

LARGE NUMBERS COME MONDAY FOR THE FORD

T. V. Reeves held the lucky number Monday afternoon which drew the Ford car, this being No. 19,664.

Monday was a big day in Canyon. The crowd was the largest the town has ever seen, and the interest in the chief event of the day was keen.

The crowd began to gather early in the morning. The rain on Saturday night had made it impossible for the farmers to work, and they took advantage of the wet spell and the chance to get a Ford to come to Canyon.

Jesse's band from Amarillo arrived a little after nine o'clock and played during the day. It is a splendid organization, and the people appreciated the music.

At 10:30 Jim Redfearn pulled off the chicken flight. The kids had a great time chasing the chickens, and in spite of the mud and water on the square closely followed the wagon as it drove around the square, while Mr. Redfearn tossed out the chickens for the boys to catch.

In the afternoon the big free auction on the south side attracted much attention. The sale lasted until nearly four o'clock, and the stuff sold well.

At four o'clock preparations were begun for the giving away of the Ford, when it began to rain and drove the crowd to cover. After a continued downfall of half an hour, it was decided best to go ahead with the drawing in spite of the rain as the farmers were anxious to start home. C. W. Warwick invited five men from the ticket holders to come out in the rain and take charge of the drawing without further ceremony.

The committee decided first to roll and tumble the barrel of tickets once around the square in order that they might be thoroughly shaken up and stirred around. This done, the committee decided to cut into the side of

the barrel in order to get a ticket. A little girl was invited out and after being blindfolded, reached down into the mass of tickets and drew a number, this being 19,664. Four other numbers were drawn as follows, 2624, 81,091, 16,850, 83,339.

There was a wait for nearly an hour and seemingly the first number drawn would not appear. L. G. Conner stood by with the second number drawn. A few minutes before the time was up T. V. Reeves, county clerk came rushing through the crowd with the lucky number. He stated that he was in the Guthrie Garage during the drawing, and when the numbers were announced, looked through his batch and decided that he did not have the ticket. He went from there to the east side of the square and discussed the drawing with a number of people. Being convinced that he was out of the race, he went to his office with the intention of going to work, when something told him to play safe and take another look at those tickets. In a short time the lucky number started him in the face, and with a few long jumps, he was out of his office to the court house lawn and onto the wagon where the committee was waiting for something to happen.

Mr. Reeves was declared the winner of the car.

The rain marred much of the pleasure of the day for the spectators, but seemingly all enjoyed the drawing.

The Canyon Business Men's Association was well pleased with the campaign during the Ford contest, and it is announced that the Second Monday Trades Days will continue as during the past eight months and will grow better all of the time. All of the citizens of Randall county are invited and urged to come to Canyon on each Second Monday and the business men will see that they are properly repaid in the bargains offered.

HOBBY WILL NOT SUBMIT NORMAL SCHOOL LEGISLATION

Austin, Texas, Sept. 8.—Acting Governor Hobby tonight made the following statement:

"While I am acting as Governor pending the impeachment trial, it is not my intention to submit to the Legislature either the repeal or the amendment of the normal school and other appropriations for new institutions made by the Thirty-Fifth Legislature. I can not think it is contemplated by the Constitution, or that it is wise, for one who is temporarily discharging the duties of Governor under these circumstances to initiate legislation about which there is a wide difference of opinion, and which likely will precipitate a heated and extended controversy."

Installed Automatic Canceller.

Assistant Postmaster Austin King and Clerk Dewey Foster have invested in a labor saving device for the local postoffice in the form of an automatic cancelling machine. A bunch of letter may be picked up and stacked on the machine, and with a few turns of the big wheel and the cancelling is done. It saves a great amount of time and relieves the men of the worrysome hand-stamping which they have been hitherto forced to do.

Mr. King states that the automatic machine is owned and controlled by a man who will not sell the patent. He allows any company who will pay royalties to manufacture the machine, but the machines cannot be sold. All machines are rented out at the rate of only \$1.50 per month. The boys feel that they have their money's worth for the coming year during the few days it has been installed.

LETTER FROM CHARLES HUNT FROM THE TRAINING CAMP

The boys who are to leave to make up the new army will be interested in the following letter from Charles F. Hunt, who went first from Randall county, together with Guy Harp. San Antonio, Sunday.

