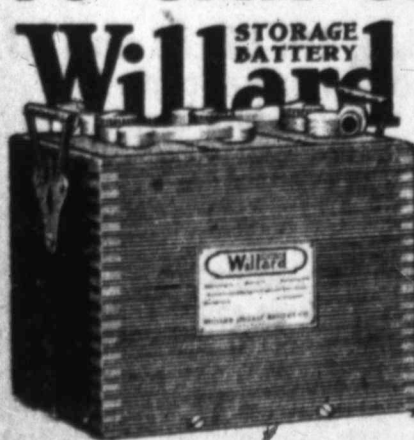

In Event of Death Among Soldiers.
The following memorandum, approved by the adjutant general has been released for publication:
In event of each death among officers or enlisted men of the army the adjutant general's office will continue the present practice of sending individual notices to the next of kin immediately upon receipt of such notice. This notice will generally consist of a brief notice giving the date, place and cause of death. The details attending the death will be given by the deceased's late organization commander.

All daths occurring among the troops of the expeditary force in France will be published in the official bulletin as soon as notice thereof has been received.

Under the law a deceased soldier's commanding officer has full jurisdiction in the matter of disposing of personal effects that may have been in the possession of the soldier at the time of his death and when the efforts are not claimed by the legal representative within a reasonable period, the proceeds of the sale are deposited in the United States treasury subject to the claim of the legal representative and all such claims are settled by the auditor for the war department.

A Day of Prayer for Germany.
To pray for Germany sounds like a novel way of worsening your enemies, but the Chicago clergyman who makes the suggestion that a day of prayer for Germany be observed in our land does so on the basis that the German people are our enemies, and that we are not theirs. The Chicago Tribune admits that it has read with "no little interest" this suggestion from one of its city pastors, especially as it is based upon the above principal that, it says, President Wilson has made clear in the reply he sent to the Pope's peace appeal.

"In entire sincerity and with only the purest motives, the churches of America pray that the truth about this war may be given manifest to the German people, that Germans may be given the courage and wisdom to secure emancipation, and that a free Germany, peaceful because free, may take its deserved place in a free and comparatively peaceful world. We suggest, therefore, that the churches of America appoint a day of prayer for the people of Germany. Should this be done there would perhaps be disgust and suspicion on the Germans' part, and disgust and suspicion might last for several days or weeks. Eventually, however, it would draw upon the Germans that what President Wilson said was so. Nor do we mean to argue that prayer is a mere subjective exercise when we predict that the news of an American day of prayer for the German people would lead numerous Germans to question the cleverness of longer starving and bleeding to postpone freedom."—Literary Digest.

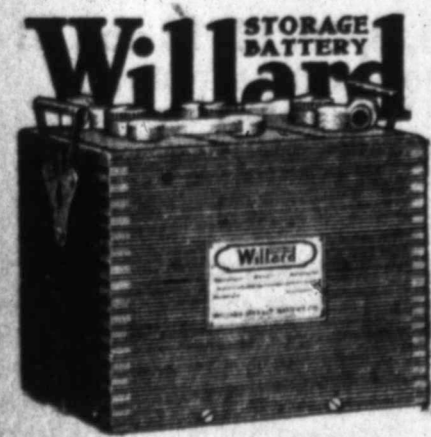

Heavy Loss of Live Stock.

"The killing of live stock on the railway tracks has become a more and more troublesome question to handle," says the Rock Island Railway in a circular letter to employees and the public, asking their cooperation in preventing this waste of meat when meatless days are staring the country in the face.

"During the year which ended June 30, 1917, the second district of the Rock Island lines killed 274 horses and mules, 1114 cattle, 1650 hogs, and 104 sheep, a total of 3142 head of stock," the letter continues. "This represents a total loss and an absolute waste. This stock was killed on eleven divisions, comprising the district.

"The country is being combed for horses and mules, both for army purposes and for farm work. The cattle loss does not represent a loss in beef alone, but a loss in dairy products also, as many of those killed are milch cows. Hogs sold on the Chicago market on August 21st at \$400 a ton live weight, which record price is an indictment of the criminal waste indicated by the useless slaughter of the above 1650 hogs killed by trains on this portion of the Rock Island Railway and represents in money value approximately \$57,750.

"The money loss, while serious, is

nothing compared to the food loss which is absolute and final as it is seldom possible to make use of food of any stock struck by trains and this loss is one which even this rich nation can ill afford."

Railway employees and owners of live stock, cooperating, need give this matter careful attention. Precaution and vigilance will reduce the loss of live stock on railroads very materially.

Dollar of the Fathers.

William Jennings Bryan, in his first presidential campaign, was the champion of the dollar of the daddy and the apostle of those who were loyal to the silver dollars of the fathers. Silver was smashed and Bryan was smashed with the white metal. Silver sold at par \$1 an ounce, in San Francisco on Sept. 5, for the first time since 1893. Holders of the metal were demanding the usual 5 cents an ounce over the New York price of 95.58 cents. Only a small quantity was to be obtained, San Francisco dealers said.

A year ago silver was selling at 68 cents an ounce.

Fifty thousand Mexican dollars lying in sacks on the floor of a New York dealer in silver bullion were one of the evidences Wednesday of the rapidly mounting price of bar silver which has now reached a record-breaking figure. These Mexican dollars are to be converted into bullion and represented but a small fraction of the silver currency now being brot out of Mexico despite measures of the Mexican government to prevent its money from being drained off by the attraction of high bullion prices in the United States.

