







Sec. 3. In the event no paper should e published in the county where such notice is required to be given, then such notices may be posted as now provided by law.

Sec. 4. The price to be paid for all publications required by this Act shall be not more than one dollar per square of one hundred words for first insertion and not more than fifty cents per one hundred words for each subsequent insertion, said publication fee to be taxed as other costs in the case

Sec. 5. All laws and parts in laws in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. The crowded condition of the calendar and the necessity of this law creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity for the suspension of the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several dys, and such rule is hereby suspended, and this Act shall take effect from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.
