Washington, D. C., May 7 -Seed to plant an acre of Irish potatoes cost about \$40 this spring. Seed sweet potatoes will not cost more than \$4 per acre where vine cuttings taken from early-set plants are used. The yield of sweet potatoes per acre is usually greater than that of Irish potatoes and as a food they are as nutritious. Sweet potatoes may be grown throughout the Southern States and, of course, in certain other sections. Specialists in the U.S. Department of Agricusture are urging an increased average of this crop wherever it can be easily grown.

Sweet potatoes, it is pointed out, are the South's chief instrument forw quick and effective increase of the food supply. Seed is plentiful; last year's crop was the second largest ever produced. 

criminate playing of the national anthem hurts rather than helps patriotism. General Pershing today urged that the music be reserved for occasions of more or less formal naturecivic or military. He also said the use of the American Flag for advertising purposes or ta achieve effect of applause should not be countenanced. General Pershing outlined several

rules concerning honors and courtesies due the "Star-Spangled Banner" and the colors, observation of which by civilians would remedy present conditions, he said.

When the "Star-Spangled Banner" played indoors or out, everyone within hearing should rise at the first note, face toward the music and stand at attention until its close.

When passing the unfurled colors civilians should uncover, holding head dress opposite the left shoulder with the right hand. When the colors pass during a parade or on any other occasion, civilians should uncover and hold head dress in front of left shoulder.

INCREASE FOOD SUPPLIES
BY GROWING GRAIN SORGHUMS

Washington, D. C., May 7.-In the drier sections of the Southwest where corn can not be depended upon to thrive, farmers can best add to the Nation's food supply by growing grain sorghums more extensively. says specialists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. These crops, including kafir, milo, and feterita, are drought resistant, and in most seasons produce profitable yields even though corn may be a failure in the same localities. The States in which these crops may be grown to best advantage are Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, and California.

Although the sorghum grains, when ground and used in making mushes, breads, and puddings, are comparable to corn in food value, they have not been used generally for human food value, they have not been used generally for human food in the United States. Their chief value, therefore, in the present emergency will be as feed for live stock and poultry. If used in this way they will release for use as human food large quantities of the more common food grains now feed to animals.

Because the section in whic hgrain sorghums may be grown to best advantage is also the most important cattle-raising section of the country, farmers growing sorghums can combine profitably the growing of these grains and the feeding of live stocks the specialists point out. Most of the cattle now raised in the grainsorghum growing country are shipped to the corn belt for fattening on corn. The sorghum grains which, because of their relative newness, are more difficult to market than corn, thereforeare left largely unused in the regions of production and must be held until the supplies of corn have been used up in large part, when the demand for feed grains draws them into the market. If the growers of grain sorghums will plan to carry more cattle this season and to fatten them on homegrown grain instead of shipping them to the corn belt to be finished, no difficulty will be experienced in marketing the sorghum grains. A ready market for all the meat that can be produced this year is assured.

The sorghum grains make good stock feed, having about 90 per cent the feeding value of corn. When these grains can be produced or bought for less than 90 per cent of the cost of corn, it is more profitable to feed them than to feed corn. The fattening of cattle and other stock in the grain sorghum belt is made the more profitable by the fact that this region is close to the source of octtonseed meal—one of the most nutritious protein concentrates for the feeding ration.

The third type of feed needed for the efficient fattening of stock—succulent material—may be produced by ensiling the grain sorghums when the grain is in the hard dough stage. This is as high in food value as corn sl-

Stock-raising farmers in the sorghum belt should plant a large enough acreage to supply an abundance of both grain and silage.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, PRO-VIDING FOR AND RELATING TO THE CREATION OF CONSER-VATION DISTRICTS.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 12. Proposing to amend Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto at the end thereof another section to be known as Section 59, declaring the conservation and preservation of all the natural resources of the State of Texas are public rights and duties; providing for the creation of conservation districts, declaring such districts bodies politic and corporate, defining the authority of such districts, and conferring upon the Legislature authority to pass laws with reference thereto; declaring that the Legislature shall have authority generally to legislate for the purpose of conserving the natural resources of the State; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection od said proposed constitutional amendment; making certain provisions for said election and the ballots thereof and the methods thereof; directing the issuance of the proclamation therefor, prescribing certain duties of the Governor of the State and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election. City Ordinance.

An ordinance amending Articles seven and eight of an ordinance pass. ed October 2nd, 1916, regulating travel and traffic on the streets of Canyon City, rules of the road and street, so that said articles shall here after read as follows: Article VII:

Vehicles crossing from one side of the street to the other shall do so by passing to the right and beyond the signal posts in the center of the intersecting streets.

Article VIII: Vehicles stopping on the public square shall head in and stand at an angle of forty-five degrees with the curbing and as near thereto as possible, and no vehicle shall stop at any point where there is a vehicle between it and the curb on the right.
