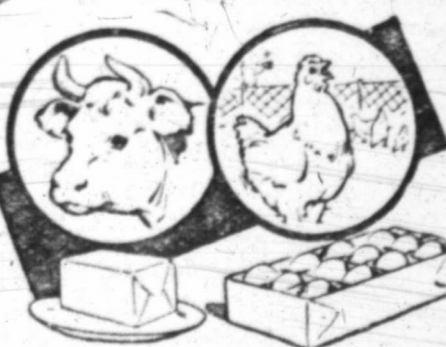

Linseed Oil For Cattle.
A veterinarian writing in a foreign exchange, pays a high compliment to a comparatively inexpensive method product—a product that is available on practically every stock farm. Reference is made to linseed oil. As the writer in this case has many years of experience in actual practice, his advice unquestionably is well worth heeding. Referring specifically to the ailments for which linseed oil is a good remedy, he says:
"In an acute form of indigestion, in stoppage, impaction of the rumen, chocking, distressful breathing or flaccid attacks which the owner may not be able to diagnose, he can hardly by any possibility do wrong in giving a dose of linseed oil, but will, on the contrary, in 99 per cent of cases, prepare the way for the professional veterinarian. The observant stockman will often make a good guess as to the nature of an illness where such prominent and unmistakable symptoms as hoven are not present.
"The veterinary surgeon will be glad to hear all that he has to say as to the history and symptoms observed, without accepting his state-

ments as a diagnosis. If a message, telegraphic or verbal, is to be sent—and one would like to say here that a written one is always preferable—it should contain the leading symptoms, as noted by the attendant or owner, and not a mere assertion as to what may be the matter.
"The opposite error is the more frequent however, and a message saying: 'Cow very bad; come at once,' is typical of the summons one gets to attend at some hill farm miles away, where nothing is procurable, that the practitioner does not carry with him. How often has the writer been burdened with a heavy kit for calving, and a battery with which to cope with milk fever, only to find them all useless in the presence of a case of garget, or red water, or perhaps a broken leg! Messengers arrive with no knowledge whatever of the case about which they are sent; the least intelligent person is selected as a messenger, because his time is of little value.
"When an animal is observed to be ill the owner should always have in his mind the possibility of infection, and while waiting for professional guidance remove it if practicable to a building or yard where isolation is possible, cleansing and disinfecting the manger and stall after moving the food. Such a precaution may arrest the spread of disease and disaster, while the time lost if subsequently proved unnecessary, is the merest trifle.
"A sick animal should not be worried by everyone about the place examining it in order to offer his 'opinion' and advice, but kept quiet when decided upon what course to pursue. There are certain things to be noted and mentioned when sending for a veterinary surgeon, which may enable him to select from his armamentarium instruments or medicines likely to be required. The stockkeeper should know that the temperature of the ox only varies slightly between 99.5 and 102.5 Fahrenheit; being affected by digestion, and occasionally registering another full degree without any departure from health.
"Whatever the temperature proves to be should be stated in the message sent, as negative evidence is often valuable in diagnosis. Hurried, distressed, or irregular breathing should be mentioned.
"When one considers the present value of cattle, even beef cattle, it will be conceded that it is quite worth while to have in mind certain precautions to be taken immediately in a case of sudden illness of individuals in the herd. The suggestion made here is unquestionably a valuable one, as no harm can be done by giving a dose of linseed oil, while on the other hand, it may be all the aid that an ailing animal will require.—Iowa Homestead.

Safety in Arbitration.

While the heated controversy between the railroad managers and the Brotherhood of Trainmen was going on at Washington, it seemed to escape public notice that the International Typographical Union, perhaps the strongest body of workmen in this country, was signing in Baltimore, a five years' agreement with the American Publishers' Association by which every difference between the union and its employees will be arbitrated along fixed lines.

The greatest issue involved in the railroad controversy was that of arbitration, for its overthrow, as was well said by Mr. Holden, "would imperil all that had been accomplished in the peaceful adjustment of labor controversies by methods of arbitration."

