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GOVERNMENT BLACKLEG VACCINE FROM FORT WORTH

Bureau of Animal Industry Co-Operates with Cattlemen in Eliminating Loss From Blackleg

Stock owners generally, in Texas, will be interested in the decision of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture to make its local office at Fort Worth a distributing station for black leg vaccine. The loss of young cattle from this disease in the state of Texas is considerable. It is being reduced to a minimum by those progressive stock owners who regularly vaccinate.

To secure the Government vaccine stock owners should request for application blanks to Dr. L. J. Allen, 217 Live Stock Exchange Building, Fort Worth, Texas. Vaccine will be sent on request made on blanks prepared for the purpose, but only to actual stock owners for their cattle alone.

The Bureau of Animal Industry, through its Fort Worth office, is co-operating with the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Texas, County Commissioners' Courts and stock owners in the eradication of the cattle tick which transmits Texas or Splenic Fever. About 40 per cent of the original area quarantined in the United States for these ticks have been cleaned up under such cooperative efforts, and released from quarantine. Systematic dipping is the only method used. A great volume of this work is being done in Texas. Three quarters of a million head of cattle, in some twenty counties in Texas, are being dipped at regular intervals for tick eradication, in approximately 900 vats, most of which have been built since January 1st.

COME TO CANYON TO LIVE.

Canadian Bridge Opened.

Hemphill county's new wagon bridge across the Canadian river at that place is completed and is now open to traffic of all kinds. This bridge was built by the Canton Bridge Co., and cost, including the approaches, about \$77,000. It is built of steel and concrete and is one of the most substantial in the state.

In order to vote sufficient bonds, a special act of the State Legislature was necessary which act was passed in 1913. This new bridge will mean much to Hemphill county and all of the other counties in the north Panhandle and will bring a great deal of additional trade to Canadian. A fine public highway is now being constructed by the county on the north side of the river.

Letter from Herb Miller.

The News has the following letter from Herb R. Miller, of this force, who is now chasing Mexicans on the border with Troop B, from Amarillo.

Ruidosa, Texas, Aug. 4.

Well, I am on the river at last. All but 54 men from all four troops left last Friday morning and hiked on horses, reaching Ruidosa Sunday night. Tuesday morning twenty of us remaining fifty four men left on a train of seven trucks loaded with rations and equipment, and got here about 5 o'clock that evening. We made extra good time considering the rough roads. After about the first ten miles came through mountains all the rest of the way. A train of 39 trucks left Marfa on the morning before and we caught up with them about dinner with seven or eight trucks mired in the mud clear to the bed in a valley. After some pushing and pulling we managed to get our train through and on our way again.

Ruidosa is 57 miles from Marfa and we only passed three little adobe houses occupied by Mexicans after passing the last ranch house a couple of miles from Marga.

When we reached this burg, we ate supper and then went swimming in the Rio Grande. I went across onto Mexico soil for my first time.

Ruidosa is built right on the river and is entirely surrounded by mountains. There are about twenty-five houses, a church, postoffice and a couple of general stores here, all run and occupied by Mexicans. Even the postmaster is a Mex. There are no Americans here at all and only three Mexicans that can speak English.

The troops take turns in standing guard each night. The posts are strung out up and down the river and on the mountains. There are three guards on each post and each guard stands four hours. From 7:00 p. m. until 7:00 a. m. I stood guard on the picket line the next night after we got here and I could hear the Mexican lions crying all the time in different directions. Believe me, it would put a good man to thinking when everything is still at night on the hills and all at once he hears one of those cats begin to cry. The Mexicans here say there is lots of game around here but I haven't seen anything myself.

Last night we had a little fun when we had a "call to arms." Troop A was on guard and about 12:40 the guard on post No. 3 yelled "Halt, Halt!" and fired three shots and called for the corporal of the Guard. In ten minutes the whole squadron was dressed and out in line ready for action. After an investigation over the post, nothing could be found but a couple of burrows so we were dismissed and went back to bed. While dressing and falling into line everybody was talking and laughing and none seemed to be excited.

All the Canyon boys are getting along fine. We have gotten several packages of "good eats," such as candy and cake, etc., from our Canyon friends, which we always appreciate very much as luxuries are mighty scarce in the army. Several of the boys (including myself) have slept on the ground with only one blanket ever since we left San Antonio.

I got my first Randall County News yesterday. Thank you, do it again.

There is an old Catholic church building here that hasn't been used for ten years. Inside is an altar decorated with flowers, crosses, pictures, and long candles made of goats fat, partly burned, and still standing in their holders. It is now being remodeled for an army hospital. It is very cool inside. I was on a detail yesterday to help put a new mud roof on the building. We mixed hay in with the soil and water and then carried it to the roof and let it dry. I think I'll learn the trade.

Well, I must close as it is nearly dark. The sun goes down earlier than ordinarily on account of the mountains.

SURRENDERS TO HUNGER; NOT FOE

Prussian Guard Maintains Its Reputation for Bravery.

OVILLERS A RUBBISH HEAP

British Capture of Town Result of Bitterest Fight in Battle of Somme—Dogged and Desperate Defense.

With the British Army in the Field. —In all the recent fighting the struggle for Ovillers stands out separately as a siege in which both attack and defense were of the most dogged and desperate kind.

The surrender of the remnants of its garrison ends an episode which will not be forgotten in history. These men were of the Third Prussian Guards, and the tribute paid to their bravery by our commander in chief is re-echoed by the officers and men who fought against them. It is a tribute to our own troops also, who, by no less courage, broke down the stubborn resistance and captured the garrison.

Town Now Rubbish Heap.
Many different battalions had a share in the fighting. All had suffered and then gave way to new men who knew not the nature of this business, but set grimly to work to carry on the slow process of digging out the enemy from his last strongholds. It was almost literally the work of digging out. The town of Ovillers does not exist. It was annihilated by bombardments and made a rubbish heap of bricks and dust.

