

ROAD BOND ELECTION CALLED FOR NOV. 24

The Commissioners Court was in session Saturday afternoon and voted to order an election in this county for Saturday, November 24 on the question of voting a bond of \$50,000 on the county for the purpose of building good roads.

The commissioners are aware of the fact that road work and much of it must be done during the next few months to fix up the bad places in the roads. Rather than issue warrants for this purpose, the court decided that the best way to handle the proposition was to order an election and call upon the voters to decide the question.

At a meeting of the Canyon Business Men's Association Tuesday night the commissioners were praised for the work of calling the election and each member pledged to work for the carrying of the election.

Judge C. R. Flesher was designated as chairman of precinct No. One on a committee to work for the success of the election. The other members, one from each precinct will be named during the coming week.

Judge Flesher pointed out that Federal Aid will come to the county on some of the roads as the mail is carried on some of the roads contemplated for future work.

If the present routes can be changed in some respects, considerable money may be procured from the Federal Government for good roads. The Federal Government is thoroughly convinced that good roads are the greatest asset of any country and it is giving all the aid possible in putting roads in first class condition every section of the country.

The issuance of bonds means that the county will have to raise only about \$4000 additional taxes in order to pay the interest on the bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay off the bonds. This would make only a 9 cent raise on all of the taxes, making a very light assessment for the people of the county in comparison to the great benefit to be derived from the good roads of the county.

Let every enterprising man in the county get busy now and work for the bond issue. Let Randall county have the kind of roads our people deserve.

Why spend hours dodging mud holes in the public roads when these some hours can be so profitably spent in the field producing grain.

DOWNING HAD CAR OF HOGS IN THE KANSAS CITY FIRE

A fire in the stock yards at Kansas City destroyed several thousand hogs and cattle Monday, and covered eight acres of the yards.

S. M. Downing had a car of hogs in the fire, which were lost.

Mr. Downing states that the shippers' stock is insured by the Stockyard Association as soon as it arrives, and that the hogs will not be a loss to him.

Mr. Downing has a unique experience in that he has never carried insurance on any of his shipments of stock nor upon any of his household effects or other property, and this is the first fire that he has ever been in. He stated that of the hundreds of loads of stock he had shipped to the markets he has never had one in the ditch through a railroad wreck.

The frost has stayed off wonderfully well this year, which fact has certainly been a blessing to the farmers of Randall county.

Many of the farmers have been planting or getting ready to plant wheat since they have practically all of the row crop cut that they wish to use in the bundle.

Two Prizes Omitted.

On the list handed the News last week of the prize winners in the county fair, two premiums were overlooked by the judges—1st on Sudan and 1st on sorghum—both being won by J. S. Pool. The samples were right fine and Mr. Pool furnished good bundles of each to go to both the Amarillo and Dallas fairs.

The particulars of his death are yet unknown here. A letter from him last week stated that the levies along the river were breaking and that the soldiers were fighting day and night to keep the water from the town of Brownville. It was further stated that his company was to leave for Ft. Worth the latter part of the week.

Sunday a message came from his Captain at Ft. Worth stating that he had been drowned and that the body was found in too bad a condition to be moved. It is evident that his death occurred before the company left Brownville and that the Captain was notified in Ft. Worth of the finding of the body.

The citizens of Canyon are grieved to hear of the death of Mr. Henson and extend their sympathy to Judge and Mrs. Henson in their sadness.

Special Bond Election.

Whereas, the Commissioners Court of Randall County, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of said County for the purposes hereafter stated:

Therefore it is hereby ordered by the Commissioners Court of said County that an election be held on the 24th day of November A. D. 1917, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

—Shall the Commissioners Court of Randall County, Texas be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, payable in forty years after date with option to redeem same at any time after Ten years from date, bearing interest at the rate of Five and one-half cent (5½) per annum payable semi-annually on the 10th day of April and the 10th day of October respectively and to levy a tax to pay the interest on the said bonds and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity for the purpose of Construction of bridges and the improvement and maintenance of public roads within the county.

Said election shall be held at the following places in said County of Randall.

Voting Precinct No. One at Court House in Canyon, Texas.

Voting Precinct No. Two at Jowell School House.

Voting Precinct No. Three at Ralph School House.