This fact was recognized by President Wilson in his telegram to Colonel Pope, when he declared that he "held to the principle of arbitration with as clear a conviction and as firm a purpose as any one." This was a wise conclusion, for obviously it would be preposterous to refer all labor disputes to the White House.

The contention of the railroad men was foreseen three years ago when, at the urgent solicitation of the heads of the railroad brotherhoods, including three of those who are still in office, the Newlands Law was passed by which railway controversies over wages and hours of employment could be arbitrated.

The very serious questions raised on both sides at Washington demanded earnest investigation by fair-minded arbitrators. These questions included the claim of the railroads that an annual \$100,000,000 was involved, that an eight-hour day meant recoveries of only 400,000 employees out of 2,200,000, and that protests against the strike signed by thousands of railroad employees proved that the demand for an eight-hour day was made by only 18 per cent. of the railroad men.

On the other hand the trainmen claimed that their hours of service were severe, and that they were justly entitled to the relief they sought. In any controversy involving such wide differences, arbitration would be the wisest, safest and most equitable plan of adjustment.

A jury decides on the innocence or guilty of every man in every court. It passes on the question of damages to persons or property. The jury is the arbitrator of the law. The whole tendency of the times is to extend the influence and potency of arbitration. Even a high court of peace for all the nations has been invoked, and it is conceded that arbitration would have prevented the awful war in Europe.

In Canada and Australia, labor disputes must be arbitrated before there can be a strike. The public welfare is considered of prime importance. The people of this country have a right to demand that they receive first consideration from our lawmakers.

If they do not impress this demand upon their members of Congress, they invite a succession of evils, the end of which no man can foresee.

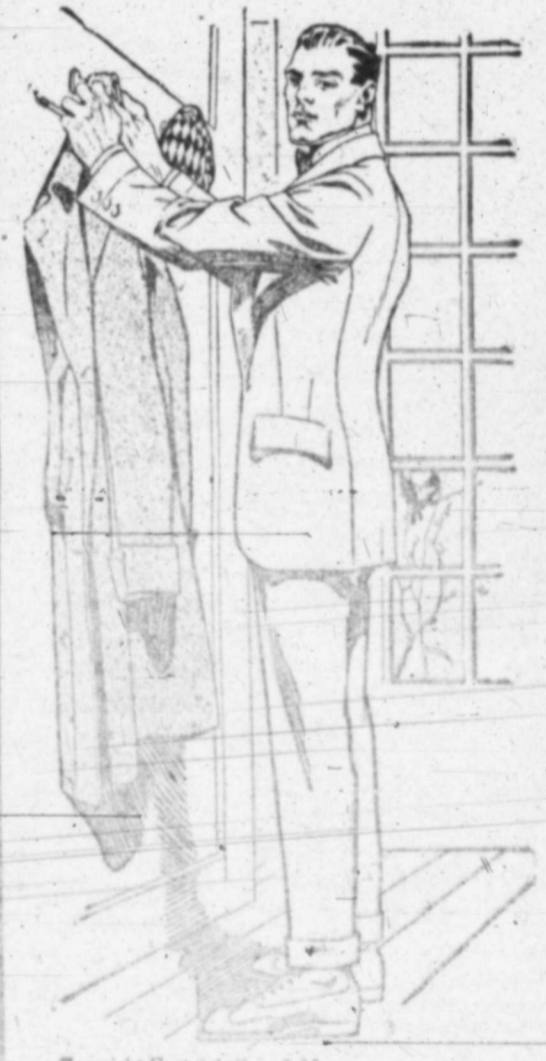

Lambs Will Be Worth 14 Cents and Wool 50 Cents April First?

