





There really is no reason for uneasiness along this line, for with the settling of the ranges there is an opportunity for handling more cattle than ever. While it is true that the grazing area is becoming less yearly, at the same time the feed available for raising and finishing is increasing rapidly.

In the past it has been customary to raise cattle here, and then to ship them into the corn sections for finishing, but these conditions are now changing. Amarillo News: That the Hereford breeders in

America have sacrificed much weight Herd Book Society of England, in a conversation with friends in Amarillo last evening. Mr. Britten is the guest of J. L. Van Natta and will be ing the next few days.

The visitor expresses himself as greatly interested in America having arrived in the United States for the first time October 1. He comes for the purpose of studying the Hereferd cattle situation in the United Staes and sincel anding here has traversed a number of the states to the northwest. He first attended the Kansas City Royal Stock Show and then started on his tour of the states. Mr. Britten lives in Hereford, England, the home of the original Hereford breeders of whom his great grandfather, Thomas Jeffries, was one of the first in the establishment of the present type. Cotmore, the famous Heerford bull, was the property of Mr. Jeffries, and weighed somewhat more than 3,900.

That England is scarcely so large as the Thirteenth Congressional District of Texas, was stated by the visitor yet he declares that there are twenty pure breeds of cattle, to say, nothing of hogs, sheep and other animals. He stated that England has furnished the foundation stock to, all of the pure reeds practically. With considerable animation, Mr. Britten stated that the original Hereford type still produced by the breeders in England is a very different animal to the Hereford of the United States. In this connection attention was called to the factt hat the grand champion bull in England this year weighed 3100. pounds.

According to the estimate of the visitor, the Hereford breeders of the United States have allowed their ideals to become warped to a dangerous degree by seeking after compactness of body. He states that the tendency is to effeminacy among the bulls, which is according to his concep. tion a dangerous thing. He sees in these "revised type," a weakness of character in the masculinity of the bulls, and a consequent detraction of power. He is especially strong for the sturdy, rugged masculinity of the



the people of Texas in responce to a

wide spread demand throughout the State for an opportunity to secure greater suport for the schools than is now permitted by the Constitution of the state. Many districts in Texas have already reached the constitutional limit in taxation and are yet short of funds with which to provide an adequate system of public free school. Inasmuch as the amendment does not lavy a tax on any district or county, the voters of such counties and districts as may not need additional scupport should in good neighborly spirit vote for the ameniment, for by so doing they will give the needy districts of Texas an opportunity to establish good schools for their children.

Four hundred and sixty seven independent school districts, and approximattely two thousand common school districts in the state have already voted upon themselves the limit in taxation permitted by the present Consitution. Many of these districts need additional support and cannot secure another dollar for their schools







Lives Outside City. The headquarters of General Kivelle, in command of the operations at Verdun, are quite a way outside the city, at a little crossroad hamlet, which cannot be named for military reasons. The general's offices are in the town courthouse, a two-story stone structure. It was in this same building that General Petain, who preceded Nivelle, and General de Castelnau quickly made the plans at the first onrush of the Germans, which held them until re-enforcements could be brought up.

General Nivelle goes to Verdun and along the trench front frequently. But most of his time is at headquarters, in telegraph and telephone communication with the whole circle of defenses, and in touch, too, with the other army corps and masses of supplies ready to be moved forward to fill any gap the Germans may make.

As we were at General Nivelle's headquarters a party of German prisoners came by. They marched two and two, their gray uniforms and round caps contrasting with the French blue and casque. Already they were being set to work, and instead of a gun each German carried a spade over his shoulder. At Verdun there is no civilian life whatever, but around General Nivelle's headquarters there were peasant women and girls mingling with the poilus, indicating civilian life still existed thus near to the bombarded town.

The roads back of Verdun present the most varied scenes of activity. On one side is a vast aeroplane camp, with some twenty enormous hangars of basket steel construction covered with canvas. Across the road is a riding course running for miles, where officers. edge the skill of the English in rapidcan exercise their mounts and cavalry can push forward in emergency without blocking the highroad. Every now and then one sees a big vehicle shoot by bearing the sign "American Ambulance Corps.'

Mules in Good Shape.

The thousands of horses and mules along the road are in good condition. Many of the horses came from America and were run down by sea voyage, which prodigally searches all obvious but after a month's feeding they proved very serviceable. On seeing the mules one of the officers said :

"The demobilization of the Greek army had one very important result for the allies-it released 10,000 mules which the Greeks had been using, and now these mules are proving invaluable to the allies."

Von Arnim Admits British Superiority in Air and Artillery-Short of Everything but Food-Draws Lessons From Battle.

War Correspondents' Headquarters in France.-Germany is short of guns, aeroplanes and war material of all sorts, but not of food, according to a most sensationally interesting document the British have captured, which is called "the experience of the Fourth German Corps in the Battle of the Somme.'

The document was written as instructions to the troops. It was drawn from the lessons of the battle by Gen. Count Sixt von Arnim, the corps commander, who has been fighting opposite the British throughout the offensive. This long detailed revelation of the inner thoughts of the German staff discusses the methods and shortcomings of every branch of the German army in view of the unexpect-' ed power and organization the British have shown."

The document starts out by paying a tribute to the British infantry "which undoubtedly has learned much since last autumn's offensive, It shows great dash in attack. The Englishman also has physique and training in his favor. One must acknowlly consolidating captured positions and their great tenacity in the defense of them.'

British Artillery Very Effective. Explicit instructions are given in the document to the artillery to change their methods of placing batteries in villages and behind steep slopes, because of the British method of distribution of their artillery fire, shelters. Owing to the terrific contentration of the British artillery fire, says the document, front lines of trenches should be thinly held and dependence placed on small groups of machine gunners. Once the British lay a curtain of fire on a trench, it adds, the men had better evacuate it and lay down in the open.






