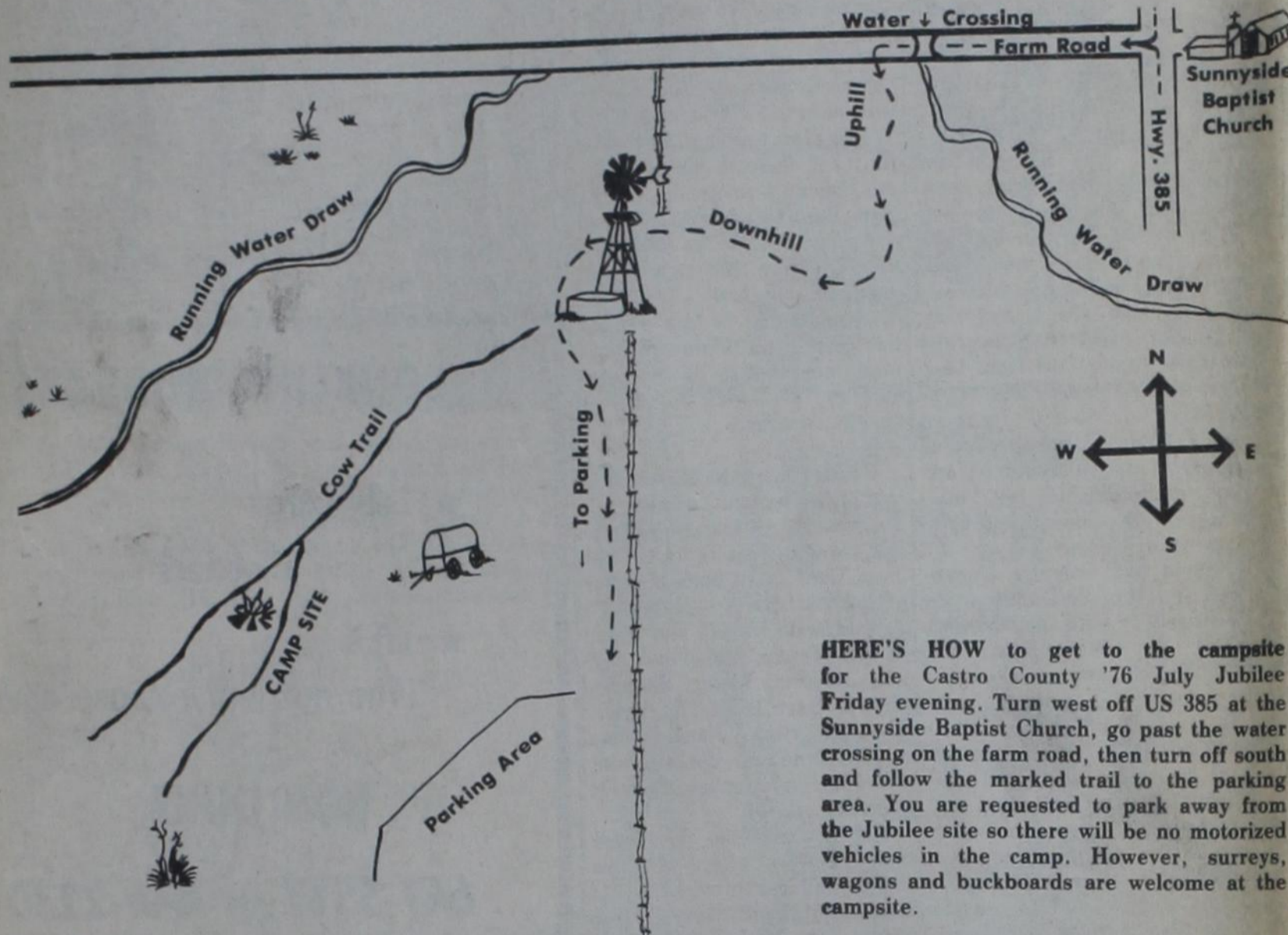

Prairie picnic set Friday



Castro County's Bicentennial celebrations will continue Friday evening with an old-fashioned prairie picnic on the historic Running Water Draw, 1 1/4 miles west of the Sunnyside Baptist Church.

