

FOOD CAMPAIGN BEGINS SATURDAY IN THIS CO.

"Randall County is ready to do her part in the food conservation campaign," said D. A. Park, County Food Administrator, at the great meeting held last Thursday in Amarillo, when there gathered forty men from the forty-four counties of the 8th District to study the great question at hand.

Pledge Card Week. During the week of Oct. 28 to Nov. 4, every home in this county will be visited by the County Food Administrator and his assistants for the purpose of enlisting all our people in the cause of saving all of the food which has hitherto been wasted or allowed to spoil. Our Food Administrator is a busy man this week making plans for the great drive beginning Monday morning, and his assistants will be thoroughly trained by the opening of the campaign. The pledge card campaign will be carried on in every county in the United States, and will be pushed vigorously. After the pledge cards are received in Washington, and every family's name registered there, instructions in regard to saving food will be mailed out. The men and women who make the canvass in this county are instructed to take the names of any who refuse to sign the cards and the reason for refusal. These refusals will be forwarded to Washington.

It was clearly pointed out in the great meeting at Amarillo last Thursday when County Administrators from forty counties in this northwest Texas section gathered for a conference with Porter A. Whaley, District Food Administrator, that the necessity of saving food had become so apparent to the government, that if our people refused to save the waste in foods, our nation would soon be on the meal ticket basis as the nations of Europe are today. Necessity was the key-note of that meeting. Saving the little bits will add greatly to the whole. It is not a question of whether our people want to or not—it is a question of the life or death of democracy, and in which our government will not shrink to compel the person who refuses to help our boys and our Allies who are fighting.

The Food Administrator from Daltahart issued a challenge to the Administrators in each of the forty-four counties, stating that his county would show the greatest per cent of the people having signed the pledge cards by Nov. 4. Every county at once accepted the challenge, and every County Administrator and his assistants are doing their best to beat Daltahart. The people of this county are anxious that we win in this friendly competition and all will assist our Administrator in the work.

Condemn Feeding Wheat. Regarding the farmers who have been feeding wheat to hogs, the following resolution was offered at the meeting in Amarillo: Amarillo, Texas, Oct. 18, 1917. To the Honorable Porter A. Whaley, District Food Administrator for the 8th District of Texas: We, your committee, appointed to present resolutions looking to the conservation of the food supply of America particularly affecting the bread supply beg leave to report as follows and await your further commands: Whereas it is a well known fact that there exists a great shortage in wheat for the use of the allied nations and numerous farmers and stock feeders

worker be at this conference. Pledge cards and other literature will be given the workers at this time. The speakers who are to go out Sunday are expected to be at this meeting to get the fundamental points of the message they are expected to take over the county on Sunday afternoon.

All of the city and county is cordially invited to attend and there will be many things of importance for all. Mrs. T. H. Rowan, president of the City Federation of Women's Clubs, has pledged the cooperation of the Federation in this movement, and is urging the women of Canyon to attend the meeting Saturday and to assist every way possible in the campaign next week.

Speaking Campaign Sunday. Sunday there will be a campaign in every part of the county to promote the food campaign.

The conservation question will be presented Sunday in the churches of Canyon.

Congressman Marvin Jones addressed a large audience at the district court room Friday afternoon on the importance of the Liberty Loan bond sale. Mr. Jones has just returned from Washington where he had the distinction of answering every roll call of the House during the past session.

Coming as he did from the scenes of action where so much has been done to forward the cause of our country in this war, he had a message which should have been heard by every man and woman in Randall county.

The fact that the Kaiser started out to conquer the world and that America was to pay to bill was forcefully brought home in such a manner as to stimulate every man to do his utmost in investing in bonds which will go so far in saving this nation from the tyranny of despotism—William.

Prof. J. A. Hill opened the program with a splendid address, tracing the fights which have been based upon autocracy vs. human freedom, of which this war is a clear example.

After the addresses the new flag was run up on the flag pole over the court house.

ROAD BOND CAMPAIGN WILL BE STARTED AT ONCE

The campaign in Randall County to vote \$50,000 in bonds for good road work will be started at once.