Voting Precinct No. Four at Fairview School House.

Voting Precinct No. Five at Connelly School House.

Voting Precinct No. Six at Trigg School House.

Voting Precinct No. Seven at High Point School House.

Voting Precinct No. Eight at Umlarger School House.

Voting Precinct No. Nine at Edmonds School House, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election.

S. B. Lofton, Precinct No. One.

C. P. Hileman, Precinct No. Two.

R. W. Bruce, Precinct No. Three.

H. E. Wesley, Precinct No. Four.

John Boulware, Precinct No. Five.

Andy Costley, Precinct No. Six.

D. R. Burns, Precinct No. Seven.

A. P. Baird, Precinct No. Eight.

W. L. Deeke, Precinct No. Nine.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149 Act of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of 1899 and only qualified voters, who are tax payers of said County shall be allowed to vote and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed on their ballots the words "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS" and those opposed shall have printed on their ballots the words "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS". The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State governing general elections. A copy of this order signed by the County Judge of said County shall serve as proper notice of said election and the County Judge is directed to cause said notices to be posted up at the places designed for holding said election at least thirty days prior to the date of said election.

Letter From Raymond Armstrong - Ft. Douglas, Utah, Sept. 30, 1917

Dear Folks at home,

Well I am O. K. and hope this letter finds you the same. I received your letter a few days ago and was very glad indeed to hear from you as I always long to get a little message from home telling me all the news and how you are progressing.

Well we go on the range Monday will be on for two weeks. I will know then how good a marksman I am. We have had gallery practise for sometime with twenty two rifle, and out of ten shots from position I made 45 and sitting I made 46 and kneeling I made 43 and standing I made 42 so that is not so bad out of ten shots at a position, if I do that well on the range I will make expert rifleman which will give me about \$5.00 more in pay.

Well we had winter clothes, given to us so we are pretty well fixed for the winter. We are getting in full days now at drill. Get out at 5:15 and go for drill don't come in till 11:30 and go out at 1:30 and put in the afternoon until 5:00 o'clock, so you see we get in a full day but at that I never felt better in my life. I am getting fat I weigh 178 lbs. now and when I came out here I only weighed 165, so you see this Utah Mountain air is doing me good and the scenery is great but it has got pretty cold here at night it is just like Texas always sunshine and when it rains out here it turns cold and stays that way for several nights but it is getting the time of the year for it to get cold as old timers say it generally gets cold enough to snow at this time of the year I think we will leave here in a couple of weeks for a warmer climate.

They are wanting bakers in the Army I may be transferred to the bakery and get sent to Calif., but I have so good here I hate to leave so I don't know yet what I want to do, but I have made first class Private and have a good chance for corporal or sergeant so I don't know yet what I want but at present I think maybe I will stay where I am I know if I will leave here the only thing that I would transfer to the bakers would be to get out of here for the winter.

Well we had a swell dinner today for Sunday will write you what we had—chicken pie, sliced tomatoes, sweet potatoes, celery, and they were good I almost foundered on them—apple pie and lemonade, that is all I can think of. That was enough for me, as I thought some of the boys would have to take me away from the sweet potatoes. I tell you we sure get well fed and it is well cooked too.

"The use of baking powder breads made of corn and other coarse flours instead of patent wheat flour is recommended by the Conservation Division of the Food Administration. The wheat needed for export is thus conserved, and at the same time healthful food for our own people is provided. 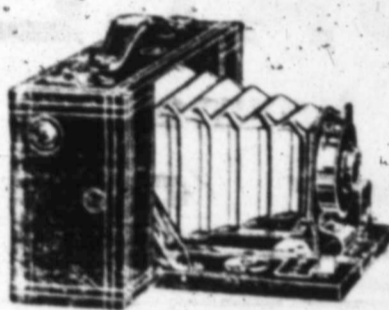

