

SUBSTITUTES FOR KAFIR IS IN DEMAND—SCRGHUMS ARE TOO HIGH.

The high prices being paid for milo maize and kaffir corn and other feedstuffs has caused investigation of feed ing costs. E. C. Lamb ,owner of the Helen-Temple fain, has a large herd of hogs. Finding kafir and milo crops at prevailing prices to high to feed with maximum prifit, he sought information as to the cost of other feed. Taking up the matter with Dr. R. F. Hare, inquiry as to the findings of the animal husbandry department of Texas A. & M. College has been made.

Rice Polish Cheap Feed. Dr. Hare is in receipt of a communication from J. C. Burns, beef cattle expert with the animal husbandry department, in which the writer states: "Rice polish is slightly higher in feed ing value, pound for pound than milo chops. and rice bran of good quaity is equal to milo chops. Hence, at \$1.25 per hundred pounds either of these feeds would be cheaper than milo at \$1.90 per hundred pounds.

Polish and Bran Should be Pure. "In buying rice polish you can usually count on its being pure, but not so in the case of rice bran, as it is often adulterated with rice hulls, and which only possess no feeding value, but may often prove injurious, if contained in large quantity. Therefore in purchasing rice bran, attention of the buyer should be given to analysis. Pure rice bran should analyze not less than 11 per cent protein, 10 per cent fat, and not over fifteen per cent of the crude fibre.

Must Be Balanced With Other Feed. "Rice bran and rice polish are commonly substituted for such feeds as corn, milo, kaffir, etc., and should be balanced up with other feeds in much the same way. Of course, a change to rice bran and rice polish should be made gradually, as should be the case in changing to any other new feed. Otherwise, scouring and digestive disorders may result.

Rice Bran Not Best in Summer. "Rice bran on account of its high content of oil, does not make a very satisfactory feed after hot weather begins, and as it becomes rancid, and in this condition animals do not relish it so well and it deterioates somewhat in its feeding valuee. During cold weather it makes a satisfactory feed. We are using both rice bran and rice polish very extensively at the present in rations for hogs."—Plainview Herald.
