Don't Ignore Fly Menace This Season

Many persons do not realize what a erious Cienace the fly is to the health of this community. It is characteristic of the average man to ignore this kind of danger until it threatens his own family. "Oh, the fly may be the means of carrying a fatal disease to some puny person," you reason, perhaps, but there's no danger of his bringing it to me-I'm in pretty good shape. I eat three square meals a day and sleep all right."

That is a characteristic attitude of soldiers. Rather, it used to be so. Doubtless you remember the awful toll of life taken among the soldiers encamped at Chickamauga during the Spanish-American war. If you do not you can easily look*it up. Those boys in blue "died like flies." Flies caused the death of most of those stricken with typhoid and dysentery.

It came about in this way. Human excreta carries the bacteria of typhoid fever, cholera, dysentery, summer complaint, tuberculosis and intestinal dises of other varieties. Flies feed on human excreta, as you know if you have kept your eyes open.

The Lesson of 1898. Not a great deal about the value of camp sanitation was known in 1898. The American army medical corps was,

not organized as it is now. The mobilization place at Chickamauga was not clean. Garbage and sewage were not destroyed as they are now. In

that large body of men it was inevitable that some should be disease carriers. The waste matter which they threw off acted as an incubator for the bacteria which it carried. Flies and other insects, but especially flies, swarmed around the filth sinks and fed. They were a frightful annoyance at meal time, and they were the army's most deadly enemy for they distributed dangerous germs among all the men. As a result fever and bowel diseases became almost an epidemic. As a nation we were taught a solemn lesson about the menace of insects. Our army medical men learned more in the Philippines, in Cuba, in Porto Rico and in the Canal Zone about the relation of flies, mosquitoes and lice to the spread of disease than





C. O. Keiser, One of the Leading Dealers, Has Heavy Interests.

From Wichita Beacon - Between fifty-five and sixty thousand cattle are annually handled at Canyon. At the present time there are about fifty thousand within a radius of twentyfive miles of here, exclusive of this year's calves.

As to the markets: Most of the beef cattle are marketed at Kansas City and Chicago, but this immediate vicinity is annually covered by buyers from all over the country looking for breeding cattle. For example, within the past year C. O. Keiser has shipped from Canyon around 900 head of bulls, part of these bulls coming from Iowa, Illinois and Missouri, the rest of them being of his own breeding and raising These bulls were shipped to various points in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona. One lot of 300 head was purchased by an El Paso man. Another carload was shipped to Kansas.

Sold 2,000 Head. He also sold around 2,000 head of his pure bred range cows and yearlings, these being scattered over a territory from New Mexico to Missouri. For example, 950 "wet" cows were sold to nine different persons at Miami, Texas, and were probably the highest-priced wet range cows sold last fall in the territory west of the Missippi, 550 of them selling for \$100 each after the calves had been weaned, and 400 seven-year-old cows bringing \$75 each. He also sold to parties at Independence, Mo., 150 head of the seven-year-old cows at \$75 each.

Among his other sales of range cattle were 400 head of pure bred but not registered yearling heifers at \$75 each, 200 going to Tucumcari, N. M., and 200 to a wealthy ranchman at Amarillo. Earlier in the summer last year he sold 100 head of range cows for \$125 each, to go to Plainview,

Mr. Keiser's herd of registered Herefords is probably the largest and best known of any where in the entire Southwest. His first purchase was a herd of some 200 registered cows, very rich in Anxiety blood lines, some of which were direct descendants of cows imported from England by the late Senator Hershey of Iowa. The eagerness with which the ranchmen and farmers of the Southwest grasped the opportunity to buy such registered Herefords so close to home became so pronounced that Mr. Keiser was com. Iowa, Illinois and Missouri.

Territory is Vast.

Other carloads have gone to Deming Fort Summer, El Paso, Carlsbad, Encino and Albuquerque, N. M., and bulls and cows in lots of one to ten have been distributed over various other points in New Mexico. Two carloads of bulls were shipped to Red Rock, Arizona, last fall, and about two weeks ago he shipped 104 head to Douglas, Arizona, this last shipment being a mixed lot of cows, heifers, calves and bulls. Twenty-four cows were shipped to Gageby, Texas. Twenty cows were sold to go to Lubbock, Texas. Twenty-five two-year-old heifers were shipped to Miami, Tex. Another lot was shipped to Eureka, Kan., on the order of Miss E. Hammond of New York City. Various other bunches in lots of from one or two to ten or twenty have been sold and shipped to dozens of other points in these states. These cattle are sold at reasonable prices in comparison with their quality and breeding.

Cattle have wintered extremely well in this part of Texas, there having been no loss from lack of feed.

Has 64,000 Acres. Mr. Keiser has in the neighborhood of 64,000 acres under ownership and lease, besides a number of highly improved places which are being farmed. His ranches lay in different directions from Canyon, his feed and show yards being located on the Palo Duro Creek, about five miles from town. He has about 2,500 head of registered and pure bred but not registered cattle on hand a present, having disposed of his grade cows last fall.

He has bought some 200 head of registered bulls and cows in Illinois and Iowa, about one hundred of which are now in feed yards at Florence, Kans., being held there until they can be brought into Texas, which will be in about ten days. The others are now in transit to Florence. These cattle are the top individuals out of the best herds in Iowa and Illinois, are royally bred, and are probably the best lot of cattle ever brought into the South-



he West Texas State Normal College Building Received from the Gross Construction Company-The Event Appropriately Celebrated.

April 21, 1916, was all that could be desired as a type of the Panhandle's marvelous spring weather-bright, cool and bracing.

The Board of Regents arrived by way of the Santa Fe Railroad at 11:20 a. m. and were conveyed in cars immediately to the new building, where, with the architect and State Inspector of Masonry they made the inspection of the building. After luncheon at 1 o'clock, they transacted official business, and at 3 p. m. the program in the



GYMNASIUM AND SWIMMING POOL The gymnasium is well equip ped with modern apparatus for healthful exercise. The exercises are directed by competent instructors in physical education.

LIBRARY-The library, well supplied with books for collateral reading, is administered by a trained librarian. Many periodicals and daily newspapers are available for the free use of the students. The library and the reading rooms occupy one-fourth of the third floor.

The Summer School has heretofore been continued for twelve Jan 1, 1915, clearing away of the weeks. 