ENTITLED "Castro County '76 July Jubilee," the event is open to everyone who wants to come and bring a picnic supper. Visitors, newcomers and former residents are especially invited.

Purpose of the Jubilee is to recapture one of the favorite events of pioneer days during the Bicentennial year.

The trail is marked and the campsite is ready for the '76 July Jubilee. Sunnyside Lions Club members have designated plenty of space for a separate parking area, sites for outdoor games and contests, and a place for the dinner and campfire fun afterward.

THE ROUTE to the Jubilee site begins with a turn to the west off US 385 on a farm road across from the Sunnyside Baptist Church, then a southward turn just west of the water crossing on the farm road, onto the marked route across the pasture which leads to the parking area.

From 6 to 8 o'clock, there will be games of volleyball, softball, badminton, frisbee, washer and horseshoe pitching, sack races and other contests, plus visiting. Old-timers who can demonstrate some of the pioneer farm and home skills such as soap making, cotton carding or harness mending are invited to show them to the younger guests.

Chow time will be from 8 to 9 o'clock, with each family bringing its own picnic supper. Sunnyside residents will provide water, tea and coffee for the crowd all evening. No alcoholic beverages will be permitted.

AFTER SUPPER, there will be entertainment of all types from 9 o'clock to midnight. The '76ers Bicentennial chorus will perform, and there will be group singing around the campfire, plus bluegrass and country music, square dancing, a Bicentennial skit, a patriotic flag service, story telling and relating of community history.

Those with horse-drawn wagons, buckboards or surreys are especially urged to bring their rigs. And a special invitation is out for guitarists, fiddlers, banjo players and other musicians who would like to take part in a hoe-down or perform solo.

82 parcels buried in capsule Saturday

Letters to descendants, snapshots, newspapers, locks of hair, bottles of vintage wine, Bicentennial coins, maps, commemorative stamps . . .

THESE WERE among the items that were in the county's 50-year time capsule Saturday when it was buried on the northeast corner of the courthouse square.

In all, 82 sealed packages and envelopes were placed into the capsule, along with a complete list of donors and intended recipients.

The capsule—a large PVC pipe seal-capped at both ends, donated by Kenneth Jackson Ditching Service—is to be dug up in July, 2026.

More than a hundred persons—most of them in pioneer costumes—attended the ceremony Saturday afternoon. And everyone there helped shovel dirt over the five-foot-long capsule after Richard Jackson, Jim Baker and Doyle Hoover lowered it into its four-foot-deep hole.

Conducting the ceremony were the "command quartet" of the Bicentennial Committee—General Chairman Linda Maxwell, Horizons Chairman Linda Roberts, Festival Chairman Carolyn Watts and Heritage Chairman Florene Leinen.

Ronald Reagan made his pitch Tuesday night on a nationwide television network. I gathered it was a last desperate effort to wrest the republican nomination for president from President Ford and his opening blast at the democratic nominee, Jimmy Carter.

If Reagan is right there is nothing right or good about our government anymore. He pointed out all of the shortcomings about the way our government functions at all levels and would have us believe that we are living under a totalitarian type of government that has no compassion for the individual citizen. If elected, he will make the necessary reforms and corrections, but he didn't say how he would do it.

I was convinced by Reagan's well-read speech that he totally disagreed with everything that both the republican and democratic parties stood for or advocated, and that the country would be better served by a candidate, meaning himself, elected by a new Majority Party. According to my best recollection Richard Nixon was the last candidate to be elected by the new majority party. In effect, as he has done all along, Reagan disavowed both major political parties and called for a realignment of enough disenfranchised voters to form a new majority. It won't work.

This government that Reagan holds in disfavor and contempt received a boost from Mr. and Mrs. America, across the entire country, in celebration of its two hundredth birthday. Despite Mr. Reagan's criticisms, this is the finest place in the world to live.

AFS student will miss Texas foods

Susan Ryan, Dimmitt's American Field Service exchange student for 1975-76, completed her year here last week.

SHE LEFT Sunday from Plainview, arrived in Arlington at 4 that afternoon and joined other AFS students from this region. Along with the group, she is now touring the eastern United States for 10 days en route to Washington, D.C.

