

FACULTY-A faculty composed of men and women of scholarly attainments, teaching ability, and progressive spirit.

CLIMATE—A climate unexcelled anywhere in Texas. Canyon is on the caprock of the plains, 3,300 feet above sea-level, and is as "cool as Colorado." Light wraps are necessary on mornings and evenings; people coming for the summer should not forget to bring them.

THE NEW BUILDING-The new home of the West Texas State Normal College is a massive structure of steel, concrete, and brick. It is absolutely fire proof. It is 300 feet long, almost 200 feet deep, four stories high, and contains 85 rooms. The building is equipped with all the modern conveniences for the comfort of the student, and the auditorium has a seating capacity of 1400 people.

GYMNASIUM AND SWIMMING POOL-The gymnasium is well equipped with modern apparatus for healthful exercise. The exercises are directed by competent instructors in physical education.

LIBRARY-The library, well supplied with books for collateral reading, is administered by a trained librarian. Many periodicals and daily newspapers are available for the free use of the students. LABORATORIES-There are six well equipped, separate laboratories; namely, (a) Domestic Science, (b) Manual Training, (c) Agriculture, (d) Physics, (e) Chemistry, and (f) Biology.

THE TRAINING SCHOOL-For the benefit of those students whose course requires it, a school of observation in the primary grades is conducted by teachers. All students are at liberty to visit the Training School at any time they desire.

NINE WEEKS' SESSION-The sessions of both the Summer School and of the Summer Normal will open June 6, 1916, and continue nine The Summer School has heretofore been continued for twelve weeks. In order that this school shall offer its work in the summer on the same basis as the other Texas Normal Schools, we have changed been making extensive purchfrom twelve weeks to nine weeks for this summer, and will give a full unit of credit for all work satisfactorily completed.

CREDIT COURSES-Credit courses are offered in all of the departments of the College. The Department of Manual Training, The Department of Spanish, and The Department of Expression, all will offer courses this summer, as well as those departments that have regularly offered courses heretofore.

SUMMER NORMAL REVIEWS-Review classes in all work upon which the State Superintendent of Public Instruction requires examinations for a more extensive scale.
