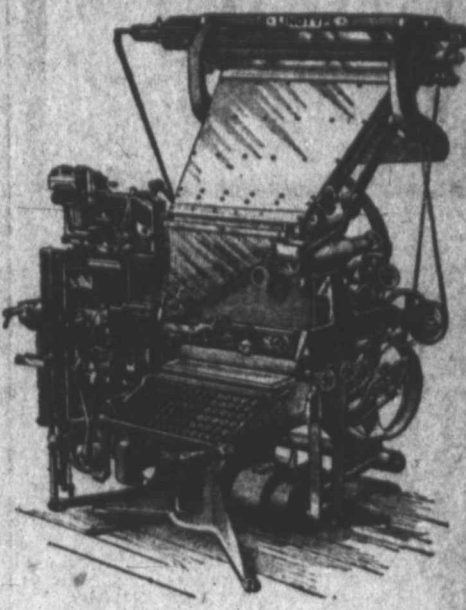
The train left at 9 o'clock and will return at 6 o'clock.

## WHAT ABOUT THE JAIL PROPOSITION?

Voters Asked to Express Opinion Regarding New Jail or Remodeling of the Old One.

Do you favor the remodeling of the old jail, or do you want a new jail built?

The commissioners of Randall county last week submitted through the columns of the News the proposition to do either one of two things—remodel the old jail or build another. They want the opinion of the tax payers.

The News is assisting the commissioners in compiling the opinions of the people. In this issue of the paper you will find a blank which you are asked to fill out and return to the News office at once. Your opinion is greatly desired.

The blank was published last week but only a few persons submitted answers. The commissioners wish action at once, since the grand juries of the county during the past ten years have been asking for a new jail. Let every voter respond at once.

### Selection of Field Seeds.

Demonstration proves that intelligent selection of kafir, milo, feterita and sorghum in the field for seed, increases the yield fully one-third, as compared to the methods in common use.

As most farmers know, the crops here mentioned belong to the sorghum family and that they therefore mix readily when grown side by side. By reason of this fact, the purest and best seeds are found in the center rather than at the edges of the field, where closely related crops are grown. Select heads well shaped and compact, rather than those that are loose and open of the "broom corn" type.

In kafir heads, the main stem or mid-rib should have several joints or seed bearing stems, and should extend well toward the tip of the head. These seed bearing stems should be short and well filled with seed.

Heads of all crops named must be selected from medium-sized, thrifty stalks, rather than from those that are over-sized, or abnormally large. Isolated stalks, grown far apart from other plants are not the ones from which selection should be made, even if the head does appear attractive. The good head produced under field conditions, were surrounded by many others, is far better.

Do not select heads that may happen to grow near volunteer or chance stalks of any other members of the sorghum family, as they are likely to be mixed.

In all of this southwestern country, earliness is desirable, and it will therefore be found advisable to mark the first heads appearing in the crop, with a string that can be easily seen, so that they may be selected for seed when the crop matures, other things being equal. Be careful to select heads extending well out of boot.

Heads should be selected from the field as soon as fully matured, cut with stems sufficiently long to be tied together and hung from rafters or other convenient place, or they may be placed in gunny sacks and suspended as above indicated. These seeds should be kept in the head until nearly planting time, when they should be threshed by hand. Care should be taken to protect seeds from rats, mice and birds or insects.