Is silver coming into its own again? If so, the former magnates of the silver mines of America are certain to reestablish themselves as the bonanza kings of the western hemisphere. William Jennings Bryan, in 1896, and again in 1900, when he appeared in the role of a stricken prophet, predicted the resurrection of silver and the restoration of the white metal to its former place in the house of the fathers.—Ft. Worth Record.

Prussian ingenuity, spurred on by the war's necessities, has already devised a number of substitutes for a genuine and lasting peace.—Chicago Herald.

I just thought for the last thing I'd ask God to look after the wife and kiddies, and its a funny thing, but I saw a lot of angels in the sky and among them I thought I saw smiles of my wife and kids, and then I knew nothing more for eight days.

That's the idea, when men are engaged in such great work they do not stop to think of the non-essentials. They feel like fellow men, like brothers. It is only in the small and piping times of peace that men stop to quarrel about religious differences, or think that his salvation depends on whether he was baptised in this church or that, whether he carries a crucifix or crescent even. Those are the differences that men exaggerate in times when they have nothing else to do. When a man is doing big work and suffering big he knows and realizes that it is all alike—that heaven is over all and he respects every man's sincere belief.—Cedar Rapids Republican.

In Event of Death Among Soldiers.

The following memorandum, approved by the adjutant general has been released for publication:

In event of each death among officers or enlisted men of the army the adjutant general's office will continue the present practice of sending individual notices to the next to kin immediately upon receipt of such notice. This notice will generally consist of a brief notice giving the date, place and cause of death.

The details attending the death will be given by the deceased's late organization commander.

All daths occurring among the troops of the expeditionary force in France will be published in the official bulletin as soon as notice thereof has been received.

Under the law a deceased soldier's commanding officer has full jurisdiction in the matter of disposing of personal effects that may have been in the possession of the soldier at the time of his death and when the efforts are not claimed by the legal representative within a reasonable period, the proceeds of the sale are deposited in the United States treasury subject to the claim of the legal representative and all such claims are settled by the auditor for the war department.

A Day of Prayer for Germany.

To pray for Germany sounds like a novel way of worshipping your enemies, but the Chicago clergyman who makes the suggestion that a day of prayer for Germany be observed in our land does so on the basis that the German people are our enemies, and that we are not theirs. The Chicago Tribune admits that it has read with "no little interest" this suggestion from one of its city pastors, especially as it is based upon the above principal that, it says, President Wilson has made clear in the reply he sent to the Pope's peace appeal:

"In entire sincerity and with only the purest motives, the churches of America pray that the truth about this war may be given manifest to the German people, that Germans may be given the courage and wisdom to secure emancipation, and that a free Germany, peaceful because free, may take its deserved place in a free and comparatively peaceful world. We suggest, therefore, that the churches of America appoint a day of prayer for the people of Germany. "Should this be done there would perhaps be disgust and suspicion on the Germans' part, and disgust and suspicion might last for several days or weeks. Eventually, however, it would draw upon the Germans that what President Wilson said was so. Nor do we mean to argue that prayer is a mere subjective exercise when we predict that the news of an American day of prayer for the German people would lead numerous Germans to question the cleverness of longer starving and bleeding to postpone freedom."--Literary Digest.

The German military leaders refuse to believe that an American army was landed in France, and probably General Pershing will have to take his forces right into Berlin to convince them. -- Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

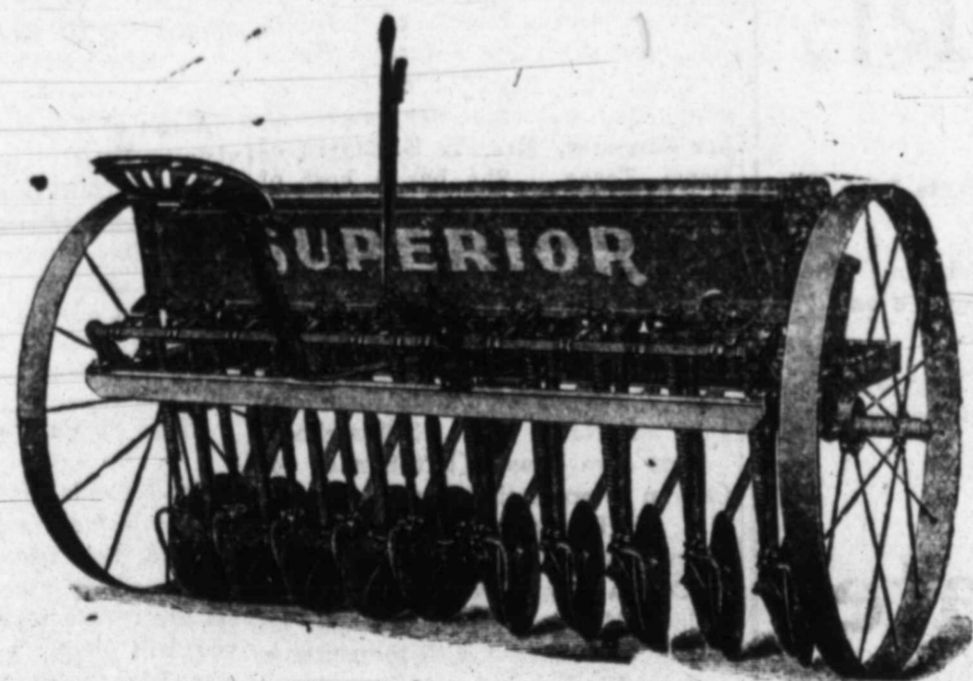
