\$5,000,000 of Lost Baggage.

"If the value of the baggage that American tourists were forced to leave in Europe last summer be estimated at the low average of \$50 a person, the total would amount to \$5,000,000."

This is the opinion of a writer in the Railroad Man's Magazine who made some observations in continental Europe in the early days of the war.

"Nearly every person," he says, "was obliged to leave his baggage behind while the more unfortunate minority had to leave tools of trade, because the railroads were so fully occupied with the transportation of troops and munitions of war that they had neither rolling stock nor time to bother with such inconsequential truck as baggage even at the high rates charged in Europe."

Public Lands Opened.

A statement issued by the secretary of the interior shows that during the first two and a half months of the present year 1,571,590 acres of public lands have been restored to entry and 52,843 acres have been withdrawn. The withdrawals have been chiefly for the protection of water power sites.

The largest restorations are of lands that have heretofore been included in coal lands withdrawn. Nearly 1,100,000 acres of this type have been restored in Montana and nearly 373,000 acres in Utah. There have also been approximately 42,000 acres released from oil land withdrawals in California and more than 21,500 acres in Idaho, and in Wyoming more than 124,000 acres have been released from phosphate withdrawals.

EXAMINE YOUR FLUES BEFORE PUTTING UP STOVE

Reports to the State Fire Marshal from December 10, 1910 to September 10, 1915, shows that 3766 fires, or 15 per cent of the total number that occurred in dwellings, private boarding houses and other like occupancies were due to unsafe flues. Assuming that the same proportion of fires reported, "Causes Unknown" is due to unsafe flues, the total number is 4580, or 20 per cent of all such fires. Unsafe flues cause a larger number of fires than any other thing to which fires are attributable. The saddest thing about this fact is that all such fires are preventable. They occur by reason of carelessness and indifference that almost amounts to criminal negligence. The season when fire must be had for warmth and comfort is almost here. HAVE YOU EXAMINED YOUR FLUES? The rule of ordinary prudence and business sagacity require that everyone make a careful examination of all flues in his property at the beginning of each season before fire is permitted in them. This precaution is absolutely imperative at the beginning of this season. Again we ask: HAVE YOU EXAMINED YOUR FLUES AND PUT THEM IN GOOD ORDER? If you have not, DO IT NOW. If you do not, and a fire occurs by reason of your negligence, destroying valuable property of your own and perhaps that of your neighbor's as well, your conscience will rightfully accuse you as responsible for a fire that you could have prevented by heeding this warning to EXAMINE YOUR FLUES.

Beef Cattle Scarce.

The value of beef cattle in the United States exceeds the value of all other farm stock combined. Large areas of cheap grazing lands have been the principal basis of the beef-cattle industry. More than two-thirds of the beef cattle in the United States are west of the Mississippi.

The Western pastures, however, are being rapidly converted into farms. Not since the country was first settled has contained so few beef cattle in proportion to population as now and the need of cattle to maintain the fertility of farm lands is greater than ever.

If we are to continue to produce as much beef as we eat, the industry will have to be extended on the general farms throughout the eastern half of the United States. There is no other farm animal which can use so large an amount of coarse feed, which can thrive in as wide a range of conditions of climate and attention, or which is so nearly free from disease and misfortune as the beef animal.

Take a Million-to-One Shot.

"To set an ordinary column of type," says a technical journal, "requires 10,000 pieces of type. There are seven positions in which each letter may be placed, and there are 70,000 chances to make errors besides millions of chances to make transpositions. In the sentence, 'To be or not to be,' by transpositions alone it is possible to make 5,759,022 errors.

If you let us do your printing in the linotype way, new type for every job, you only run the risk of that last five million and some errors. The linotype can not turn a letter upside down or completely invert it.

Of course, the possible maximum of trouble gets a boost when literature like telephone directories and club booklets come into the office.

Home Comforts on Farm.

Kansas Kärmer: It is not unusual to hear some young lady remark, "Oh if I could have a nice house in the country, with running water, a furnace, electric lights, bath tubs, and everything nice and convenient, I would like to live on a farm." Most of us can look back to the time when one of these things were even thought of it in the farm home. When man was conquering the wilderness he learned to get along with the bare necessities of life. With the passing of pioneer days has come the building of permanent homes, and the various comforts of life being added.

