

COME ACROSS, OR THE KAISER WILL BUY A BOND

ANNOUNCEMENT OF CANYON POST-OFFICE BECOMING SECOND CLASS

Conforming with the patrons expectations, the Canyon Post office will on the first of July, become a classified second class post office...

Under the new classification several new rulings will affect the Canyon office. Judge Eakman will be allowed to retain his present assistant and will be allowed one chief clerk all of which are to only spend eight hours each day in the performance of their duties.

All the employees will be under civil service jurisdiction, except the postmaster, whose time of office will be controlled as heretofore. Any time over eight hours each day that any of the clerks may spend in the performance of their duties, will be paid for as "overtime."

The salaries of the office force will be as follows: Postmaster, \$2,000 per annum; Assistant, \$1,100; Chief Clerk, \$800 and that of auxiliary clerk will be 35 cents per hour for each hour actual work, during the month, not to exceed five hours each day.

ELMORE TAKES CHARGE OF LOCAL TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

Rush Elmore is now manager of the Canyon telephone exchange for the Southwestern Tel. & Tel. Co. He is formerly from Lubbock and was in that city during the rebuilding of the Lubbock system and the installation of the flash light system.

Guy Conner, who was checked out as manager, is awaiting the call of the government to enter the signal corps department of the army. He states that the men chosen from this section will gather at Amarillo and be transferred to the point where the government wishes their services.

Many Attended Clovis Meeting.

Judge C. R. Fleisher and S. B. McClure drove to Clovis Friday to attend the meeting of the Ozark Trail boosters.

None of the members of the commissioners Court were able to go to the meeting.

There were delegates all along the south line to the meeting, and all were enthusiastic. It was pointed out that the powers that be in the Ozark Trail organization seemed to have been pulled to the north line from Amarillo but that this line was often snow bound during the winter, while the south line is open practically all of the time.

Delegates are in favor of opening a new auto route running from Amarillo to El Paso by the way of Hereford and Roswell, which they believe will soon draw the business that is designated for the Ozark Trail, and this would ultimately force the Trail people to accept this route.

Delegates from all along the line insisted upon action being taken by all counties to make this new route a success.

Judge Fleisher officially represented Randall county and stated that the commissioners would do their part toward making the roads acceptable.

Miss Ida Rowan returned Saturday from Waco where she has been teaching during the past year. Miss Nettie McKinney came home with her and will spend part of the summer here.

Under the new classification, any clerk who works on Sunday or any legal holiday, is permitted to take an equal amount of time off from his work during the following week. Salaries will be paid every fifteen days instead of monthly as heretofore. The clerks will not be required to put any mail into rented boxes on Sunday, except the daily newspapers, provided the holding of the mail till the following day does not congest the office.

On dispatching the mail the clerk who dispatches it will be held responsible, and not the postmaster. The same with all other work of the office. The postmaster cannot hire or remove a clerk, but can only report him to the Civil Service commission for demerits. As long as the office remains second class, the clerks have a lifetime position, and under a proclamation issued in April by President Wilson, all postmasters of the Second class will probably have to pass an examination, before they are appointed, whenever the vacancy occurs.

GUTHRIE MOVES INTO NEW MODERN GARAGE FRIDAY

J. A. Guthrie moved Friday into the new Garage on the north side of the square which was built for him by W. W. Kuehn of the Ceta community.

The building covers two full lots, being 60x140. The feature of the building is the large show room, which will be used to show new cars and storing tourist cars. The rear part is devoted to a repair shop under the lease and management of M. S. Bishir who has installed a complete repair shop. This department is accessible for cars from the main room and from the outside by a door on the west side.

At the front Mr. Guthrie has an office and stock room. To the west of these will be an exclusive ladies rest room, where comfortable chairs will be provided for the ladies during their stay at the building. This room is not yet completed.

In front of the building Mr. Guthrie has his filling station, together with free air and water, all within easy access of the autos.

Work is not yet completed on the building, but it is thought all will be through by next week, when Mr. Guthrie will be able to arrange his business just as he desires. He has a lease on the building he formerly occupied, which he will use for an assembling room for autos, and in case of overflow in the new building. W. W. Kuehn is to be congratulated for having put up this fine business house, and the people of Canyon can guarantee that it will be a very profitable business investment.

Leases Made for 24,000 Acres.

J. D. Gamble reports that he has secured leases on 24,000 acres of land in Randall county for the Empire Oil and Gas Company which begun two weeks ago to get leases on one quarter out of every section of land in the county owned by residents of the county.

He states that a number of the big land owners will give leases within a short time.