Plainview Herald: From a man who has had fifteen years' experience in feeding sheep in this and other states The Herald has secured the statement below. In the belief that the sheep industry is a good one for South Plains people to foster, we are pleased to present this statement, for the veracity of which we vouch, knowing personally and well the man who gives it, but who shrinks from the public use of his name: "The American Breeder" says fat lambs will be worth 14c per pound before 'April Fools' Day, and that some grades of wool will be worth 50c per pound 'in the dirt.' "My observation for the last twenty years is that fat lamb prices do not generally commence to raise until March, and continue to raise until grass breaks the price in June. "Lambs that are sold before April are wooled lambs. Lambs sold the latter part of May are clipped, and

the raise in price from the fifteenth of March until the latter part of May is usually nearly equal to the value of the wool. "Wool from Hale County lambs in Chicago is worth 32 cents to 35 cents per pound. All charges for shipping and selling, etc., are 2.42 cents per pound. "I have two-year-old ewes that dropped lambs the first of June, which is very late, for they ought to come on farms in February. These ewes and lambs have had nothing to eat in this long dry spell but weeds until the last few days, when the wheat had come up. The lambs weighed today, September 4th, forty-eight pounds each. What ought a fourteen-month-old lamb to weight and what ought it to be worth with the wool? "Now, you can figure for yourself the profit made on these ewes. Stop making fun of the little 'Ba, Ba's.'" Get Rid of Rats

Texas has 4,348,000 people. Also Texas has 5 rats apiece, or 21,720,000. It costs \$1 per year to feed a rat, even if he wastes nothing. The waste is still greater. Therefore it year, from 9 to 19 to the litter. Rats have fleas and are the carriers of the dread plague. There are three distinct kinds in Texas; those that live under buildings, those that climb and live in roofs and lofts, and those that live in fields. To get rid of them, their rungs and homes must be located and destroyed. Buildings resting on the ground must be rat-proofed. Waste that will furnish food must be cleaned up. Feed houses and bins must be kept closed so they can not get in. No hope and no food causes the rat to migrate. Poison is the best way to get rid of them. One part of Barium Carbonate, with four parts of meal or flour may be sprinkled on moistened bread and butter, or may be added to water and put where the rat will get it.

This fact is proved by the United States census of 1910 on the number of illiterates in West Texas, which gave the remarkable low figure of 4.9 per cent. This lower percentage of illiterates shows a higher grade of buying public, a factor

WINN DEFENDS STATE AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT

Replies to Article published Last Week in the News Regarding Work of This Department

Canyon, Texas, Sept. 9, 1916. Having read an article recently wherein is asked what about the State Department of Agriculture, and, further, a part of an article appearing in the Dallas News written by Judge V. W. Grubbs I want to try at least in part to answer the same. As citizens and tax payers we should be and are interested in the economical and useful expenditure of all funds derived from the tax payers of this state. There is some duplication of effort with the state Department and the A. & M. College. This should be overcome and avoided. It was my privilege to listen to the speech Judge Grubbs made at the A. & M. College in 1906 in favor of the State Department being made a separate Department from that of the A. & M. College. The Judge took twice the time that was necessary then to convince all those who heard the speech and the sound logic used that he was right—permanently right in the propositions advanced. The Texas Farmers Congress gladly endorsed the Judge's proposition. That mistakes have been made in its efforts to serve the people of Texas no

one will deny, but shall we destroy a useful office because some mistakes have been made? I wonder if the Judge would have the temerity to say not made some mistakes. Under the same course of reasoning we might say we would better do away with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and let the A. & M. Colleges perform the functions of that important office in all the United States. Now, that Judge Grubbs deserves great credit for his very efficient service to Texas in his advocacy of Industrial Education no fair minded person will deny, and I am sorry that after such valuable service the Judge has departed from the faith. We think he was right in 1907 and is wrong now. I would suggest that the entire extension work of the State be under the supervision of the State Department. We have our A. & M. College to teach agriculture and the allied sciences and the teachers of this grand institution should be at the disposal of the commissioner for service when and wherever he thinks they could be used to the benefit of the State.