County Judge C. R. Flesher is at the head of the committee to work for the bonds and precinct chairmen will be appointed at once to get in action for the bond election on Nov. 24.

LOAN SUBSCRIPTION IS SHORT

THE LOAN BONDS TO THE AMOUNT OF NEARLY \$20,000.00 MUST BE TAKEN IN RANDALL COUNTY BEFORE FRIDAY NIGHT IF THIS COUNTY DOES WHAT OUR GOVERNMENT EXPECTS OF US.

This report was made this morning by County Judge C. R. Flesher, who was appointed by the Federal Reserve Bank to keep in touch with the situation in Randall county and make reports daily upon the condition of the campaign.

The government expects \$66,159 in subscriptions from this county.

Every man in the county can help materially by taking a small bond.

The men with money should subscribe for large bonds.

The government must have the money to win the war, and every man in the county is under obligation to the government under which he lives and by which he is protected to subscribe to this loan.

The subscriber is not giving anything to the government. He is simply making a loan at four per cent interest.

The two contest teams are busily making a thorough canvass of the town and county.

If you have not subscribed, see either of the captains, W. D. Morrel or C. D. Lester, or any member of either team. In each bank there is a member of each team, so you may go to any of the three banks, leave your subscription, and assist in the little contest which is being made by the men of Randall county.

The News will publish next week a list of the persons in the county who have subscribed to this loan.

Buy a Liberty Loan Bond today—but by all means do not put it off longer than tomorrow, as the banks here will not accept your subscription later than Friday, and in this case, it will have to be wired to Dallas. Subscriptions made today are mailed to Dallas, so look after this today.

BAPTIST COMMITTEES WILL MEET HERE NEXT TUESDAY

On next Tuesday thirty five delegates from the ten Baptist Associations will meet in Canyon for the purpose of going into the matter of buying the property of the Canyon City Club in order to establish a general meeting place for the Baptist of Northwest Texas.

Rev. B. F. Fronabarger, pastor of the local Baptist church has had the proposition in hand for a number of months and has visited the various Associations and has found no trouble in convincing the Associations of the necessity of such a place and of the highly advantageous qualities of the Canyon City Club.

Rev. Fronabarger states that the question of financing the proposition is the only one he sees in the way of consummating the deal which was started several weeks ago, and which has been agreed to unanimously by the members of the club.

Duff Sells Calves at \$40.

J. N. Duff, from the south part of the county, has sold 102 Hereford high grade calves at \$40 per head, which is one of the best prices reported in the county.

Mr. Duff came to Randall county seven years ago from Lone Tree, Io. "It was pretty touch for a new man in a new country, with a drought on," said Mr. Duff in recalling the first year of his experience here. But Mr. Duff recognized from the start that a man must have stock to make it go in the Panhandle, and so after a short time he bought cattle and since that time, has done well here. He stated that he would not consider going back to Iowa to farm. He stated that his nephew from Missouri was here last fall to visit him, and they began to compare their farm lands. His nephew had a 120 acre farm and Mr. Duff had two sections. The cost price to each man was the same.

Mr. Duff states that he has a hundred acre field which has been in wheat during the past four years. He has sold three crops, realizing \$6500 for them and has this year's crop on hand which he has not yet sold.

HARRY WORD SHOWS NO IMPROVEMENT

Harry Word lies in the hospital in Glarendon, having never recovered consciousness after the fall of his horse a week ago Tuesday morning.

Several times this week the doctor believed that he was making progress, and then he would seemingly grow worse.

According to a report received at noon today he opened his eyes last night for the first time since the accident. But he hid not seem to be conscious of his surroundings.

A trouble developed in his lung Monday night which was feared might develop into pneumonia, but while the danger is not passed, the lung seems to be better.

The doctor this morning states that he is not gaining, but is holding his own, and extends hope that within the next two or three days there will be a decided change for the better.

NEW POSTAL RATES GO INTO EFFECT NOV. 2—HALF MORE

Beginning on Friday morning, Nov. 2, there will be an increase by one-half in the postal rates of letters and postcards.

For sealed letters going out of town, there must be three cents in stamps. For drop letters, there must be two cents. Post cards take two cents.

This increase is in keeping with the new law passed by congress to raise funds for the war.

