

WROTE MANY POPULAR BOOKS

J. Fenimore Cooper Was One of the Most Popular of the Early American Authors.

Have you ever read any of J. Fenimore Cooper's stories? If you have not, then a rare treat awaits you, for he is one of the most interesting of American writers.

Cooper was not only born in September, but he died in September, within one day of his birthday. He was born on September 15, 1789, and he dled September 14, 1851.

Cooper was one of the most popular of all our authors, and his stories have been translated into rearly all the languages of Europe, and into some of those of Asia. He was termed "the American Scott," and he was much admired by the great French novelists-Victor Eugo and Balzac.

J. Fenimore Cooper had a varied existence from the time be was a boy. He entered Yale college at the age of thirteen. Three years afterwards he joined the United States navy, but marrying at the tender age of twentywhere he began to write. At first he name attached, but soon he signed and wrote there until 1833, when he returned to America. His best book is, according to popular taste, "The Last of the Mohicans." He wrote in all over

The one sort finds everything interesting, even the ugly, and sometimes especially the ugly; the other averts its eyes, as far as it may, from disease and disorder, and ugliness and irra-





Aerial Mail Routes of Value

Possession of Machines and Experienced Aviators Would Be Bulwark of Safety to Country in the Event of War.

> By HENRY WOODHOUSE Governor of the Aero Club of America





In its defenses the United States is like a man, who is "land poor." It has abundant resources, men, machinery, wealth, but these do not constitute military and naval strength until they have been refashioned. Above all, men must be trained and disciplined, for even in the ranks of the private soldier-and the common sailor national defense today requires an amazing amount of technical knowledge that cannot be acquired offhand. Especially true is this in its application to aeronautics. Even ordinary flying over peaceful spectators requires much knowledge and training, while aviation in con-

junction with an army or with naval ships entails a vast amount of special knowledge, without which the mere ability to make a flight would be of small value to a commander. U. S. Should Have at Least 5,000 Powerful Aeroplanes.

In its first call for proposals for carrying mail by aeroplane, the government selected eight routes, one between New Bedford and Nantucket, Mass., and seven routes in Alaska. Each of these routes presents great difficulties, especially in winter.

On the route from Seward to Iditarod, Alaska, 380 miles, for which the first bid has been received by the post office department, the aeroplane will save the government \$34,558 a year, and it will advance the mails be ween the United States and the Nome district from twenty to twentyone days. Earl L. Byers of Iditarod proposes to furnish aeroplane service twice a week, carrying 1,000 pounds, for \$19,500 a year.

Nor is the saying in time limited to a few towns. By making these aeroplane routes the trunk lines for mails for points north of Iditarod, a saving of time will be made throughout a tremendous area, and persons who had to wait days for mail drawn by dogsleds will, with aeroplane service, be able to get it within a few hours.

In winter this aeroplane trunk line will relieve the expensive, difficult and roundabout service from Cordova to Fairbanks, to Tanana, to Unalakleet, to Solomon and Nome, of a considerable burden of the mail now carried. The winter mail for the Nome district is carried from Chitina via Fairbanks to Tanana by horse-drawn wagon or sled, and from Tanana to Nome by dogsled, a total distance of about 1,500 miles. The time of transit of mail in winter from Cordova by Fairbanks to Nome is about 39 days. With the Seward-Iditarod aeroplane route to Tanana this would be much reduced; and the present dogsled routes from Tanana to St. Michael, and from Holy Cross to Iditared would be discontinued.

Will Be Important Factor in Development of Alaska.

The flying machine promises to be one of the most potential factors in the future development of Alaska-and of all places where the run of commerce is slow on account of lack of fast transportation. It needs neither roads nor rails nor bridges, only landing places at convenient intervals. If it can be taken for grapted that the contracts afforded amount to \$350,000-and there is, at last, an opportunity to apply aeroplanes for peaceful purposes, then it is the duty of all people interested in acronauties and in national defense to make an effort to take advantage of the opportunity afforded by the post office department.

Appreciating the fact that with 5,000 trained aviators, duly equipped with aeroplanes even mail-carrying aeroplanes-this country would be in the position of the porcupine, which goes about its daily pursuits peacefully, harms no one, but is every ready to defend itself. We would like see as many as possible out of this number in use for peaceful purposes. Greatest Telescope in World, Now Building, to Weigh Above 500 Tons

Several years ago the Canadian government decided that it wanted the largest telescope in the world, to be set up in the clear gir of Vancouver for photographing thousands of stars after." that had never been photographed before-stars almost inconceivably distant. Of course the job was given to Brashear. A gigantic parabolic mirrorthe largest ever made in one piecewas cast in France. It weighed in the rough 4.968 pounds and was 73 inches in diameter. Nearly 400 pounds of glass had been taken from that lens when I saw it in Doctor Prashear's shop, where it is kept in an underground chamber, protected from all air currents. When it is completed and mounted, the telescope will weigh more than 500 tons.

An Individual Lifeboat.

"Carry your own lifeboat," is the motto of an Italian inventor, G. Piperno, who has visited England with what is probably the most ambitious lifesaving appliance on record.

When not in use the apparatus is packed into what looks like a man's suitcase, measuring 24 inches by 16 inches by 8 inches, and weighing 20 pounds. When disaster is imminent the passenger brings the suitcase on deck, breaks the seal, and the apparatus opens out and becomes a small

If it is necessary to abandon the ship, the passenger steps into his private boat, closes the outer cover, and launches his craft by hurling himself overboard. Then, according to Mr. Piperno, the apparatus rights itself in the water, the top cover is thrown open, and the occupant finds himself sitting in an absolutely unsinkable

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THROW OFF MUCH MOISTURE

Remarkable Amount of Water Exhaled From Skin of Full-Grown Man in Twenty-Four Hours.

The skin of a full-grown man exhales in 24 hours, in ordinary circumstances, from one and a half to two pounds of water in insensible perspiration. When, in hot weather, or in undergoing violent exertion, the perspiration becomes sensible, and instead of exhaling in a gentle moisture is thrown off in large drops of water, a much greater weight is disposed of in

The action of this exhalation takes place through glands. It does not seem do you think of the water works so strange that the human body can throw off nearly two pints of water daily, so gradually and so gently that it is not felt as moisture, when we remember how many glands there are and how very small each atom of moisture must oe. On the back, the thighs and legs there are about 500 perspiratory glands to the square inch of skin; on the breast, the forehead, neck, forearm and back of the hand and foot, about 1,000 to the square inch, and on the sole of the foot and on the palm of the hand,

It is estimated that the number of perspiratory glands over the whole body is not less than 2,300,000, and as each tubular coil in the glands when unraveled is about one-fifteenth of an inch in length the entire extent of tubing used to throw off perspiration is not less than 153,000 inches, or nearly two and one-half miles.