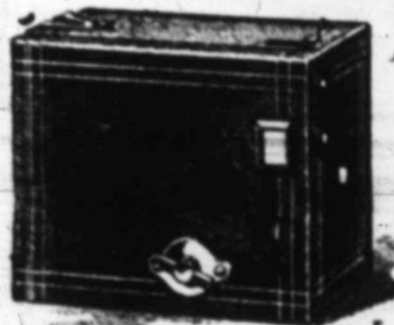

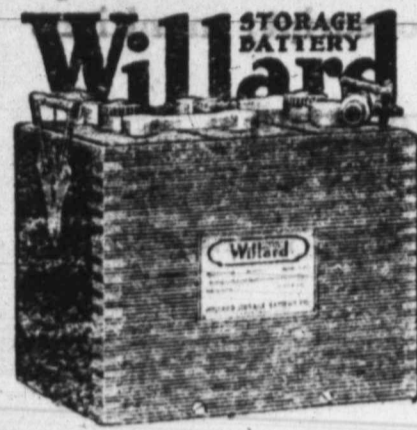

In Amarillo he showed only in the six months old class.

Two Men Killed.

According to a report made to the Raton (New Mexico) Reporter by C. D. Jones, of Fisher's Peak mesa, two men were killed and two others seriously injured in an automobile accident in North Sugarite canon, about four miles north of Lake Maloya, when the automobile in which they were riding backed over a 30-foot embankment. The men of the party, D. F. Gregg and H. D. Shipley, of the Gregg Land and Cattle company, and two of their employees, Vernor McMullen and "Shorty" Davidson, were enroute in an Overland six to the H. Triangle Bar ranch on Fisher's Peak mesa, where they pasture their cattle, when their engine refused to work and the brakes failed to hold the heavy machine which backed swiftly down the road and over the embankment, with the above result.

Davidson and McMullen were instantly killed and Crosby and Gregg were frightfully mangled. Both legs of the men were broken and they were otherwise seriously injured.

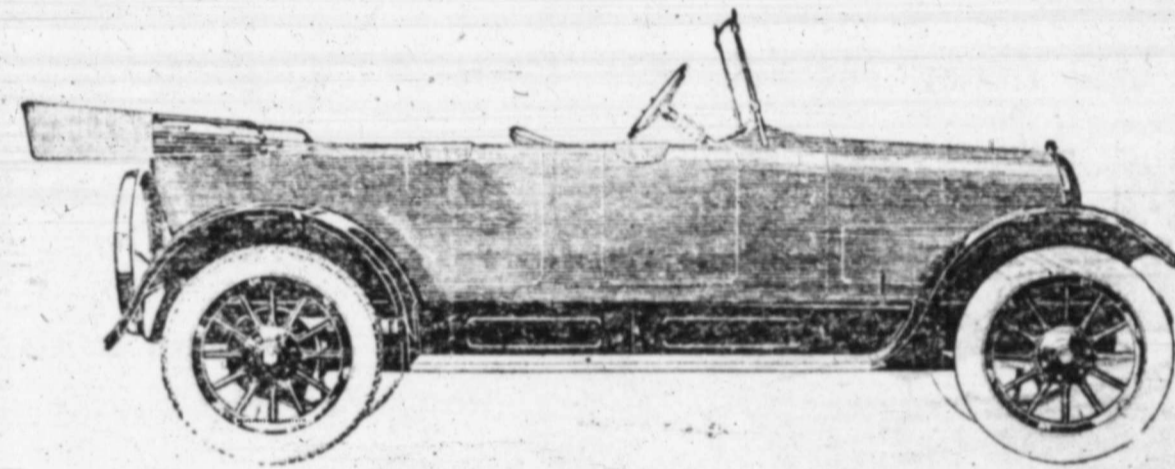

October 1, 1917.

Dear John: Wrote you a card some time ago. It seems like a month

We are working a little harder now than when I wrote, but still have lots of time to loaf and feel like doing it too.

Most of us have had our second shot of typhoid prophylaxis, and together with the vaccinations some of us have felt a little off our feed the last week.

I made one trip to town the first Saturday night after arriving but will be unable to go again before next Saturday.

Am now in the Prov. Field Hospital Co. No. 5. Will get the regular drill for a few weeks then expect they will give us special work. I think I will get a truck or possibly a shop job.

Am very well satisfied here until I get over my shots and the drilling, as we have a good mess, a piano, and several musicians.

Gray, who used to barber at the Star Barber Shop, has a bunk next to me, and the company is full of auto mechanics.

Things seem lonesome at times in spite of the number of men. Have had only one letter since arriving.