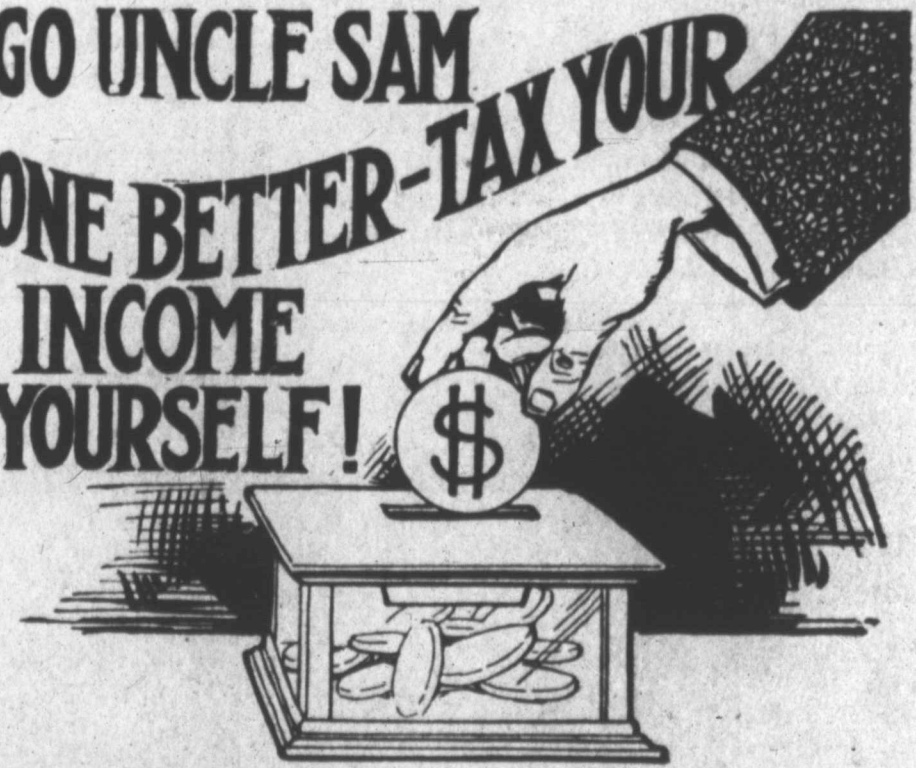

HAS FAMOUS PANTRY

MOST WOMEN WOULD ENVY QUEEN MARY'S TREASURES.

Besides Possessing Great Historic Interest, Their Financial Value is Enormous—Some Marvels of Workmanship There.

Among the famous pantries of the world is that of Queen Mary at Windsor. This pantry comprises two rooms of no great dimensions, but it contains treasures in the form of plate and household articles that are valued at more than a million pounds sterling. Many of these possess historic interest. For example, there is a conspicuous exhibit in the form of a table of solid silver. This is nearly a yard in length, and its top, with an area of several square feet, bears the royal arms and exquisitely chased designs of the symbolic rose, thistle, harp, etc. Every reign since that of Elizabeth has contributed to this table a design of some sort.

The most imposing of all the dazzling array of plate is the so-called gold dinner service for occasions of the highest state.

The walls of the two rooms of this royal pantry, the larger of which is 30 feet by 16 feet, and the smaller a square of 16 feet, are lined with cases of plate glass and mahogany, and in these and similar cases, occupying the center of each room, are some of the most extraordinary examples of art in gold, silver and precious stones that the world has ever seen.

There are tall, graceful ewergoes, each of which would tax the strength of two men to lift it; there are dishes in gold and silver, any one of which would be too heavy to run away with; dainty toilet services in gold and silver, candelabra, communion services, flagons, vases, punch bowls, wine coolers, fountains and fonts in silver, wrought in designs of great beauty by the most skillful artists.

The most beautiful of all these, it is said, is the Nautilus vase, fashioned, it is claimed, out of pearl, gold and silver by the hands of Benvenuto Cellini, himself, although it bears the name of an artist of Nuremberg, Nicholas Schmidt. The shell, which is of pearl, mounted in silver and gold of the most delicate chasing, is poised on the shoulders of a superbly mounted horseman, and above the pearl shell another figure is throned.

Another marvel of workmanship is the rose water fountain, in silver, with its dome supported by columns, around which are grouped horses and hounds.

In point of interest it would be difficult to picture any article of the kind more artistically perfect than the silver-gilt flagon, that was rescued from the armada more than three hundred years ago. This flagon is a yard high and its value runs far into the thousands.

One of the historic bits that are highly prized is a quaint pair of bellows, mounted in silver and gold, that once belonged to Nell Gwynn. There are ponderous silver "freedogs" of the time of Charles II, and near by is an enormous punch bowl, contributed by George IV as an example of the art of Flaxman.

Is It a Dinosaur?

It is refreshing now and then to get away from daily consideration of the modern monsters of destruction and renew a suspended acquaintance with the behemoths of the earliest days. Here, for instance, is the story of the fossil survival of what may have been a dinosaur, according to the discoverer. It was dislodged, the fossil was dislodged, from a section of yellow clay 15 feet below the street level at St. George, Staten Island.

The foreman of the excavating gang says the bones look mightily like an elephant's, but the finder scorns this unprofessional opinion and sticks to the dinosaur theory. What the ubiquitous and fee-gathering coroner will have to say may be known later.

Anyway, the dinosaur—if that's what they decide to call it—is calculated to give sated New York a rest from war's alarms and bomb outrages and scandal stories, which can be regarded as a consumption devoutly to be approved.