In some instances, however, the habits of the pioneer are so firmly fixed that these so-called innovations of modern life are ignored, and many a fine spirit has been broken and failed of its highest development, because of the hardships of living under pioneer conditions. Too often it has been in farm homes that these things have happened, and the inmates have suffered from lack of comforts, health has been broken, and lives have been narrowed and hemmed in by the harshness of the surroundings.

The mother in the farm home is certainly deserving of all that modern improvements can bring in the way of comforts and conveniences in the house. She is a partner in the business of making the farm financially successful, but too often we find the farm woman working longer hours, and with fewer conveniences than are found in the barns and in the fields. In the pioneer days it was necessary, but now we can have the water piped to the house; we can have the bath tub and the central heating plant that will warm the whole house to a comfortable temperature, and thus avoid the dangers of the cold room and inequalities of temperature in different parts of the same room. These things can be installed in the farm home at even less expense than in the city house, because much of the labor of the men of the farm. With a modern heating system the labor of carrying fuel to the various rooms is eliminated, the cleaning up of ashes and soot, always associated with fires in stoves is no longer necessary, and, perhaps most important of all, the health of the members of the family is guarded, and the home becomes more enjoyable to all.

Until farm life is made fully as satisfying as city life, the people of the farm will look with longing eyes to the time when they can retire to the city or town where it has become the custom to build homes equipped with all modern conveniences. The wiser plan by far is to bring these things to the farm.