A tax on railroad tickets will be added of 8 cents on every dollar paid in fare.

Easton Allen in France.

Prof. and Mrs. L. G. Allen have received letters during the past week from their son, Easton, who is in the United States service. This is the first word they have received for nearly two months.

Canyon now has two boys in France, Lieut. James Younger and Easton Allen.

COME TO CANYON TO LIVE.

LAWSON MORELAND HERE FROM NAVAL DUTIES

Lawson Moreland was here this week from the Cruiser St. Charleston where he has been on duty from the past several months, having entered the naval service in March.

Lawson has been having some unique experiences since entering the navy. He was in the training camp for one month, and was then placed on the Cruiser. Since then he has been covering various portions of the Atlantic waters, and has seen various and sundry places and things of interest.

His ship has touched at all of the principal Atlantic ports of our country, and the boys were given days on the coast, one-half leaving the ship at a time.

One of the most enjoyable trips was to the Panama Canal. His ship did not go through the Canal, but the boys visited every section of it, and went across to the Pacific side on the train.

His most notable experience came in June when his Cruiser accompanied the first large detachment of U. S. fighters across to France. Lawson states that the convoys are well protected while making the crossing, being accompanied by the cruisers and the torpedo boats. He states that a sub-marine fired at one of the convoys on the trip over, but his ship was not close enough to engage the sub. Lawson stated that the boys of the naval are always anxious to meet a sub. They believe that they have an equal chance to get the sub, before it gets them.

Arriving at the port in France, his ship spent two weeks in the harbor and the boys were given considerable time on the shore. Lawson states that a splendid reception was accorded the United States troops and the sailors. He states that he got fine meals in France and at as reasonable rates as in this country. The French people are delighted to have the Americans with them. Lawson did not have an opportunity to visit the American camps as they were more than 300 miles from the coast, but he was told that while our boys had never participated in a fight as a unit, many of them were taking their places in the trenches, relieving the English and French troops for long periods.

Lawson looks fine and says that the navy is the only life. He has fine grub and the very best of treatment. He left this week so as to report

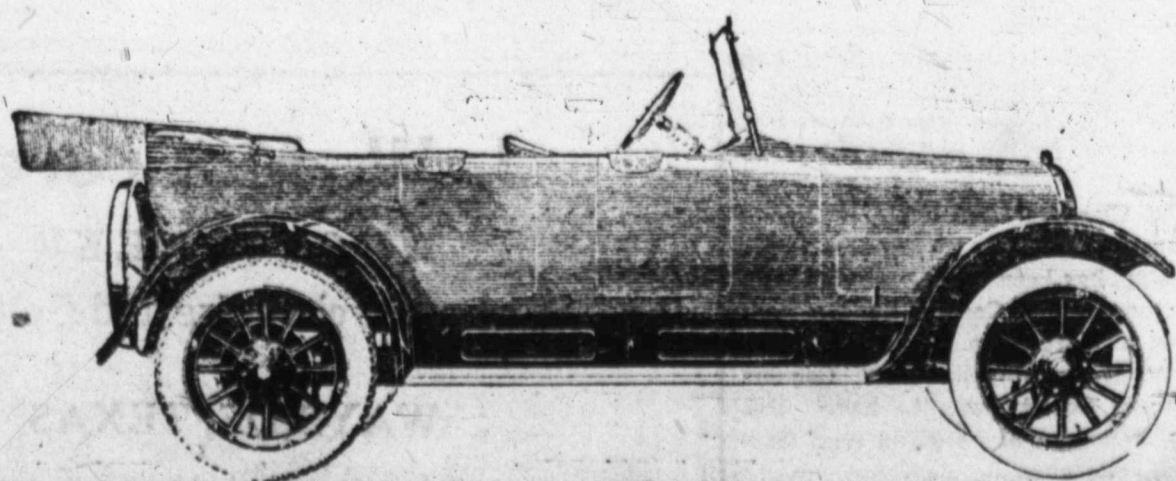

John Boulware, Precinct No. Five.

Andy Costley, Precinct No. Six.