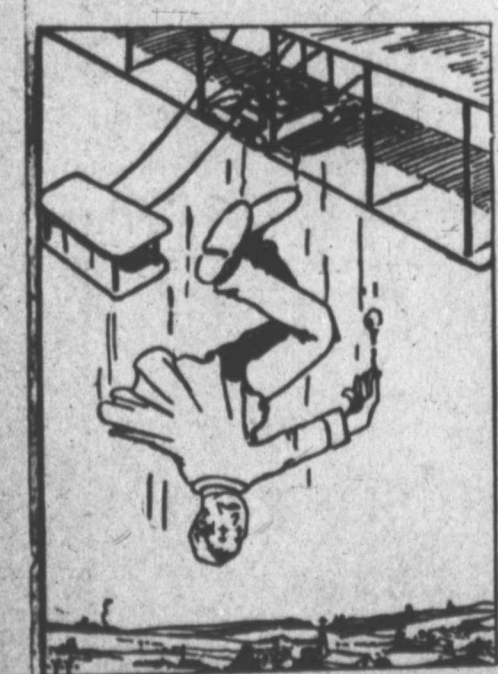

**KNOW THY STATE**

THE SILO—PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE.  
By H. G. Harvey.



Mr. H. G. Harvey, of the Texas Kalamazoo Silo Company, of Fort Worth, the oldest manufacturing institution of its kind in the United States, was asked to address the farmers of Texas on the subject, said in part.

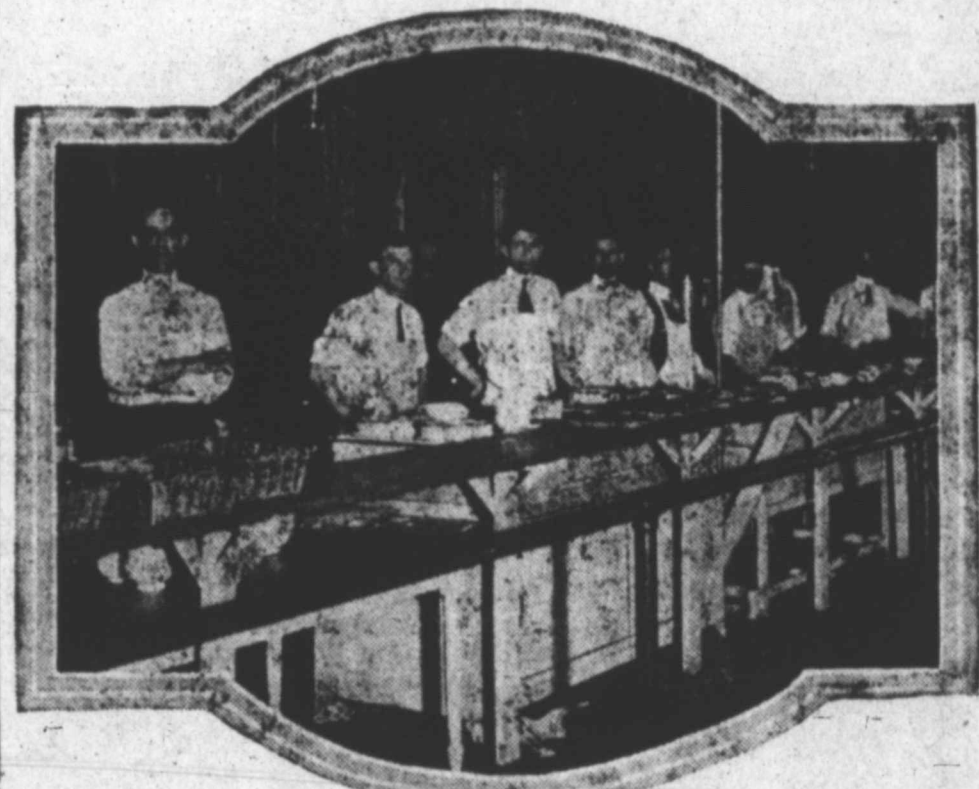
"The silo has been in use in Texas for the past twenty years, but as a commercial article entered four years ago. Since then the sale of silos has steadily increased, until now we have approximately 15,000 silos in use in Texas.

Although of proved worth in the North, and although the people of Texas recognize this, they were slow to recognize their utility for Texas. One vital reason for this was that all data furnished them was based largely on Northern experiment where crops, climate and conditions are very different from what they are in Texas. Southern people doubted whether the silo would be a success in a warm climate. This doubt has been dispelled because those who have tried the silo have found that the silo is more profitable in Texas than it is in the North.

Texas never has a surplus of feed for any length of time and more often there is a shortage. Therefore any kind of forage crop is valuable. The surest forage crop in Texas is the one that is planted early and that matures during June, July or August. This crop stands in the field until it is needed in December or January, and in the meantime, the winds and the heat of the summer rot it, and the birds and insects destroy so much of the seed that there is little of value left. In fact, 75 per cent of the crop is wasted by this method. This same crop, if put in a silo, when first matured, can be preserved without loss of food value, and, therefore, 100 per cent of the first food value is preserved.