Of course, there is nothing definite as to when drilling will begin in the county, or whether there will be any drilling in this county, but it seems assured that the company would not spend the large amount of money that is necessary to get the leases if they do not contemplate using the leases and the lands on which these leases are taken.

It is gratifying to know that a good company has at last determined to find out whether or not there is any oil in this community, which has for so long a time been a matter of speculation among the residents of the county who have observed oil fields and made comparisons with the local conditions.

Alfalfa Cutting Fine.

The farmers are just completing this cutting of alfalfa. All report that the quality is very fine since there has been no rain to damage the crop. The yield is very good. The price is from \$20 to \$21 per ton.

The alfalfa growers would like to see rain to get the next crop well started.

### Buying Committee.

"Why is it," he asks, that meats and lard, wheat and corn, and flour and cotton and other products, and all the war materials had such unprecedented advances in prices? A simple and true illustration furnishes the answer: A broker on the Chicago Board of Trade received an order to buy 500 pounds of mess pork for future delivery. He goes to work, but finds that another broker is outbidding him, thus forcing the price steadily upward. Then Broker No. 2 calls the first broker aside, asking him point-blank for whom he is buying and showing him his order, which proves to be identical with his own. Thereupon the customer was informed of his folly and the first broker filled the order and divided with the other broker. Now, then, where would the advance have stopped had both parties been bidding over each other?

"Yet this is exactly what happened to all the war orders received in America. Had the Allies appointed a special purchasing committee, and then divided pro rata the buying would have been unified without the dangerous scrambling to get ahead of each other, all bidding and buying at the same time. This, of course, gave a tremendous opening to the speculators, who gathered and are still garnering enormous profits! Too much private information, also guaranteed sure profits, added to the volume of buying.

S. O. S. UNHEEDED

The S. O. S. call of the Canyon Home Guard went unheeded by the men of Canyon and the tender plant passed from existence with hardly a murmur or dissenting voice to save the day.

The Home Guard was born in the midst of the stirring scene of the declaration of war upon Germany. More than a hundred men and boys responded to the first call and expressed a desire to fight for their country. The enthusiasm of many soon passed away with one or two drills. Twenty five or more were on hand at the close of the first month. Then came the final dropping off of the would-be defenders of the Stars and Stripes until barely a dozen reported at drill.

The ultimatum was issued last week by the faithful few. They decreed jointly that unless four squads were on the drill grounds by Friday night the organization would automatically end its career. A number of the summer Normal boys joined the ranks Wednesday and Friday nights, but only three squads were out. It was decided to give the organization one more trial and the call was issued for drill Monday evening as usual. When time came for the gathering of the clans only a lone dozen—the same faithful few—appeared.

And thus the Canyon Home Guard ended its youthful life.

Substitutes for Tin Cans.

#### HOW TO OFFSET ANL POSSIBLE SHORTAGE.

The Department of Commerce in cooperation with the Department of Agriculture has long been earnestly striving to increase the output of tin cans for food containers. To this end it has endeavored to increase the supply of tin, to secure the continuous movement of the materials entering into tin cans from the place of production to the place of use, and to facilitate the supply and movement of machinery for producing cans. The Department desires in every practicable way to promote the present and permanent prosperity of the tin industry. There is no possible doubt of the steady and growing demand for its products.

Tin plate is 98 per cent steel and 2 per cent tin. Steel is the backbone of war, and the mills have not been able to keep all their customers fully supplied at all times. Moreover, abnormal freight demands have made prompt deliveries uncertain. There have also been decreased imports of pig tin, due to decreasing production and reduced shipping facilities. It is not surprising, therefore, that the tin-plate makers cannot provide the can manufacturers with sufficient plate to enable them to meet the increase in the demand for cans, which is 25 to 40 per cent greater than it was last year.

It is therefore imperative that the supply of cans be utilized, in so far as possible, for packing products that

can be preserved only in tin, and that substitutes be used for other products wherever practicable. Such containers should be cheaper than tin, so that the ultimate benefit from lower costs may offset the initial expense of the substitution.

#### COST AND DESCRIPTION OF FIBER CONTAINERS.

The price of glass has steadily risen and has reached a point at which any extension of its use for food containers is impracticable. At present fiber or paper containers of good quality are being produced in considerable and increasing quantities, and for many purposes are supplanting glass and tin plate. The price of the fiber containers depends upon the size, the quality of the paper-pulp material, the number of treatments with paraffin, and the amount of printed matter on the outside. The commoner types may be obtained at 1.25 to 1.5 cents for the half-pint size, 1.25 to 1.8 cents for the pint size, and 1.5 to 1.65 cents for the quart size.