Dear Uncle:

Guy and I arrived here about 3:30 Saturday afternoon and pretty soon things began to happen to us. They piled us into a truck and rolled us out here and took us to a building where a doctor looked us over just a little (not the regular examination, that comes later).

Then they let Guy and myself over to a Colonel or something and Guy reported for Randall County to him. He asked us what branch of the service we wanted to enter. We asked him what he thought men of our calibre could do. He then asked us a lot of questions about what we had been doing. He then piled us into another truck and took us to the far side of the camp where a Major and a Captain asked us a lot of questions. Guy threw in with the Capt. and they kidded back and forth in the Masonic Lodge signs for a time being. Guy recommended us mighty high. He, the Capt. told us to come back and see him Sunday morning.

Then they took us to another building where we signed up for a mess kit, 2 blankets, a bed tick, comb, brush tooth brush, soap and towel. Then we had to fill out a bland form telling all about ourselves—where we went to school, what athletics we had done, etc., etc. We then went before another Captain who asked us a lot more questions about ourselves. We then had supper consisting of steak, gravy, spuds, ice tea and something else. We then sat on our bunks and talked until 9:30 when the lights went out. There were 8 to 13 old boys from the Regular Army with us and they showed us how to act. How to set up the cot, how to fold the blankets, etc.

For breakfast we had sausage, ham, coffee, corn flakes. We then reported to the Captain, who the day before had told us to do so. He told us he wanted us in his Supply Company. He took us down to another building and gave us each a messkit, 2 blankets, a bed tick, 2 pair pants, 2 shirts, hat, belt, 6 pairs socks, jacket, 3 pair drawers, 3 undershirts, 2 pair shoes, a rain coat.

We dolled ourselves up and began to have that "in the army now" feeling. We then went to work, and

Guy and I, with a couple of Lieutenants, checked up and sorted out 23, 500,000, nearly, pair of shoes. (I might add here that Guy and I did the sorting and the Lieutenants did the checking!)

In a day or so I'm going to work in the Captain's office.

Guy and I are right together, bunks side by side. We have just gotten through bulling a crowd about being moonshiners from Tennessee. We are well pleased with everything.

Dry The Garden Surplus.
Is the surplus from your "war garden" going to waste? Europe has been running her surplus through the dryer. The United States has followed this lead, and large drying plants have been located in several trucking centers. You are perhaps not in reach of one of these; but there are several good cook stove dryers on the market, and satisfactory ones may be made at home at as low a cost as \$1.25.

The principle of this drying is the same as in curing tobacco. Hot air circulates freely over the trays of vegetables which are placed one above another in a chamber (which may be as small as the portable oven of the oil stove, or as big as the tobacco barn itself) where the trays of vegetables, instead of tobacco are placed on the tobacco sticks.

Many farms have small out-buildings which could be converted into dryers by using a little stove-piping. The trays are made of light strips of wood and galvanized-wire netting. A thermometer is necessary in order to regulate the temperature. For full directions for constructing different types of dryers and drying fruits and vegetables, write to the Food Administration, Washington, D. C.

Dried vegetables can be stored easily, shipped easily, and do not freeze in winter. Small quantities, too trifling for canning, can be dried. Dried vegetables are truly palatable and often better than the canned product.

In this season of abundance, the wise provider will store large quantities of dried vegetables for winter stews and soups. If she be pressed for time, and sugar be scarce she may put up ample supplies of dried fruit for preserves later, or to be used, after soaking overnight, like fresh fruit for sauces and deserts.

Injured By Runaway Mules.

John Kearns, from Sedan, while working with the bridge gang on the Tramparis, was run over by a team of mules hitched to a load of gravel last Tuesday afternoon sustaining severe internal besides minor injuries such as nearly one-half of his scalp being cut through to the bone and thus allowed to drop down over his ear, the skin of his chin being cut from under the chin bone and scraping the lower lip loose from the lower jaw, the mark of the wagon wheel across his back and some bruising of flesh over ribs. He was brought to Dalhart for treatment that evening and is resting comfortably at this writing.—Dalhart Texan.

Sand Bank Caved In.

Doyle Herring, age 17, whose home is in Lamesa, was seriously hurt this morning at the sand pit in this city, when about four feet of sand caved in on him, while he was at work. This was the first day he had been working in the pit.