Now let us have an adjustment of these forces and see that all these splendid educational forces are run in the interest of Texas and not to satisfy the pride or jealousy of either. Now, as to the main charge Judge Grubbs has so "recklessly" made that

"These conventions attended by thousands of farmers and farmers of farmers are often, if not invariably, converted into great political conventions run in the interest of the Ins' to the inestimable disadvantage of the Outs' must be a most potent and indispensable fact fully recognized by any attendant and wide-awake observer. The temptation thus to prostitute such conventions of the unsuspecting farmers is to great and should be discontinued by cutting out the free passes, without which they would be practically, if not entirely, impossible."

Now to this charge, I say it is made through ignorance of the real work done in these State Institutes. I have been with this Department since June 1st; have met quite a lot of farmers; organized and helped organize several institutes that selected delegates to the Austin meeting and have always urged that good sound, sensible men be selected as delegates, men who had a vision of the country's needs and who would attend and bring back the experiences gained for their respective localities. The Railroads give these passes purely to assist the farmers to better conditions and the classes of citizens and delegates sent from the Panhandle and plains country are entirely outside of the insinuations of the distinguished, but deluded Judge.

As one of the field men of this Department, I was called in to Austin with several others for a conference on the work and to try to develop even a better system, if possible. In all this work there was never a single intimation made to run the convention in the interest of the Ins to the inestimable disadvantage of the Outs. Now such insinuations as this made at the intelligent farmers of Texas, especially at those in this part is too ridiculous to need consideration, and could only have originated in a run down or distorted brain. If the Judge thinks the farmers of Texas can be rounded up "unsuspectingly" and be prostituted in to making these conventions political advantages for the Ins' then he certainly is not in touch with the advancement the poor unsuspecting farmers have made since he dropped out of their company.

The Commissioner, though partially unknown to me, I find to be a modest man and one actuated by the purest of motives. His utmost theme, earnestly expressed, is to render the greatest amount of service. He never at Austin, or anywhere else ever remotely desired or asked to know how the delegates would vote. In my rounds among farmers, I think some of the best citizens of Texas, no mention was ever made as to how any one would vote, but the work was all done to improve Texas conditions and not elect to office.

Now the distinguished Judge has not attended our State Institutes, es-

pecially the last one. I have never seen in Texas a more representative body or more earnest delegation of workers. It was my privilege to attend and help organize the Texas Farmers Congress; have attended most all of its meetings and am fairly well acquainted with the conditions of Texas and the workings of both the Congress and the State Institute. The last meeting of the State Institute was the most practical and useful one I have ever attended and the unsuspecting farmers were not duped into a political conclave as charged by the high sounding allegations of Judge Grubbs in his article in the Dallas News.

To be charitable, I think the Judge is living on in the past oblivious to the progress of these times. If he would come up in the progressive Panhandle and see the advancement made by our people all in harmony and willing to co-operate with the State Department and the A. & M. College—we want a branch A. & M. College up here. We have no time to wrangle but are up and ready to build Texas up to its best. We feel under obligations to our State Department for the recent help rendered at our Farmers Congress as was unanimously expressed at our recent meeting August 24, 1916, at Amarillo, Texas. We ask all fair minded people to help work out a better destiny for Texas. Let us strengthen and improve our Department and those who want it abolished need the sympathy of all progressive citizens of Texas.

REVENUE STAMP ON DOCUMENTS NOT NECESSARY

The First National Bank received a telegram from Collector Walker at Austin this morning informing the bank that the use of revenue stamps on various papers would no longer be required. The American Express Company yesterday received a like advice stating that express receipts hereafter would not have to bear the usual one-cent revenue stamp.

The following is the text of the telegram received by the First National Bank:

Austin, Texas, Sept. 9, 1916—First National Bank, Amarillo, Tex. New revenue law effective at 8 o'clock last night repeals all stamp taxes on deeds and other written instruments executed after that time. (Signed) Walker, Collector.