Fiber containers are made in various shapes and sizes adapted to different purposes and may or may not be coated with paraffin, which is chemically inert and is sometimes baked into the paper material. Some of these containers are claimed to be air-tight, proof against leakage, and protected from contamination by the paraffin. Some containers appear to be more nearly air-tight than others of the same style, probably because of better fitting covers. These containers are light in weight, pack readily for shipment, are easily opened, and are used but once.

#### FIBER CONTAINERS FOR DELIVERING FOODS TO CONSUMERS

The demand for "ready-to-eat" foods, such as baked pork and beans, spaghetti, etc., with the simple direction "Heat and serve," represents the largest factor in the increased use of tin cans. These foods must be processed in the containers at or above the temperature of boiling water, and no substitute for tin has been found that satisfactorily meets these conditions. However, a great economy in tin cans be effected by home cooking of such products during the present shortage.

Fiber containers are recommended for the distribution by the retailer of many foodstuffs, including milk, buttermilk, cream, ice cream, oysters, sirups, marshmallow creams, dried fruits, preserves, jellies, mincemeat, horseradish, relishes, pickles, deviled ham and chicken, vinegar, dry and prepared mustard, soda water, salads, sauerkraut, and olives.

#### FIBER CONTAINERS FOR PACKING AND WHOLESALE TRADE.

It is claimed that dry food products such as coffee, tea, alum, baking powder, spices, raisins, and prunes may be successfully packed by producers and manufacturers in paper or fiber containers. For some of these products, bags lined with tinfoil have been in successful use for 10 years or more and they form an attractive package that is said to be moisture proof.

Other commodities usually packed in tin could be marketed as well in paper or fiber, with the advantage of lower cost. Among these tobacco occupies a conspicuous position, and other articles are lye, cleansers, soap powders, shoe polishes, metal polishes, soaps and shaving preparations, toilet articles, such as talcum powder, and various dry drugs and chemicals. Paper containers are also suggested for preserved fruits and jellies made at home. Cloth sacks for tobacco and wood for sirups and molasses are also recommended where retail sales can be made in bulk.

containers because of the good will built up upon the style and shape of a tin container, fiber containers having a tin top and bottom are available. These containers, when labeled, have the appearance of all-tin cans, and are almost as serviceable.

Purchasers of large quantities of foodstuffs, such as hotels, restaurants, and boarding houses, can also contribute directly to the tin-saving campaign by buying supplies in large cans instead of small ones. In addition to aiding in tin conservation, they will thus get the supplies at a lower rate.

TESTS OF SUBSTITUTE CONTAINERS—TRADE LISTS.

Certain types of these containers are now being tested to determine to what extent the claims of their manufacturers as to their general qualities can be substituted. Manufacturers of substitute containers who wish their products tested should send samples to the Bureau of Standards, Department of Commerce, with full information regarding commodities for which the containers are specially designated, prices, and ability to contract for early deliveries. Names and addresses of firms prepared to supply fiber and other containers may be obtained from the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce or its district or cooperative offices. Cooperation is required between the Government departments, the manufacturers of tin plate and of substitute containers, the packers of foodstuffs and of other articles commonly put up in tin, and the general public if the available supply of tin plate is to be limited to strictly necessary uses and if, at the same time, the largest possible quantity of food is to be preserved against the special needs of the coming months.