Other workmen saw the accident, and dug him out within five minutes. The sand covered him except for his head. His body and limbs were badly twisted by the weight of the sand, and his bladder was ruptured. He was taken to Dr. J. H. Wayland's office, and later removed to the Broadway hotel. His condition is much improved at later reports.—Plainview News.

Cattlemen to Price Livestock

Ed Laster of Falfurrias, Texas, one of the largest producers of live stock and past president of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, will have charge of the branch of the federal food administration dealing with meat products, under designation recently made by Herbert C. Hoover, who is to be the government's food administrator. This and other appointments will be made permanent as soon as the food control bill becomes effective.

Mr. Laster is member of the marketing committee of the National Live Stock Association. He has advocated that authority ought to be given the government to fix the basic price of live stock if found necessary as an essential to complete control of the food situation. It has been his contention that the producers of live stock ought to be assured of a market free from the buying interest and from ill-advised governmental regulation.

proved local warehouses, may obtain, upon their storage receipts, 90 day loans from member banks of the Reserve System at a rate not to exceed six per cent. Mr. Lou D. Sweet potato expert with the Food Administration, was instrumental in bring-

LETTER FROM JAMES YOUNGER WHO AWAITS ORDERS IN N. Y.

Lieut. James W. Younger writes the following from New York City where he is awaiting orders to go to France:

Wednesday, Sept. 5th

Dear Papa:

I believe I said in my last letter that I would write to you yesterday, but yesterday I was busy from seven in the morning until seven in the evening. I spent the entire morning at Fort Brown trying to get some field glasses and failed to get them; yesterday afternoon I spent at the quartermaster's on Governor's Island getting some more supplies.

Tomorrow I suppose I will get my final orders, because I go over to the Hospital at Hoboken for my second shot of paratyphoid prophylaxis.

I have been seeing everything I could while here that's worth seeing. I went to the top of the Woolworth building last week, which as you know is the tallest in the world. The view from its top is quite wonderful. I paid fifty cents for this opportunity. They gave me a little descriptive book which I sent to you.

I went over to see the interned German liner, the Vaterland. It happens to be the largest ship afloat. It is certainly of monstrous size. It looms up like a mountain. It is as high above the water as a building several stories high. About all a submarine would have to do would be to shoot in it general direction and it would almost surely land a hit.

I took the trouble to walk across the Brooklyn Bridge and I've ridden across the Manhattan Bridge about three or four times. They are only a few blocks apart. I have come to the conclusion that I have never seen a real bridge before. They are of immense size. The Manhattan is two stories high. It has about eight car tracks across it, some on the second story, a driveway and a wide walk for people. Both bridges are of about the same size.

Then I have been over to the Statue of Liberty. I am not sure of the height, but I think it is about three hundred feet. Visitors are allowed to go by stairway into the crown where there is a platform for observation with vents in the crown through which one may look. But as for me, I was extremely lucky, the officer newly in charge of the place was up there looking around at the same time with me and he invited me to visit the torch with him. So we climbed a ladder up through the arm, finding a

deer leading onto a platform around the lower edge of the flame. I climbed up into the flame also. Search lights are placed in various positions so that the whole structure is brilliantly lighted at night. And, of course, plenty of lights are placed in the flame, which is a glass covered frame, to light it from the inside. The Statue is an iron frame with a bronze covering, somewhat on the order of the dome of the capitol at Austin.

largest elephant.

I have been out Fifth Avenue as far as the farther end of Central Park. I had pointed out to me some of the old famous places, including St. Mark's Cathedral and the homes of the Astors, Vanderbilts, Goulds, etc. The business section is encroaching on these homes and most of them are in the business section.

There is one thing I must visit before I get away and that is a motion

picture studio.

You have heard a great deal about "The Great White Way." My place of abode is about a half block from that famous street. It includes Broadway from about 23rd to about 59th streets. This way with its myriads of dazzling electric lights, manipulated in a thousand clever and fantastic ways, includes most of New York's best and most prominent theatres, and is the swiftest current of gay and pleasure seeking New York.

