions to society and its relation to agriculture for there can be no intelligent co-operation without understanding. Mr. F. A. Vanderlip, president of the National City Bank of New York, when asked "What is a Bank" said in part: "The first and most familiar function of a bank is

that of gathering up the idle money of a community, small sums and large, and thus forming a pool or reservoir upon which responsible persons may draw as they have temporary use for money. It is evident that this makes large sums in the aggregate available for the employment of labor and the development of the

community. But much more is accomplished than the use of the money actually deposited in the banks, for by the use of drafts, checks and bank notes the efficiency of money is multiplied several times over. A very large business, for example one of the great beef packers, may use very little actual money; on one side of its bank account will be entered the checks and drafts it is daily receiving from everywhere in payment for meats, while on the other side will be entered the checks it draws in payment for attle, etc., its only use of money being for small payments, to labor and therwise

If there were but one bank in a community and everybody paid all bills by drawing checks on that bank, and everyone receiving a check immeliately deposited it in the bank, the amount of money in the bank evidently would not change at all and the entire business of the community would be settled on the books of the bank. And the situation is but slightly changed when there are several banks, for they daily exchange among themselves all the shecks they receive on each other, which practically effect themselves, although the small balances are paid in each. This is called 'clearing' and in every large city there is a 'Clearing House' where representatives of the banks meet daily to settle their accounts with each other

A bank is constantly receiving from its customers, particularly those that are shipping products to other localities, drafts and checks drawn on banks in other cities, which it usually sends for deposit to a few correspondent banks in the central cities with which it maintains permanent accounts. In this way these scattered credits are consolidated and the bank draws upon these accounts in supplying customers with the means of making payments away from home. As each local community sells and buys about the same amount abroad in the course of a year, these payments largely offset each other. It is evident that the banks are very intimately related to the trade and industry of a country. The banker is a dealer in credit much more than a dealer in money, and of course his own credit must be above question. He exchanges his credit for the credits acquired by his customers, and lends credit for their accommodation, but he must conduct the business with such judgment that he can always meet his own obligations with cash on demand. This is the essential thing about bank credit, that it shall always be the same as cash."