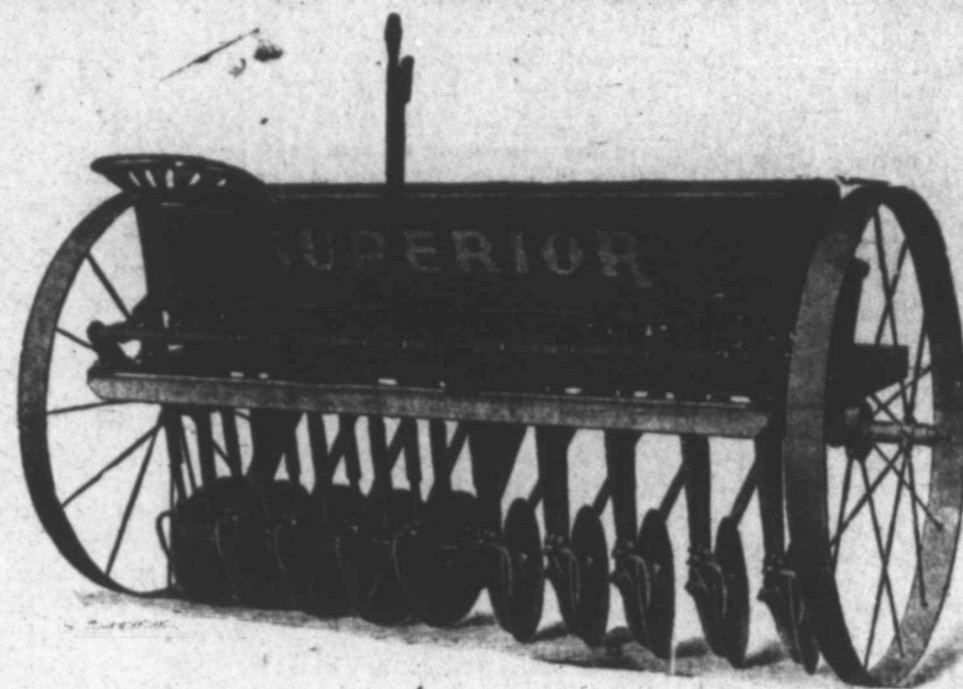

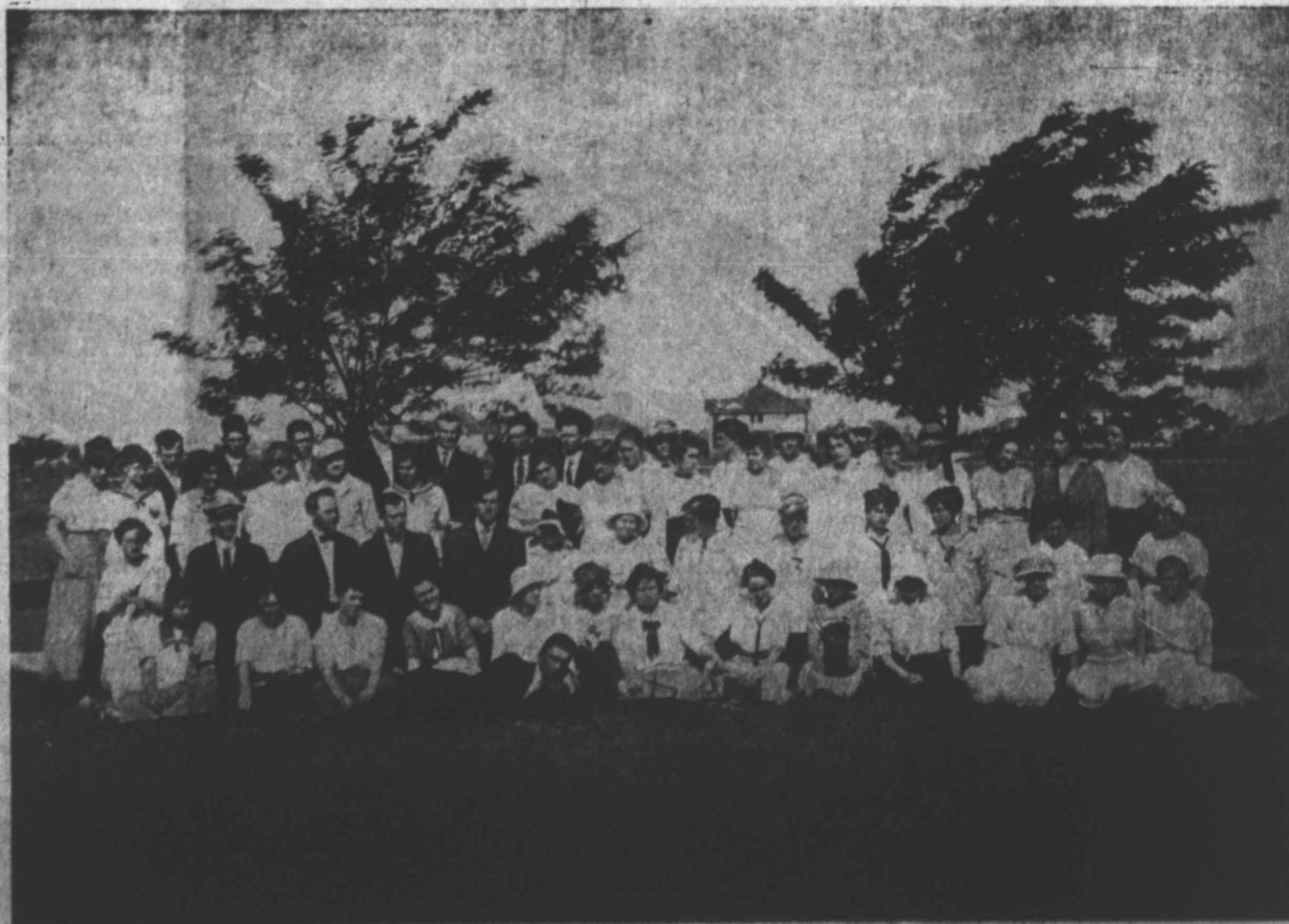
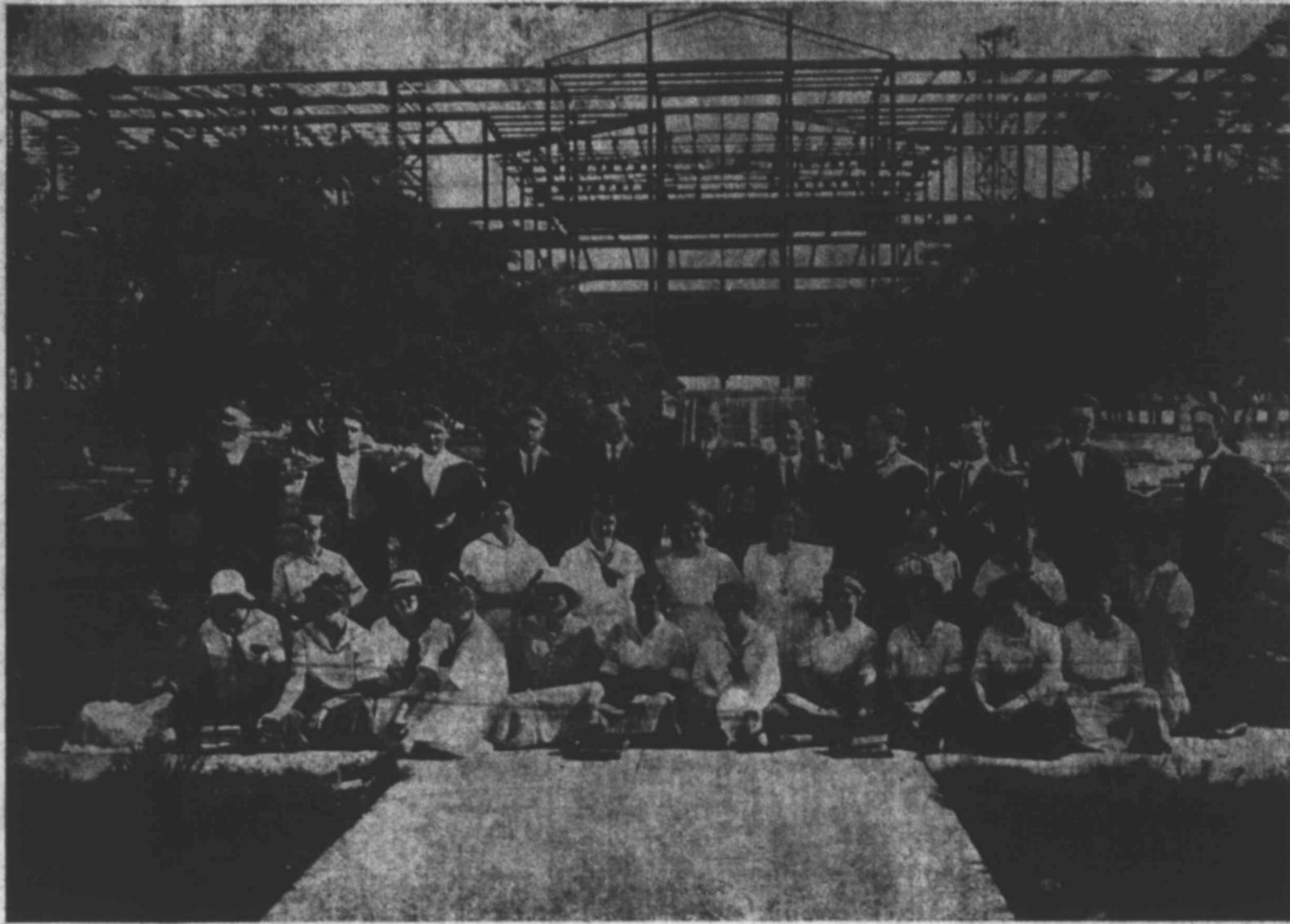