On her final day in Dimmitt, the girl from Otautau, New Zealand, remembered several embarrassing situations which occurred when she first arrived here.

One experience which "I never told anybody about" took place when her American mom, Janice Bell, gave Susan the linens to put on her bed—including a contour sheet. Contour sheets are not used in New Zealand, and she didn't know

what exactly to do with it. She finally had to politely ask "Mom" for help.

SUSAN'S American family, the Lonnie Bells, remembered only one incident involving language difficulties. Susan asked them where the "sheer" was, and after much anguish she finally had to perform hand-motions representing the water coming from a shower.

As the year got underway, Susan began giving speeches to various clubs and civic organizations. She recalled one particular speech to the Sunnyside Lions Club in which she described the sheep of her homeland. In comparison, she said, the sheep in this area were "stringy." Susan's public speaking will resume shortly after her arrival in her native New Zealand, with a program to the Otautau Lions Club.

A GERMAN sausage dinner will be served and the afternoon program includes a baseball game, arts and crafts show and square dancing. The activities will close with a dance in the Community Hall.

Three projects will benefit from proceeds of the festival. Remodeling of the Nazareth Community Hall has just been completed and 75 percent will go to that fund.

The Nazareth Fire Department will receive 15 percent and the Community Center (the baseball park) will be given the remaining 10 percent.

Mrs. Dan Schmucker is chairman of plans for the dinner with Mrs. Leonard Schulte as co-chairman.

The annual German Festival at Nazareth recalls the national origin of most residents in the community, who add their own special flavor to the area's celebration of the US Bicentennial.

Clinic set for pet shots, tags

Pet owners in Dimmitt are urged to take their dogs and cats to the annual city tags and vaccination clinic Saturday.

IT WILL be held from 1 to 5 p.m. at the Dimmitt Veterinary Clinic at the north edge of the city on US 385. Cost of the vaccination for rabies immunization will be \$4 and the fee for a city tag is \$2. City Manager Garnett Holland said.

Rabies vaccination and a tag are required to comply with city laws.

Jack Tucker dies Thursday

Funeral services for Jack Tucker, 60, a resident of Dimmitt 22 years, were conducted Saturday afternoon in the First Baptist Church by Rev. John Street, pastor, assisted by Rev. Doug Manning of the Hereford First Baptist Church.

SPICER Funeral Home of Memphis was in charge of funeral arrangements, and Dennis Funeral Home directed burial in Castro Memorial Gardens.

Mr. Tucker died last Thursday night in a Memphis hospital. He had resided in Memphis part of the time the past two years while he was manager of a gin in the Lesley community west of that city.

He formerly owned and operated a gin and a motel in Dimmitt, and was a member of the First Baptist Church and the IOOF Lodge here.

BORN FEB. 21, 1916, at Newlin, he married LaNell Nelson Nov. 16, 1935 at Hedley. He and his family moved to Dimmitt in 1952.

Survivors are his wife; a daughter, Shirley Easterwood of Hereford; five sisters, Mammie Nest of Littlefield, Maudie Mitchell of Memphis, Elsie Huckaby of Houston, Ada Ward of Estelline and Jewel Glover of Muleshoe; a brother, Walter of Los Angeles, and one grandchild.

Girl suffers severe shock

Claudia Chavers, 11, daughter of Mrs. Beulah Mae Chavers, survived a severe electrical shock Friday night after she touched a wire or pipe on the Ferris wheel at the carnival grounds in Northeast Dimmitt.

SHE WAS taken to the Plains Memorial Hospital in critical condition, but her condition Tuesday was reported by hospital personnel as "improving now."

The accident occurred during the rain shower Friday evening when the ground was wet. Others in the crowd with the child were not certain what part of the amusement ride's mechanism she touched.

THE CARNIVAL manager saw her drop to the ground and immediately picked her up and took her to the hospital, the Dimmitt Police Dept. reported.

The attending physician said the carnival manager's quick action probably saved the girl's life.

"He got her to the hospital quickly, and we were able to start treatments right away to get her body functions started again," the physician said. "That man really performed a good deed. This kind of shock is usually fatal."

were credited with saving Strickland's life with emergency treatment. The Police Dept. said the two men ran to the accident scene, lifted the pickup off of Strickland and kept his mouth cleared so he could breathe until the ambulance arrived. Strickland reportedly was hemorrhaging at the mouth.