I took a very interesting trip on Labor Day. I started from Canal and Lafayette streets walking east to Mulberry street where I came into the midst of "Little Italy". In this section thousands of Italian families are crowded together and packed in solid rows of tenement houses. After going a few blocks I was in the very heart of the Ghetto where push-carts with all kinds of wares are lined in long rows along the curb. Further on I explored a section inhabited almost entirely by Jews. After a few blocks more I reached the Manhattan Bridge and turned west into the Bowery. The Bowery today seems to be still a refuge for the "down and outs", but the criminal element has been cleaned up. In fact, it seems to me that New York is pretty well policed. After exploring this section I turned into Mott street which led into New York's Chinatown. To me, this was an interesting part of town. Past this section and into Bayard is said to have been infested with the skum of the world a few years ago. On Center street I came to the City Criminal Court Building. On the next block is the prison, which you have heard of as the Tombs. Connecting these

IS "FLAT" AGIN IT.
(From Southwest Plainsman.)

There is being some talk among the West Texas preas of dividing Texas in such a manner as to leave north and West Texas in one state and south and east Texas in another. Now, there may be some argument for such a move, but The News is against it, flat. The argument is that our part of the state would be rid of those rotten political conditions so prevalent in the foreign settled and whiskey sodden counties of the lower half of the present state. Texas has grown to her present summit of power and glory as one state and we feel that as much as we loathe those conditions as mentioned, yet we are our brother's keeper and it is only our duty to stay by the old ship of state and help the good people of south Texas to rid themselves of their cancerous politics. Much progress has already been made with our assistance, but it would be little short

of cowardly to leave them when the battle is half over. Let Texas remain the empire state and let us strive to make her all the name implies.—Clarendon News.

Editor Braswell is a newcomer in the Panhandle, and coming from East Texas where the people are disposed to live in the past, he is "agin" the division of the state. We predict, however, that by the time he has been "sat on" with the rest of us Panhandlers for awhile, he will be "flatter" than ever—on the other side.

We will have to confess that the "glory" of the mess down at Austin does not appeal to us and while we believe we are as proud of the splendid and romantic history of Texas as the most "dyed-in-the-wool" native, we believe that we owe something more to the present and future than mere quiescence in a position that is becoming intolerable. In fact that attitude does not fit well with the stories of valor recorded in Texas histories.

It is possible that East and South Texas needs us but the only need they recognize is the need of our taxes and we fail to see how the Plains country can hope to influence the political situation to any great extent so long as it is denied its rightful representation. The last legislature gave us an excellent example of how much that argument amounts to. The Panhandle is almost all prohibition territory and enough of the people of the rest of the state were with us on that proposition to prove that the majority of Texans wanted it. But when the legislature convened, did we get a chance to vote on state-wide prohibition? Not so, you could notice.

After all, Editor Braswell has only brought forward the same old reasons of sentiment in defense of his stand. If Texas were divided, the history of the state up to the point of division would still be as much the history of

West Texas as of East Texas or South Texas. Beyond that point, we have every confidence that West Texas is quite capable of making history for itself.

Aside from the rottenness of state politics, there is the greatest divergence in interests and conditions. Indeed, Texas has so little in common with the Plains that the people do not in the least, understand our needs or desires. Climatic and soil conditions are entirely different and a few years residence on the Plains makes even the people different.

Sentiment is a fine thing and it is a great pity that it does not enter into our commercial and political relations more than it does but it has always been our experience that the fellow who allowed his sentimental nature to be worked upon in a business deal in which the other party wielded that appealing weapon, always "got it in the neck."

ALMOST PERSUADED.

The Beacon is almost if not persuaded that the only sensible thing to do would be to set up house-keeping for ourselves. We look for the present investigation at Austin to result in a whitewash and so it will continue to be—West Texas will continue to get less than what is coming to her in matter of equal representation and a square deal in matters governmental. Let the Western newspapers line up solid for this movement and we will start something. The Beacon will not be found on the contrary side of the question.—Lockney Beacon.

Editor Smith's experience with Texas politics leads him to the same conclusion that has occurred to many others—that the present so-called impeachment proceedings will lead merely to a "white washing", and West Texas will continue to hold the sack for the rest of the state.

Governor Ferguson's announcement that he would be a candidate for a third term which was made immediately after he was indicted on numerous charges of malfeasance, shows plainly that he intends to run on the "persecution" platform. Undoubtedly that will appeal to many people and his late attempt to curry favor with West Texans by asking the legislature to appropriate money to help them buy seed wheat, is another indication of political astuteness which we were pleased to see repudiated by the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce who published an announcement that the farmers of the Panhandle had no need of assistance from the legislature.