The minute-men of today will succeed in the struggle of life while the tardy, the careless and the indifferent will fall by the wayside.

Blue Law Survivals.

Before making new laws for a community, legislators should first repeal a few of the old laws still standing on the books even of the more enlightened cities and towns. In Cincinnati, for instance, a policeman or magistrate could make excellent records, either in arrests or convictions, merely by enforcing local laws that still exist. Under the law a policeman can arrest "every juggler who juggles on Sunday, every black-face minstrel who minstrels, and every girl who poses for living pictures on the Sabbath day." He can also summon the patrol wagon for the man who engages in a balloon ascension, or plays ball on Sunday. The penalty for any of the above offenses, committed after due warning, is a fine of not more than \$100 or a jail sentence of not more than six months or both.

It is unlawful, moreover, to do any kind of work on Sunday, to hunt, fish, or shoot firearms. Another law imposes a fine of \$1 for indulging in profane language on he Lord's day. It is illegal, also to "drive a horse, mule, filly, mare, colt, jackass, jennet, or any other animal, faster than six miles an hour within certain limits. Under a statute never repealed, it is unlawful to "exhibit any puppet show, wire-dancing, or tumbling, juggling or slight-of-hand" for money.

Is it any wonder that Americans are sometimes accused of having little respect for law? Such statutes almost tempt a person suffering from excess of animal spirits to take them out and smash them individually, just to see what happens.

Asking Favors.

Friendship always wavers, ceases to be sweet, if you're asking favors every time we meet. When I sit a-basking by cottage door, neighbors come up asking favors till I'm sore. "I would like to borrow your alfalfa stack; early on the morrow I will send it back." "Over at my shanty there is much to do; will you lend your auntie for a week or two?" Borrowers are chronic when they once begin, and I need a tonic for my cheer-up grin. Borrowing's a habit that will make your friend scamper like a rabbit when his way you wend. Borrowing will make you lonesome all your days for your friends will shake you and denounce your ways.