Strickland received emergency treatment at Plains Memorial Hospital, then was transferred to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital in critical condition. His injuries included a fractured pelvis, broken leg, broken ribs, multiple lacerations and internal injuries.

HE UNDERWENT surgery Sunday evening in Lubbock, and remained in critical condition two days. Wednesday morning the hospital reported that he was improving but was

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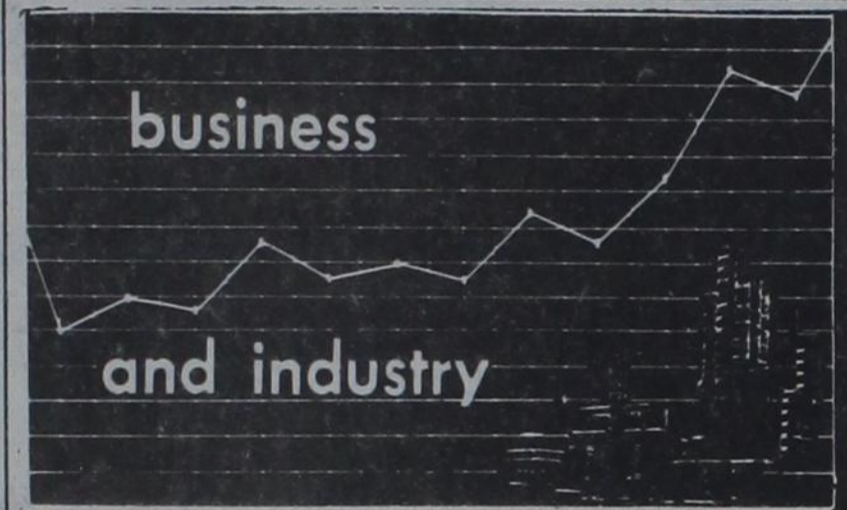

On Wall Street

Just about anyone who has a savings and loan account is aware that there is federal deposit insurance available to protect the depositor. It's mandatory with every savings and loan with the word "Federal" in the name, such as Mountain Federal Savings or Western Federal Savings.

BUT THERE are 806 state-chartered savings and loan associations with deposits of almost \$8 billion which do not have that federal insurance. In fact, there are some savings and loans which do not have any deposit insurance at all.

The dangers of under-insurance or no insurance were dramatically highlighted in Mississippi just this month when a massive run on a group of state-chartered savings and loans resulted in the first "bank holiday" declared by any state government since the Great Depression.

A moratorium on withdrawals was slapped on all 33 state-chartered savings and loans. It seems that many of them were unable to come up with sufficient cash to pay frightened depositors who were demanding a total of \$40 million in withdrawals. The run was triggered when the state's largest savings and loan was sued by shareholders.

RUNS spread to other savings and loans which did not have federal deposit insurance and the ban on withdrawals was imposed to give federal and state officials time to get the state savings and loans under the federal insurance, liquidate them or merge them into healthier ones.

A number of the state savings and loans had set up a captive insurance company to insure a total of \$425 million in deposits. It doesn't look as if depositors will have any protection from that source because the state's largest savings and loan, which owned 45% of the insurance company has already gone into receivership along with another one. One expert predicts there will be some loss to depositors, as much as 10% to 20%.

The prospects have brightened for 11 of the state savings and loans in recent days. They have been permitted to reopen

Deaf Smith REC to hike rates

Effective July 27, members of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative will have their electric bill computed under a new rate schedule.

Deaf Smith REC serves some residents in the north part of Castro County.

"IN THESE days of steadily rising costs, Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative is fortunate to wait this long before announcing a rate increase," said Board President Sloan Osborn.

The rate change will result in an overall increase of roughly 13% in revenue. This does not mean a member's total bill will jump by 13%, but only that the cooperative's base rate will increase by this amount on the average, Osborn said.

"The fuel adjustment charge, which is calculated in addition to the base rate, is not under the control of the management, staff or board of directors," Osborn said.

