

Austin, Texas, March 19 .--- Those who advocate a new Constitution for Texas are jubilant at the action of the House today in adopting by a vote of 63 to 33 the McNealus Senate resolution calling a constitutional convention. Senator McNealus has been working seven years to secure the calling of a constitutional convention. 

> The Bagby resolution, however, made at least one vote for the constitutional convention. Mr. Bledsoe, who has been opposed to the constitutional convention, voted that the postage stamp discussion this morning had caused him to become a constitutional convention convert.

"If we have reached the point where every official and legislature must be called either a falsifier or a grafter. we certainly need a new Constitution to fix specifically and beyond question the exact compensation and expense of the state officials and the legislature" said Mr. Bledsoe.

Provision in McNealus Resolution. The McNealus concurrent resolution which has now been adopted by both House and Senate by a majority vote, provides that the constitutional convention shall meet in Austin on the second Tuesday in January, 1918. Delegates to the constitutional convention shall be elected on the second Tuesday in November, 1917. Each senatorial district is to elect two delegates and the State ten at large, a total of seventy-two delegates. It is further provided that at the lection for delegates voters shall also ote "for a constitutional convention," or "against a evonstitutional convention," and if a majority of the voters of the State shall vote against the convention it shall not be convened. The new Constitution framed by the convention shall be submitted to the people of the State for their



Why City Consumers Pay

It seems that the consumer always gets the worst of the deal when food speculators corner the market and force prices upward. The producer may sell at or below the cost of production, but this may not benefit the consumer who is often at the mercy of market manipulators for his necessities.

It is surprising the way speculators raise prices and the pretex they offer for it. The European war has been blamed for raises in prices; lack of transportation; short crops, and many other things. Some commodities have been affected by these things and others as a direct result of manipulation of the market.

The consumer is easily fleeced. He will generally accept any kind of a story as to why prices are high, pay theb ill and complain afterwards.

With the food stocks we have in this country there is no good reason for food riots and hungry people. Lack of transportation, poor business in distribution, speculation and other things are at fault.

The consumer must act before there will be any considerable relief in the high cost of living. So long as consumers accept any excuse and pay exhorbitant prices for food there will be those who will fleece them. The producer and honest dealers are enxious to meet consumers and help them save marketing cost.

How long will the consuriers submit to extortion?

If a husband and wife are addicted to drinking alcohol, are the children necessarily affected, is an oft-mooted question. Recently some experiments were made to see how the theory actually worked out, and here are the results:

Three families, with 20 children, were taken where the fathers were drnkanrds. Of these 20 children: 4 died from general weakness: 3 died of convultions before 1 month old; 4 were feeble minded; 1 was a dwarf;





In moving picture just as it actually occured on Col. Charles Goodnight's ranch, Goodnight, Texas, October 6, 1916

This was not a staged affair but was photographed just as it happened. The cause of the hunt was this-Col. Goodnight and his good wife were among the first on the Plains, and so far as is known he was the first to place in captivity the wild Buffalo. Afterwards he crossed the Buffalo and Black Pole cow producing the Cattlelo, said to be the finest beef to be had. The Col. and wife are growing old and desiring to give their friends a special treat they decided to kill a full blood Buffalo and give them a barbecue dinner. Then it was decided to have "Shorenuf" Indians from Oklahoma come and kill the Buffalo with bow and arrow in the old fashioned way, hence the hunt. The camera man starts with the Indians when they leave camp horseback to hunt the Buffalo out of the hills and brakes on the ranch, following them over hill, through the fuffs until they find the Buffalo and after a long chase finally cut out a few head and eventually succeed in getting one for the killing.

The camera man follows them in a Ford going thirty miles per hour at time but reeling off film all the time actually showing the arrows as they pierce the Buffalo in the side until he lays down and gives up the ghost. This is absolutely the only picture of the kind in the world so don't fail to see it.