Just heard that they are going to get the submarines by draining the Atlantic and running them down with Fords. That ought to make business good.

Curtis Fears, of Duke, was accidentally shot by his wife last Thursday night. Mr. Fears had left home to attend to some business matters and told his wife he would be gone about thirty minutes, but he returned within ten or fifteen minutes and his wife hearing him come in at the back door thought he was a burglar. She picked up an automatic revolver for protection but she did not know how to shoot it and in handling the gun and trying to figure out how to operate it she accidentally pulled the trigger, the bullet going through the door and striking Mr. Fears in the abdomen, from the effects of which he died the following morning at 5 o'clock. 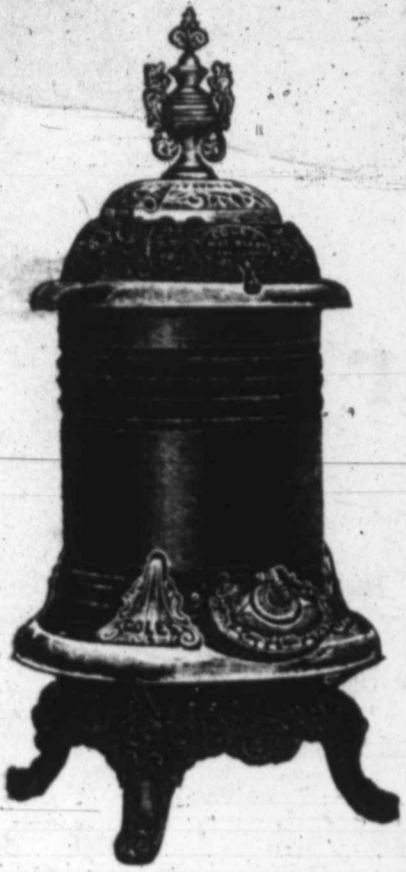

Economy in Phone Conversation.
An unusual condition is made apparent by the advertisements of The Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company calling upon subscribers to practise conservation in the use of the telephone. The public is advised that congestion exists in certain telephone centers and that the protection of necessary service demands the elimination of all that is unnecessary in the way of telephone talk.

"For a long time it was practically impossible," explains Menager W. J. Stewart. "Some of the raw material used in its manufacture was appropriated in bulk to the uses of war. Now orders are accepted, but they are subject to very long delay in delivery."

"Meanwhile, because of such great military activity in Texas, the volume of telephone calls greatly increased. This was in the face of the fact that plans for the extension of the telephone plant to meet no more than normal increase in the business could not be carried into execution.

"Now we have plain physical restrictions due to the lack of apparatus. In cities around which training camps are located the condition is said to be felt keenly and it was plain that something must be done.

Five Filthy Fingers.

Did you ever make a dairy of your fingers? Did you ever set down in cold black and white the things your fingers touch every day and did you ever consider the number of times daily that your unwashed fingers seek your mouth?

When surgeons discovered that it was their own infected fingers which carried germs into wounds they set about trying to discover a means whereby their hands could be rendered surgically clean, i. e., free from germs. The whole realm of chemistry was ransacked for agents which would disinfect hands, and the scrubbing and immersions to which they subject their hands are even yet a tender memory to the surgeons of that period. But all of these efforts proved useless and at last in despair surgeons took to wearing rubber gloves which could be boiled, thus bringing to each patient, as it were, a fresh pair of sterile hands. In other words, try as you will you can't by any known method make your hands absolutely clean.

The great agent in the spread of

these diseases whose causative organism is present in the secretions of the mouth and nose, is the human hand; and if saliva was bright green we would be amazed at the color of our fingers. As a matter of fact most of us carry our fingers to our mouth or nose many times daily, there to implant the germs which other careless people have spread about, there to collect a fresh cargo of infectious material to scatter for somebody else. It is true that most germs of disease die quickly once they leave the human body but what does the death of a few billion germs matter so long as the supply is copious and never ending.

What an enormous number of infected things we touch during the day and how infrequent and cursory are the hand washings we perform.

The answer is to keep your fingers out of your mouth and nose. Thus we limit the spread of disease from these orifices at least, thus we eliminate the danger of contracting disease from someone else who was not quite so careful.