D. R. Burns, Precinct No. Seven.

A. P. Baird, Precinct No. Eight.

W. L. Deeke, Precinct No. Nine.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149 Act of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of 1899 and only qualified voters, who are tax payers of said County shall be allowed to vote and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed on their ballots the words "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS" and those opposed shall have printed on their ballots the words "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS". HOW TO SEND GIFTS TO THE SOLDIERS ABROAD

Christmas Packages Should be in Mails by Nov. 15—Limits on Size.

All Christmas packages from Dallas for soldiers in France should be brought to the main postoffice or Station A not later than Nov. 15, according to a bulletin from the Second Assistant Postmaster General sent to J. H. Clarke, superintendent of mails of the Dallas office. No package will be received by drug stores and other contract offices for the reason that each package must be inspected and passed on at the main office before admission to the mails.

There should be no stickers of any character, other than postage, affixed to this class of mail, the bulletin states, as these might cause delay in foreign offices by being mistaken for postage stamps. The rates are 12c a pound or fraction thereof and the packages can not be insured, registered or sent C. O. D. No customs declarations are required. No package heavier than twenty pounds will be accepted and small packages are preferable, as they can be handled more expeditiously. Too much attention to the strength and security of packing can not be paid, particularly with reference to breakable matter or anything that might be injured by crushing.

The woman's bureau of the American Red Cross has issued the following bulletin, giving suggestions for the selection and packing of Christmas packets:

By Christmas we shall have a large number of men in France, and 600,000 in the cantonments at home, besides the thousands in our regular army posts and in our navy, and everyone will be eager to help in giving them Christmas cheer.

No matter how generous a supply of gifts some of the men may receive from families and friends, it is believed that all Red Cross members will want to unite in sending to each man a Christmas package filled with good things and good will.

In order that the men may be usually remembered and yet that there may be a pleasing variety in the packages, the following suggestions are made for preparing and assembling the Christmas parcels:

1. Nothing should go in them which will not keep fresh for the time of packing until Christmas.
2. Drier fruits and other food products should be packed in small tin or wooden boxes, one quarter to one-half pound size.
3. Hard candy, including chocolate, would probably be safe in tin foil or heavy card board, but no soft chocolates or anything that could possibly be crushed should be used, as the remaining contents of the package might be spoiled thereby.

4. Several dainties packed in oblong tin boxes holding each a quarter of a pound will provide a better variety for a packet than a larger quantity of a single confection.

5. No liquids or articles packed in glass should be placed in the package.

6. For wrapping the gifts, use a khaki-colored handkerchief, twenty-seven inches square, and form the base of the packet by placing on the center of the handkerchief a pad of writing paper about seven by ten inches.

7. Select a variety of articles either from the suggested list (or according to individual wishes) to an amount not to exceed \$1.50, and arrange them on the pad of paper so that the entire package shall be the width of the pad and approximately five or six inches high.

8. Wrap and tie with one-inch red ribbon and place a Christmas card under the bow of ribbon. A card bearing the greetings of the chapter would be desirable.

9. Wrap the parcel again in heavy, light brown Manila paper, tie securely with red, green or gilt cord.

Chapters will receive directions from division manager as to the dates France and also as to the dates when those intended for the home canton-

ments should be ready for distribution. It is expected that money for the Christmas packages will be raised by chapters, through contributions by individuals for this specific purpose.

Holsteins Making Money.

Mr. Will Rhodes who lives two miles west of Dalhart owns four Holstein Cows that were shipped to Dalhart in May. Since then he has been milking them and has just sold \$300.00 worth of hogs that he raised from the skim milk and during the last week in July and first three weeks in August sold from the four cows \$79.01 worth of 20 per cent cream on the Dalhart market at 80 cents per gallon. Mr. Rhodes says that these four cows will make himself and family the best living they ever had and that this winter he expects to milk eight

cows instead of four and double his income and handle twice as many hogs as he did this summer.

Hazleton & Pigman owners of the big herd of registered and high grade Holsteins one mile north of Dalhart have two heifers each aged two, that are now producing six gallons of milk per day. They will have thirty producing cows by spring. They expect to supply this entire territory with high grade, big producing Holstein Cows and young Registered males.—Stratford Star.