"This is simply a pass-through of fuel charges from our wholesale power supplier. Neither the cooperative nor our power supplier derive any revenue that can be applied toward the operation of the cooperative from this portion of the bill."

IN AN effort to cope with rising costs, as well as stay abreast of the "massive trends toward more electric loads," the board of directors feel the increase is necessary to maintain present levels of equity, he added.

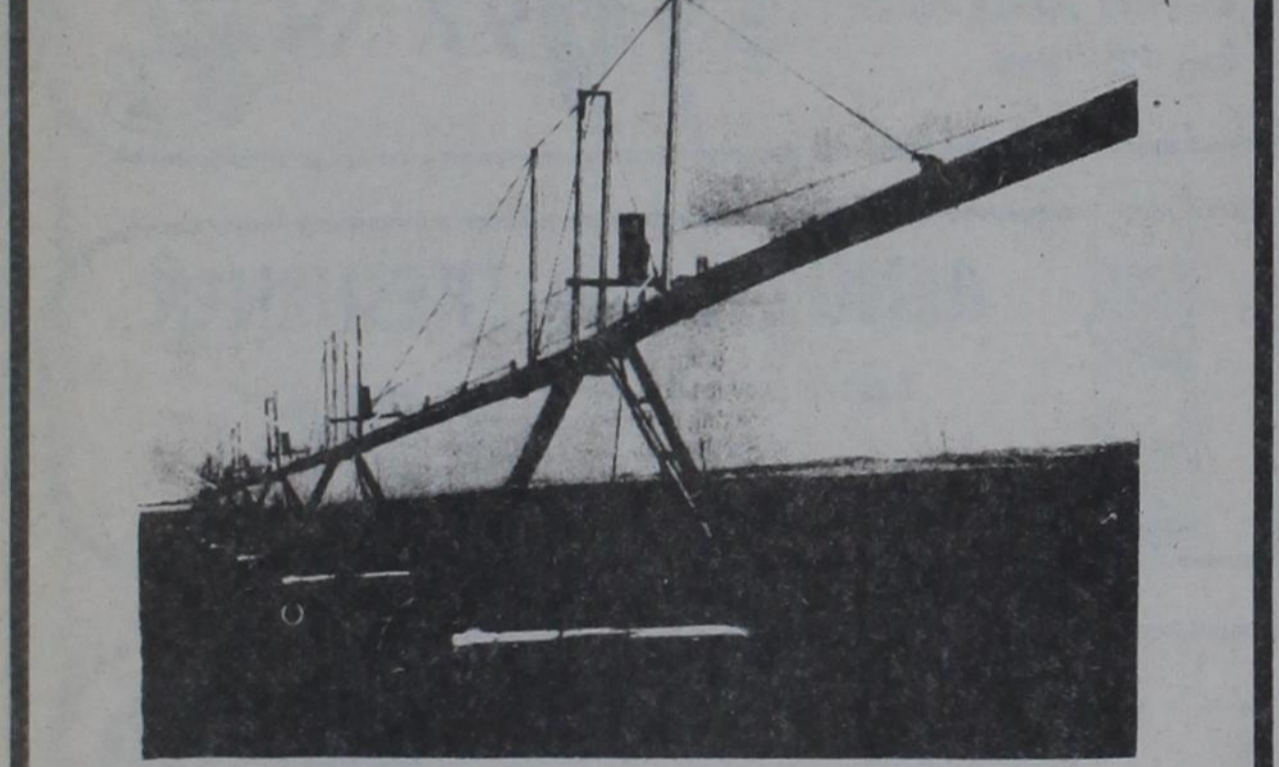

requests were 17 percent above the previous month's total.
Appraisal requests during the first 10 months of fiscal year 1976 totaled 504,175. This is 13 percent higher than for the same period in FY 1975.
GI home loan applications in April totaled 35,818, the highest monthly total since May 1974. The 303,423 applications received during the first 10 months of FY 1976 were 12 percent higher than the corresponding period in FY 1975.

HOME LOANS guaranteed by the Veterans Administration have exceeded the nine million mark. Of the 9,001,120 loans guaranteed by the VA—totaling \$119.7 billion—nearly 4.8 million have been repaid in full.