But after that, when our men were separated from the enemy by only a yard or two or by only a barricade or two, the artillery on both sides ceased the fire upon Ovillers, lest the gunners should kill their own men.

They barraged intensely round about. Our shells fell incessantly to the north and east, so that the beleaguered garrison should not get supplies or reinforcement; we made a wall of death about them. But though now no shells burst over the ground where many dead lay strewn, there was artillery of a lighter kind, not less deadly. It was the artillery of machine guns and bombs. The Prussian guards made full use of the vitiated cellars and ruined houses. They made a series of small keeps, which were defended almost entirely by machine gun fire.

Between the attacks of our bombing parties they went below ground into dark vaults, where it was safe enough from trench mortar and hand grenades, leaving a sentry or two on the lookout for any infantry assault. As soon as we advanced the machine guns set to work and played their hose of bullets across the ground which our men had to cover.

Guard Finally Gives Up.
One by one, by getting around about them, by working zigzag ways through cellars and ruins, by sudden rushes of bombing parties led by young officers of daring spirit, we knocked out these machine gun emplacements and the gunners who served them, until yesterday there was only a last remnant of the garrison left in Ovillers.

These men of the Third Prussian Guard long had been in a hopeless position. They were starving because all supplies were cut off by our never-ending barrage; they had no water supply, so suffered all the tortures of great thirst. They were living in a charnal house strewn with the dead bodies of their comrades and with wounded men delirious from lack of drink.

Human nature could make no longer resistance, and at last the officers raised the signal of surrender and came over with nearly 140 men, who held their hands up.

The fighting had been savage. At close grips, in broken earthworks and deep cellars, there had been no sentiment and British soldiers and Germans had flung themselves upon each other with bombs and any kind of weapons, but now, when all was ended, the last of the German garrison was received with the honors of war and none of our soldiers deny them the respect due to great courage.

Hen Hatches Woodpecker.
Federalburg, Ind.—It is unusual for a hen to hatch out a woodpecker, but an instance is reported by Ira Cordrey, a farmer living near here. The hen had been missing for some time. When found she was mothering eleven baby chicks and one tiny woodpecker, which appeared perfectly happy to let the hen scratch worms for it, and the hen is paying just as much attention to the little woodpecker as it is to her brood of chicks. The woodpecker's appearance is explained on the supposition that a woodpecker laid the egg in the hen's nest while the hen was off looking for food.

Compromise Ends 20-Year Litigation.
Asheville, N. C.—After litigation covering a period of 20 years and involving court proceedings in several states, the Gilbert Hopkins case, to determine title to timber lands in North Carolina and Tennessee valued at \$1,500,000, has just been settled by a compromise decree entered in federal court at Asheville, N. C.

A physician writes to Farm and Fireside saying: "That the very best disinfectant known to science does not seem to be known to some people at all.

"I allude to boric acid, or, as some people call it, boracic acid. It is exceedingly efficient, safe and economical. It is a white powder, and makes the best dressing for wounds that modern doctors have ever discovered. In using peroxide of hydrogen it is always necessary to remember that while it is a disinfectant it is not a healing remedy at all, as it is acid in reaction and stimulating, rather than healing, to wounds. Boric acid is mild and safe in its action, promotes rapid healing of wounds, can be used as a dressing powder or, dissolved in water, as a cleansing solution. Boric acid in solution makes an excellent gargle for sore throats or a lotion for sore eyes, and as it is not at all expensive a pound box of it should form part of the domestic supplies of every family. Always remember that boric acid is nonpoisonous in any ordinary quantity usually used, while bichloride of mercury and carbolic acid are exceedingly poisonous. For disinfecting and deodorizing drains, the crude or unrefined carbolic acid is one of the best agents obtainable."

POULTRY POINTERS

When hens are allowed free range they are apt to feed too heavily on grass, especially if not fed any grain, and the eggs become watery and weak, with impaired keeping qualities. Such eggs are known on the market as "grass eggs."

In wet weather when the hens' feet are muddy, collect the eggs twice a day. This will insure cleaner eggs.

Clean fresh water lessens disease. Filthy drinking water is the source of much trouble. Clean the drinking pans frequently.

Add to the grain feeds with a mixture such as bran, shorts and corn meal.

Cut the spurs off your roosters. There's enough war in Europe you can do without fighting in your chicken yard.

Do not keep unnecessary male birds. An extra hen eats no more and may lay eggs.

Soft fresh dirt is an insurance against leg weakness in chicks.

Summer shade insures thrifty chicks. Never wash eggs, it destroys their keeping qualities.

The profession of forestry, which has developed in recent years, is of especial interest to the boy who loves out-of-door life. Trained foresters are employed by the United States forest service, by state forest commissions, lumber companies, railroads and other private organizations. There are 168 national forests in the United States, cared for and protected by the forest service of the department of agriculture, says Boys' Life. Many young men are entering this service. There are definite requirements about which information may be obtained from the United States civil service commission at Washington. Education counts a great deal in forestry. The lower positions in the government service are filled by competitive examinations; the higher positions are usually filled by promotion on merit. Merit in such work, as in many other lines, develops best out of a thorough and broad education. With out such an education it is not possible to become a professional forester. Forest rangers need not be highly educated, but they are woodsmen rather than trained foresters.

We are law crazy. In the last five years our National and State law-making bodies have passed 62,550 laws, forgetting perhaps that God Almighty has made a very fair success out of his universe with only ten. This country, the greatest business organization in the world, permits fifty-five different systems of bookkeeping in Washington and fewer than fifty of the 422 members of Congress before the present one ever looked a payroll in the face.
