The city now has only nine street lights, all on one street and Canyon is one of the poorest lighted cities on the plains. The additional cost for extra lights would be \$40 per month and practically every street in the city would be lighted. The business men were unanimously in favor of the city council installing the additional lights at once in order that the city might be properly lighted all night.

The business men will hold another meeting at the News office on the night of the 24th of this month when it is desired that all of the members of the city council be present in order to go further into detail regarding these two propositions.

Peter Radford ON THE AMERICANISM OF WASHINGTON



In these days when men earnestly inquire what true Americanism is, the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States afford a convenient touchstone for the citizenship. These documents promise the citizens the rights endowed upon them by their Creator and among these rights are mentioned life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. It is God-made and not manmade liberty that our government proposes to give its citizens. Our government denies man the right to create liberty or grant special freedom. We can only define and equally distribute them. Thomas Jefferson in writing the Declaration of Independence was so confident of the unity and patriotism of the people that he uses less

than ten per cent of space in laying down principles of government and the remainder is devoted to complaints against King George. Our forefathers in framing government spent almost their entire time in constructing machinery for preserving and distributing liberty to the people and spent very little time in defining it, although we have since added fifteen amendments to the Constitution, each specifically defining human right.

The Declaration of Independence was signed and the Constitution of the United States adopted by men who had dedicated their lives and their property to their country. Patriotism ruled the day and indifference to the public welfare was an unthinkable crime. But in this age, we have become so absorbed in business affairs that we have little time to kiss the bible, salute 20 Years Experience in the Sale Ring. the flag, read the Declaration of Independence or study the Constitution of the United States. The question uppermisst in the minds of the patriots who founded the government was "what can I give to my countrymen"? But the predominating question of this commercial age is "what can I get from my countrymeh"? These instruments of government have been compelled to do duty under both regimes. It is true we have had to re-write the Constitution, fought a war interpreting it and have placed fifteen patches upon it and have

filled libraries with laws expounding it, but it has stood the test. The Americanism of Washington places unbounded confidence in the people and trusts them and them alone with government and we elect men to serve, not rule, us. The citizen is made the soveerign and we have now almost twenty million kings-and a large number of queens-sitting upon the American throne and the responsibilities of government rest heavily upon their royal shoulders. The conditions now confronting the citizenship of this nation require that the traditions of Washington and Jefferson be Canyon about Jan. 1, 1916 ... 



THE WHEEL TURNS

Heretofore we have required TWELVE weeks for summer quarter credits, but in the coming summer (1916) students who do successful work for NINE weeks will receive credits for a full quarter's work, just as they do in the other State Normal Schools of Texas.

When the fire occurred in March, 1914, our institution fell to the lowest point in the arc below the center of the circle of possibilities, but still facing upward. Now our ascension has reached the highest point in the first quadrant, facing the sunrise, and our future is full of light. The spirit of the institution arises from the ashes of the past, purified from the fire, and invites, with confidence, the patronage of the public and the presence of those teachers who face the future, pressing forward to meet its responsibilities, to overcome its difficulties, and to assist in solving its problems.

ADVANTAGES OFFERED DURING THE SUMMER SESSION

FACULTY-A faculty composed of men and women of scholarly attainments, teaching ability, and progressive spirit.

CLIMATE—A climate unexcelled anywhere in Texas. Canyon is on the caprock of the plains, 3300 feet above sea-level, and is as "cool as Colorado." Light wraps are necessary on mornings and evenings; people coming for the summer should not forget to bring them.

THE NEW BUILDING-The new home of the West Texas State Normal College is a massive structure of steel, concrete, and brick. It is absolutely fire proof. The building is 300 feet long, nearly 200 feet deep, has a basement and three stories, and contains 85 rooms. The building is equipped with modern conveniences for the comfort and pleasure of the students. The main auditorium will seat 1400 people.