The telegram received by the American Express Company was in substance the same. All shippers were pleased to learn of the new order, as it has been a great burden and inconvenience, probably more inconvenient than a great cost. The order removing revenue stamps from deeds and written documents specified will be a great saving, because

the amount of revenue carried on this business was enormous.

Many of the smaller railway and express stations throughout the Panhandle country, as well as all over the United States, has suffered many small losses that have grown to be large in time. Where pennies were scarce small agents were compelled by reason of the circumstances in many cases to bear the loss, not the express company, mind you, because the five cent piece offered for the stamp and change was not always reducible to coppers.

Several fines have been assessed in parts of the state because revenue stamps had not been affixed to certain articles, when the facts in the case were that the stamp was inadvertently left off, that the transportation company as well as the shipper was held responsible, it having been the duty of the express company's agents to see that such stamp was affixed and cancelled before receipt was signed and given to the

shipper for his goods for transportation.

The new order will effect a great saving to the people and a great amount of useless labor in placing the stamps.

President Ripley states Santa Fe's position on eight-hour wage law and asks an important question.

The Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Co.

Chicago, Ill., September 8, 1916.

To Santa Fe Employers and the Public:

This is the position of the Panhandle & Santa Fe Railway Company regarding the controversy with its train-service employes over their demand for increased compensation:

Congress, hastily acting under a threat of four leaders of labor organization, enacted a so-called eight-hour law, which is nothing more nor less than an advance of twenty or twenty-five per cent in the wages of the best paid men in railway service.

It is only fair to our employes and the public to say that the Panhandle & Santa Fe Railway Company does not intend to comply with the law except as and when ordered to do so by the court of last resort.

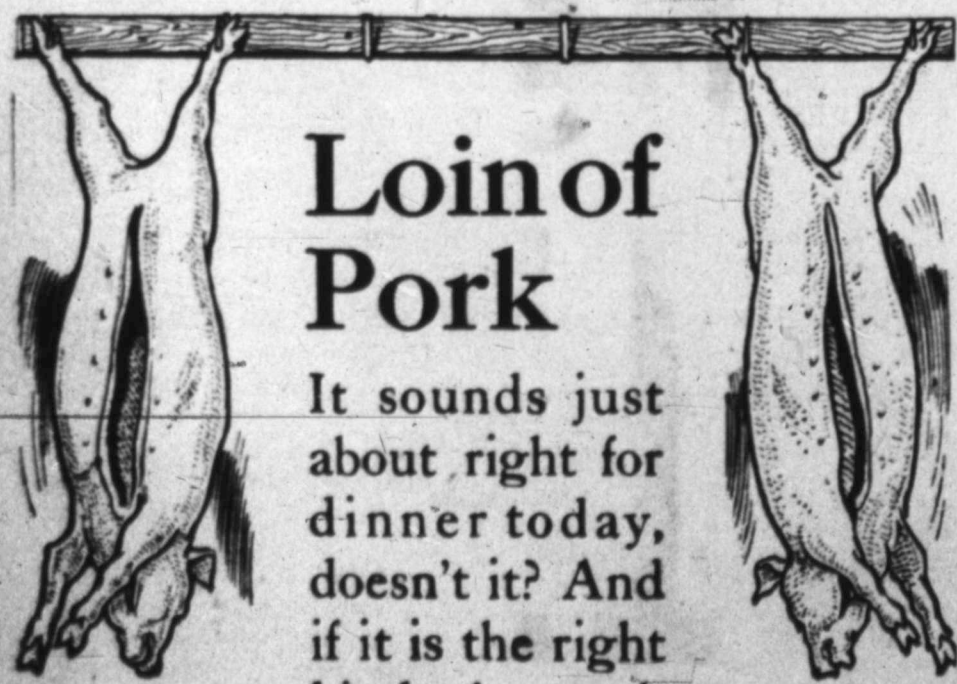
The merits of the case have been fully explained in the last few months and need no further mention.