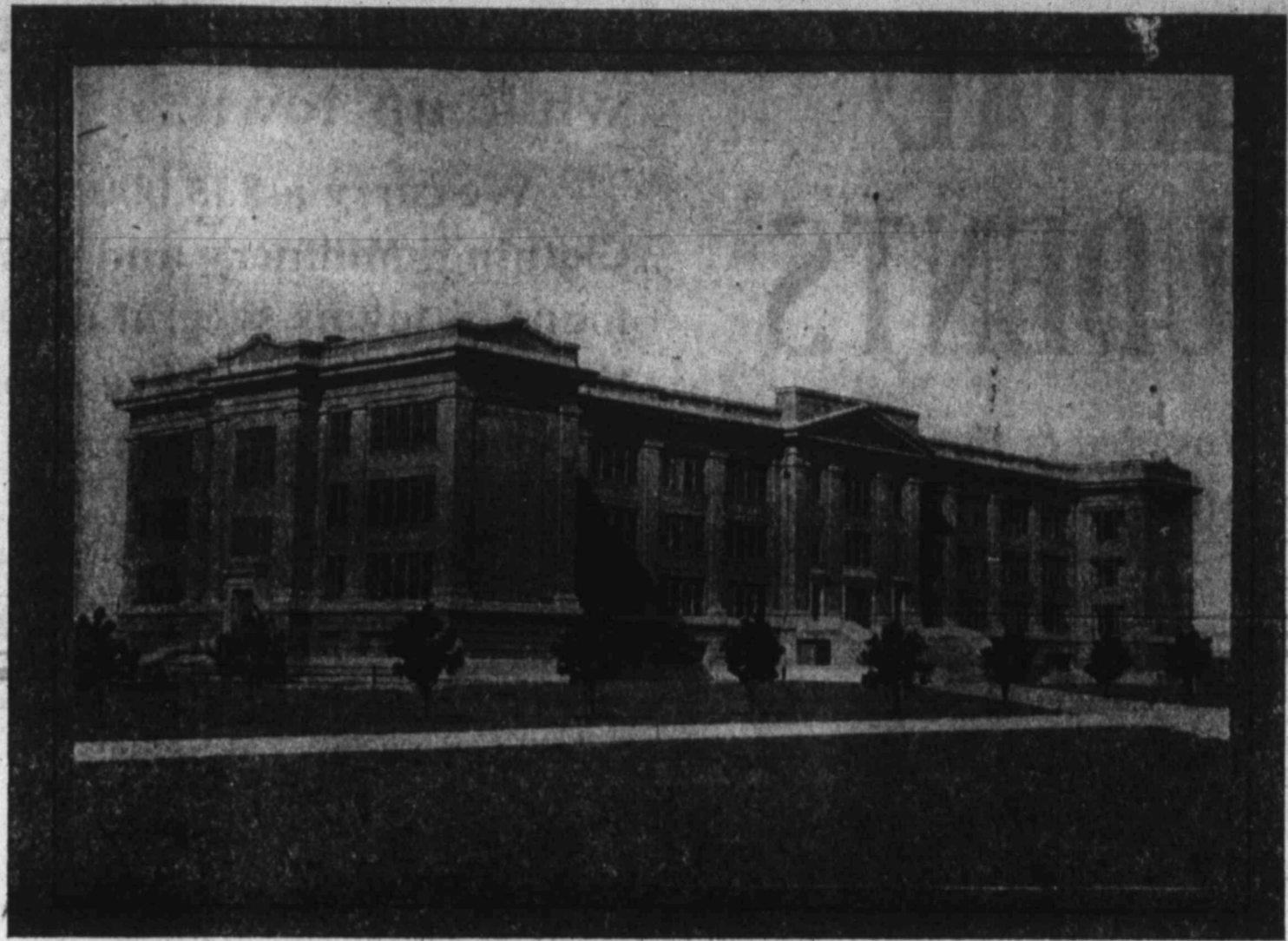

### EXEMPTIONS LEFT TO REGISTRATION BOARDS

Governors Will Not Be Called Upon to Recommend Men for Appointment.

Washington, June 12.—Governors of States will not be called upon to make recommendations for appointment to local boards of exemption, as originally planned, following passage of the national army act, but the registration boards will serve in that capacity, composed of the Sheriff, County Clerk and County Physician. In cities of 30,000 people the registration board also will serve.

Recommendations will be received from the Governors of States for changes in the exemption boards when any member proves unsatisfactory. The high percentage of claimed exemptions as shown by the registration returns, which probably will reach 50 per cent, has caused alarm for fear that the rules for exemption may be loosely enforced. In the first instance the County Physician is to pass upon the physical fitness of the drafted person, but if the board is not satisfied with his report it may call one or more other physicians to make examinations. While the right of habeas corpus is always open to the citizen, an appeal is provided from the local board to a district board, to be organized for that particular work. Beyond that the only appeal lies to the President unless, of course, the subject feels his case is of such moment as to warrant a judicial inquiry, whereupon he may try his fortune in the Federal Court. There will be small chance, the assumption is, to obtain relief through an appeal to the President after the case has been fully passed upon by the appeal board. The law brings the question of exemption home to the people. For that reason military members of the court were done away with.

There will be no class exemption, as indicated today. That is to say, farmer boys, because they are such, will not be allowed to escape the rule of military service. If it can be shown that they are of more value in the field than the army, they probably will be allowed to remain in civil life.

The high percentage of exemptions claimed embraces every phase of condition, and there will be difficult work before the boards in determining whether the claims are valid in the light of military necessity.

Married men are considerably in doubt as to their status. If the rule that applied to the National Guard is adhered to, dependency when actually existing will be valid for release, but not where a person has ample means to care for his family, or there are means for them being taken care of.

Business concerns over the country are again importuning Congress to see that their employes are left in the civil life, and instances have been reported where persons were looking for an opportunity to exert influence in order to save their sons from probable service in the trenches.

The rules President Wilson is to announce are expected to tighten the exemption list to the last notch and permit no one to go free that properly should do service. In order to insure this the list of applicants for appointment to the district appeal boards is to be carefully scanned before selections are made.