THE GYMNASIUM-The Gymnasium is a large room 100 feet long, 40 feet wide (inside dimensions), and 25 feet to the ceiling. The floor is of maple, highly polished. It is well equipped with modern apparatus for the various gymnastic exercises, and is under the supervision of competent instructors in physical education.

THE SWIMMING POOL- The Swimming Pool is 65 feet by 27 feet (water dimensions), and varies from 5 to 8 feet in depth. The pool is lined with white tiling, and is kept filled with sparkling water in which one may take a plunge after the day's work is over. In connection with the swimming pool are two separate rooms, one for men and one women, which have shower baths, both hot and cold.

THE LIBRARY-In the Library will be found 10,000 volumes of carefully selected books for collateral reading. Under the direction of a well trained librarian, these books will be at the service of the students. Many periodicals and daily newspapers are available for the free use of the students. The library and the reading rooms occupy one-fourth of the second floor.

LABORATORIES-There are six well equipped, separate laboratories; namely, (a) Agriculture, (b) Domestic Science, (c) Chemistry, (d) Biology, (e) Manual Training, and (f) Physics.

THE TRAINING SCHOOL-A school of observation in primary work is conducted by the Department of Education. The teaching is done by teachers of experience and special training, and is under the direction of the principal of the Training School. This work in observation is required of students doing credit work in the fourth year, and is open to all who desire to take advantage of it.

NINE WEEKS' SESSION-The session of the Summer School will open Tuesday, June 6, 1916, and continue until Monday, August 7. 1916. The Summer Normal will open Tuesday, June 6, 1916, and continue until July 27, 1916. Both series of examinations are open to students in both the Summer School and in the Summer Normal.

The summer session of the West Texas State Normal College has for the past five years continued for TWELVE weeks. In order to make the work uniform with the summer sessions of the three other State Normal Schools in Texas, this school will continue for only NINE weeks for the summer of 1916.

CREDIT COURSES-All the departments of the College will offer credit courses this summer. The departments of Manual Training, Spanish, and Expression have not heretofore done so.

SUMMER NORMAL REVIEWS-Review classes in all the subjects upon which the State Superintendent of Public Instruction requires examinations for the several kinds of certificates will be maintained.

FEES-The enrollment fee for all, both in the Summer School and in the Summer Normal, is \$102 The incidental fee is \$1, and the book fee is \$2. No fees are returned, except \$1 of the book fee, which is returned to each student upon withdrawal, provided all books taken from the library are returned in good order.

FREE TEXT-BOOKS-The text-books are furnished free by the institution; provided, however, that no student shall be allowed to draw more than six books at any one time.

LECTURES—During the summer session of 1916, several of the departments will offer one or more popular lectures pertaining to some phase of the work of the department.

INTERNATIONAL PEACE-Last summer The Carnegie Endowment arranged with the West Texas State Normal College to conduct a course in International Relations. This course was given by Mr. Hill, and it will be given again this summer.

THE CANYON-Every Texan should see the wonderful Palo Duro Canyon. This freak of nature extends for a distance of some twenty-five or thirty miles, through a level country, is from one to five miles wide, and reaches a depth in places of over 1000 feet. Every summer, students who wish to see this work of nature form themselves in groups, conducted by members of the faculty, and make trips to some

part of the Canyon. EXPENSES—Board and room in Canyon costs from \$15 to \$20 per month. Many students "bach" in clubs, and others do "light

housekeeping," greatly reducing the expenses of living.

MEETING TRAINS—Committees from the faculty, the Y. W. C. A., and the Y. M. C. A. meet the trains on Monday and Tuesday. June 5 and 6, to assist incoming students in selecting boarding places.

RAILROAD RATES-Rates on the basis of one and one-third fare for the round trip have heretofore been granted. We are sure that they will be granted again on the same basis. Students should purchase round trip tickets. In case the local ticket agent is not authorized to sell reduced rates, or refuses to do so, one should take a receipt for the fare to Canyon, as evidence for claims for reduction on return trip. As soon as one has made up his mind to come, he should consult the ticket agent about rates several days before starting and ask him to in-