Affairs at Austin need renovating when the legislature refused to condemn the Governor even after he has pleaded guilty to practically all of the serious charges preferred against him, as he did when brought before the legislature at its last regular session. If they would not impeach him then, there is small hope of their doing so now.

More About State Division.

Expressions from many newspaper men in this part of Texas are in favor of a division of the state, as was advocated by Senator Johnson and others some time ago. The Informer man, admitting there is some argument in favor of the division, is against it—both for sentimental and business reasons. A thorough investigation would, we believe, prove to any good business man that the benefits gained would in no wise balance up with those lost. First thing we know somebody'll be trying again to change the name of Arkansas.—Hedley Informer.

The sentiment for a division of the state of Texas is growing until it seems that it will become a popular demand. All the leading publications of West Texas are swinging into line for a new West Texas in name as well as in reality, and our educators know that the Plains will never experience political economy and self-government until the state is divided. Many of the editors of the larger papers say they would hold the old state together yet a while longer for old memory's sake, but that they realize the time has come when justice and honor call for a release from the rule of East Texas political bosses.—Slaton Slatonite.

State Highway Money Appropriated.

The state highway commission, through chairman, Curtis Hancock, has accepted the Puget-Sound-to-Gulf highway as official route No. 9, of the twenty-eight official highways across the state, and will extend aid to the various counties through which it runs, to be paid out of the federal highways fund.

The route will be improved in order of its route number.

Hale county will receive \$10,000 of the fund. The counties of Randall, Swisher, Lubbock and Lynn will also get \$10,000 each and Howard county will get \$5,000. Dawson and Potter counties will not be allowed anything at present. The Puget-Sound-to-Gulf route comes down by way of Dalhart thence through the counties mentioned above, and from Big Springs goes via San Angelo and San Antonio to Corpus Christi.

The assistance from the highway board was announced at the annual convention of the Puget-Sound-to-Gulf highway association held in Big Springs Thursday.

Curtis Hancock, chairman of the Texas State Highway Commission, accompanied by the members of his engineering corps, was present and gave assurance of cooperative interest and support of all legitimate highway propositions. He gave specific attention to the Puget Sound-to-Gulf route and instructions as to the specifications expected and demanded by the states.

Practically every county along the route from Amarillo to Corpus Christi had representation and marked enthusiasm characterized the deliberations of the convention with its more than two hundred delegates. Every representative of a considerable district was present with authority to represent his territory and many showings of active construction were offered.

At the convention it was determined under the suggestions of Mr. Hancock his engineers to make certain changes between Sweetwater and Plainview in such way as to conform to the present post roads. With these changes accomplished all is in

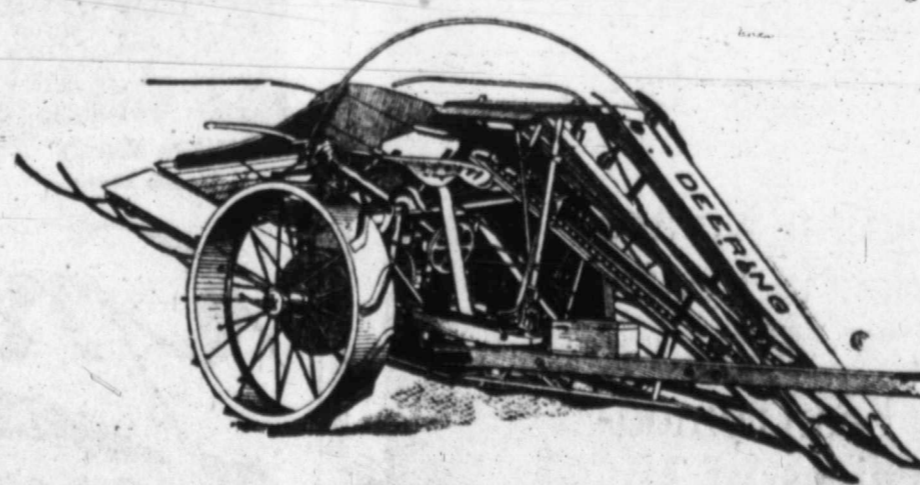