One hundred and twenty-five thousand silos successfully used would not feed more than one-fourth of the cattle now in existence in Texas for more than one-third of the year. There is no farm so small that it could not sustain and use to advantage at least one small silo. And silos vary so much in size that they can be built at a cost of from \$100 to \$1,000 and, therefore, anyone can afford a silo. Many Texas farmers have decided that they can not afford to do without one, because it is a well known fact that a silo will more than pay for itself the first time that it is filled and fed out."

**THE CHEAPEST EATING-HOUSE IN TEXAS**



Here's a line of boys who are working their way through the University of Texas, by cleaning up tables and serving in the University Cafeteria. Manager Yeazey, at the extreme left, is not a student.

Fully sixty per cent of the student body of this great educational institution is either in whole or in part self-supporting, thus emphasizing the dependence of the poor student upon state-supported institutions of higher education. Meals here average but twelve cents each, and many students get their board here on the University campus for \$8.00 per month, the average is about \$11.00 per month. Rooms in University Hall nearby are obtained at from \$1.50 to \$3.00 per month, although there are not sufficient rooms to supply the demand at these prices. Not a cent is made by the management of the cafeteria—when it is discovered that a surplus is accumulating, the price of food is cut down. Here is actually board at cost. Besides furnishing cheap meals to over four hundred students per day, a half a dozen or more students are enabled to earn their board cleaning up tables, and otherwise serving the management.

**Progress of Women All Over World**  
By N. P. JONES, New Orleans, La.

The progress of women all over the world had the effect of giving women a desire for higher education. Women are now entering universities in every part of the world. In Germany the number has increased very rapidly. Recently the German government gave out a report that will be interesting to the women of the United States. The report states that during the last year the number of feminine students has grown from 2,795 to 3,213, and the percentage of women now in the universities, as compared with the whole student body, is 5.4 per cent, as against 2.7 per cent three years ago.

Of the present body of woman students the great majority (2,900) come from Germany. Of the foreign women, Russia furnishes over a third, America about a fourth and other European countries most of the others. Few woman students come from Asia, Africa or Australia.

The University of Berlin alone has over one-fourth of the total woman students of the empire, the exact number of women in the large universities at present being: Berlin, 904; Bonn, 289; Munchen, 262; Gottingen, 287; Heidelberg, 219; Freiburg, 189; Munster, 179; Breslau, 150; Leipzig, 129; Marburg, 126; Konigsberg, 107; Greifswald, 83; Halle a. S., 81; Jena, 65; Strassburg i. E., 52; Kiel, 40; Tubingen, 38; Giessen, 24; Erlangen, 21; Wurzburg, 16; Rostock, 6; all others, 3.

The departments of study to which the woman students give most preference are about the same as in former years, the enrollment by courses being: Philology and history, 1,768; medicine, 709; mathematics and natural sciences, 679; economics and agriculture, 91; ethics, 47; dentistry, 17; theology, 11; pharmacy, 8.

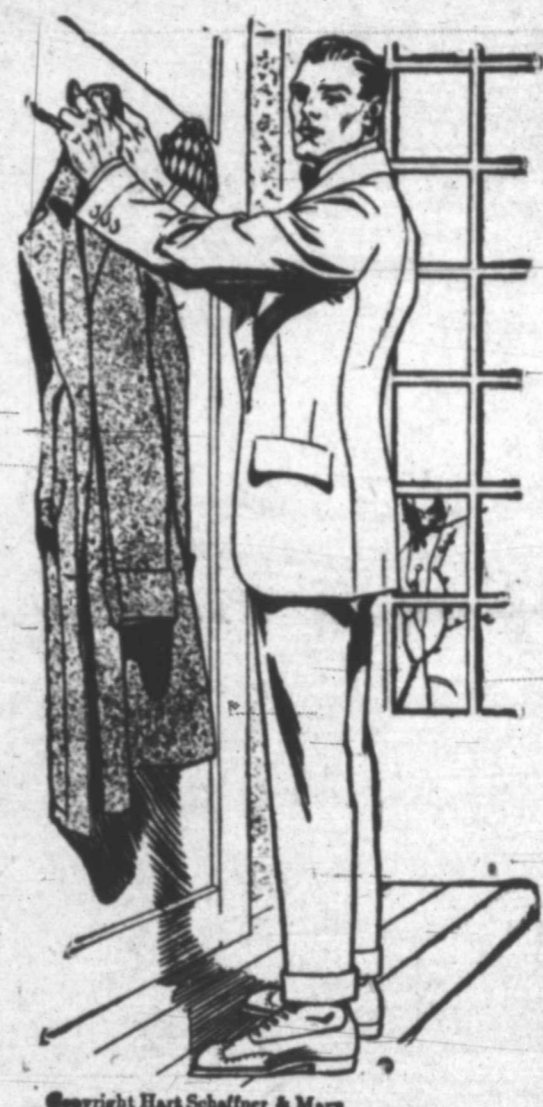