Since the GI home loan program began in 1944, veterans of World War II, Korea, post Korea and the Vietnam era have benefited from the more liberal financing terms offered by lenders on VA-guaranteed mortgages.

The VA operates three programs to assist eligible veterans to become homeowners—loan guaranty, direct loan and grants for specially adapted housing for severely disabled veterans.

The amount of loan VA will guarantee is limited only by the appraised value of the home and the capacity of the veteran to repay the loan on installments. Direct loans made by the VA, however, are subject to a maximum of \$25,000. In many instances veterans obtain guaranteed or direct loans without down payments.

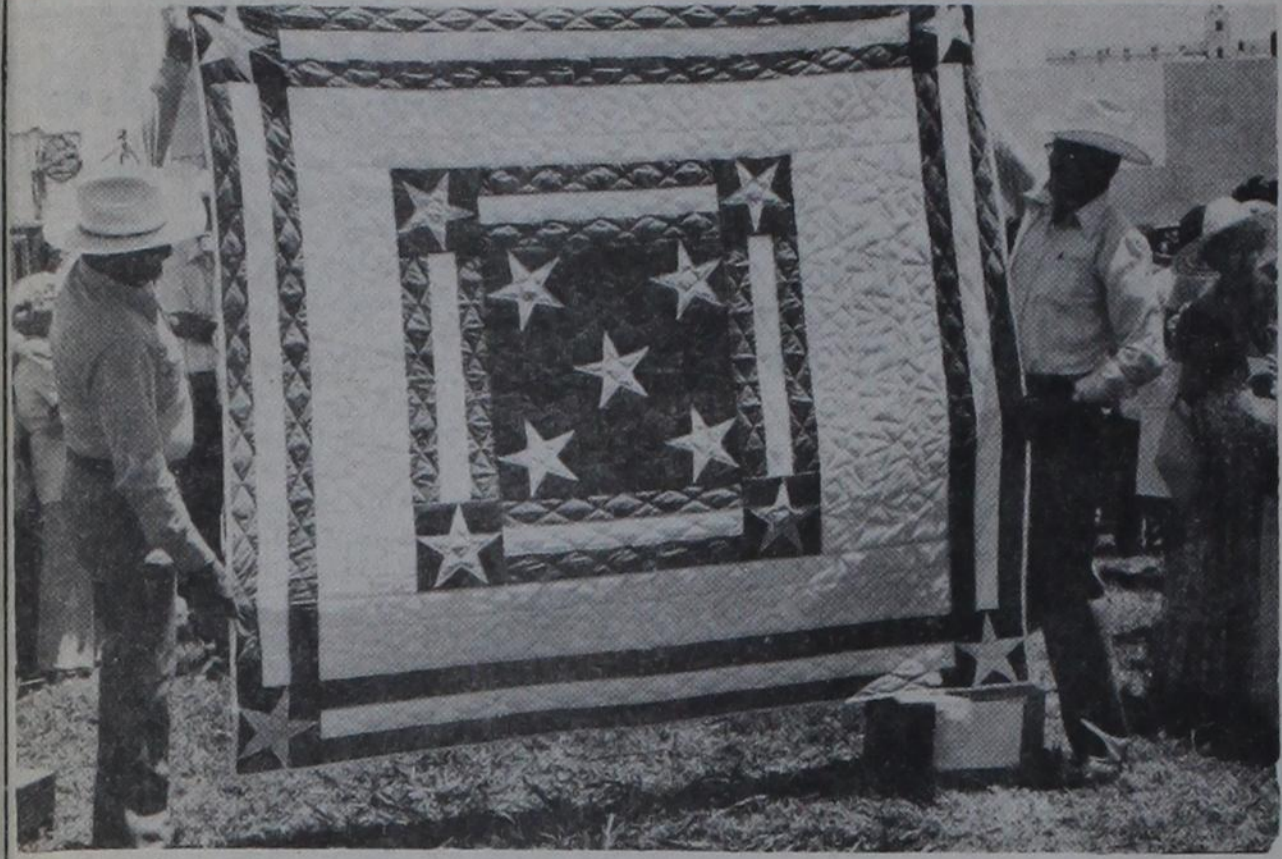

Policeman almost shot during brawl at dance

A Dimmitt policeman narrowly escaped being shot Sunday morning when a 45-caliber Colt automatic pistol discharged four inches from his head as he was trying to wrest it from a man on the Star Dance Hall parking lot in East Dimmitt.

THE INCIDENT was part of a 1 a.m. brawl that involved city policemen, county sheriff's deputies, state highway patrolmen and two security guards, Police Chief W. W. Jones said.

Almost shot during the fracas was City Patrolman Santos Perez Jr., who was trying to break up a fight involving a man who had a pistol.

Perez reported that he and Deputies David Slaughter and Don Elliott were talking to a man on the dance-hall parking lot when he noticed two men fighting nearby. He said he went over to break up the fight and discovered that one of the men had a pistol. The man was later identified as Edward E. Bernal.

PEREZ SAID he grabbed the barrel of the gun and was assisted by another man in trying to get the pistol away from Bernal. Although he told Bernal he was a police officer, Perez reported, the man would-

n't release the pistol. In the scuffle that followed, Perez reported, he pointed the pistol to the ground and it went off approximately four inches from his head.

When he heard the pistol shot, Deputy Slaughter rushed over and helped subdue the man, the Police Dept. reported.

At the same time, a series of other fights broke out on the parking lot that involved Elliott, Highway Patrolman Dyrle Maples and Elias Nava and two security guards from Hereford, the Police Dept. said.

"A LOT of subjects wanted to get into the fight, and all these officers had their hands full at this dance," Perez said in his incident report.

Perez was taken to Plains Memorial Hospital for observation.

Bernal was treated at the hospital for a head laceration, then was booked into the county jail. He is charged with assault with a deadly weapon on a police officer, and is now in jail under \$30,000 bond.

Police Chief W. W. Jones said the city commission is considering ordering the dance hall closed as a result of the incident.

Wheat harvest almost complete

Wheat harvest, virtually completed in Castro County, showed a "surprisingly good" total yield, although protein content was generally lower than last year, elevator operators over the area agreed this week.

MEANWHILE, the harvest of vegetables is beginning now with russet potatoes and white and yellow onions coming in at the La Mantia, Cullum, Collier & Co. sheds here. Albert Maxwell, manager, said prices on onions are rather low at the start of the season, while the potato market appears more stable and likely to rise soon.

At least 95 percent of the wheat crop has been harvested. Easter Grain Co., Castro County Grain and Flagg Grain Co. all said they have completed work. Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc., reported only a trickle of wheat coming in now, while Bruegel & Sons and W&C Grain, Inc., said they were 99 percent through with this year's wheat crop.

Dewayne Brown of Farmers' Grain Co. at Hart estimated 95 percent of the crop in, and Sunnyside Grain said the harvest is 95 to 97 percent finished. Yield was "about the same"

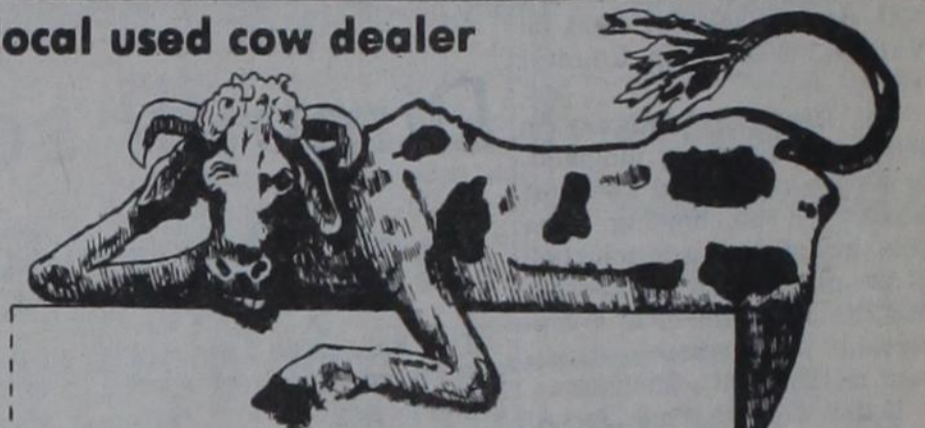
